**Medical Plan:** Notify line supervisor whether medivac or non-emergency medical transport. Go directly with McG Dispatch at 907-521-7048 or using portable CMD with Mechanism of Injury, Location, Resources Needed. You can follow up with a formal Medical Incident Report later. Transport patient to nearest h-spot or boat launch. We can use boats/helicopter to transport direct to McGrath or to Red Devil airstrip for transport by helicopter or fixed wing. Depending on severity the patient may be transported to McGrath clinic, Anchorage, or for burns to Seattle. Please Utilize ICS 206 Medical Incident Report. EMT's: Alexa Warncke AEMF, Chena, Jumpers have EMT's

**Safety:** Please take time around boats and helicopters, think and double check things before disembarking. All personnel will wear appropriate PPE for transportation (lifejackets, helmets, etc.). Follow the instructions of pilots and operators. Ensure thorough Briefings. Stay within Agency Policies and Procedures.

## Notes:

### OPS:

- Radio Briefing will be at 0800 am (when the Repeater is in place)
- All Orders placed through operations by noon for following day, when possible, utilize 3 day ordering cycle for crew supply orders. Tactical orders can be placed when needed (fuel, aircraft, pumps, etc).

#201 – Securing edge, Allotment protection on the Kuskokwim

#172 - Allotment protection, damage assessment, monitor growth, ID values at risk

#169 – Allotment Protection, damage assessment, monitor growth, ID values at risk

#158, 170, 171 – Monitor, map, ID values at risk

### LOGS:

- Clean up equipment/orders
- Inspections on vehicles, ensuring documentation/shift tickets daily
- Supply cache in Red Devil-Ensuring 3 days food and water reserve
- 3-day ordering cycle-**NOT LATE ON FOOD ORDERS**
- Testing on new repeater – ensure it works for you
- Ensure backhaul as a priority when sending supplies to fires (anything from fire that is not needed send back ASAP, **NO EMPTY LOADS**)

### Miscellaneous

-Send CTR's and documentation in whenever possible (okay if it's a day or two late based on helicopters/boats)

-Please do two days per CTR

<b>FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.</b> <b>FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.</b>					
<b>Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.</b>					
<b>1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH</b> (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report) <i>Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha, Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."</i>					
<b>2. INCIDENT STATUS:</b> Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure. <i>Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."</i>					
Severity of Emergency / Transport Priority	<input type="checkbox"/> <b>RED / PRIORITY 1</b> Life or limb threatening injury or illness. Evacuation need is <b>IMMEDIATE</b> <i>Ex: Unconscious, difficulty breathing, bleeding severely, 2<sup>nd</sup> – 3<sup>rd</sup> burns more than 4 palm sizes, heat stroke, disoriented.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> <b>YELLOW / PRIORITY 2</b> Serious injury or illness. Evacuation may be <b>DELAYED</b> if necessary. <i>Ex: Significant trauma, unable to walk, 2<sup>nd</sup> – 3<sup>rd</sup> burns not more than 1-3 palm sizes.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> <b>GREEN / PRIORITY 3</b> Minor injury or illness. <b>Non-Emergency transport</b> <i>Ex: Sprains, strains, minor heat-related illness.</i>

# **SAFETY MESSAGE 3 DAY**

- **Keep a clean camp.**  
Ensure communications are in place. Review and observe “Line Spike” considerations refer to the Alaskan Handy Dandy. Ensure proper orders for bug repellent & medical supplies are placed. Review and follow Bear Safety guidelines. **BACKHAUL TRASH WHENEVER POSSIBLE.** Stay ahead of the curve.
- **WILDLIFE**  
Watch out for wildlife such as bears and moose. Maintain safe distance and avoid contact. Discard trash appropriately in proper disposal sites and/or removed from camps on a daily basis.  
When bear encounters occur report it to division. If bears still frequent the area determine if work still needs to be conducted, if not leave the area, if so, contact a shooter through your division supervisor for personal safety.  
Review Bear Safety guidelines in the Alaska Handy Dandy.
- **BOATS**  
Refer to Boat Usage on Alaska fires in the Alaska Handy Dandy.  
Ensure personal floatation devices are worn by all passengers. Make sure they float.  
Ensure stable footing when loading and unloading boats. Stay seated when the boat is in motion.  
Never overload the boat that you will be riding in and secure all cargo so it will not shift.
- **PPE**  
Wear and ensure proper use of all appropriate PPE for the operation.  
Use correct tool for task assigned. Pulaskis and saws need to be sheathed when being carried.  
Ensure proper footing through tussocks and boggy terrain or crossing “bridges”. Follow “Hazard Tree Safety” guidelines.
- **SUMMARY**  
Set the appropriate tempo and pace for the task at hand. Take appropriate breaks or tactical pauses. Stay engaged with your environment and your physical health by getting good nutrition, hydration and good rest. Watch out for each other. No place is good place for injury. Make good decisions by being deliberate and thoughtful in your actions by utilizing Hazard /Risk Assessment Management in your LCES and Medical Plan by discussing daily, reassessing as conditions and locations change.
