WEATHER FORECAST

Skyweather: Partly sunny (50-60 percent). Numerous rain showers in the morning, then scattered rain showers in the afternoon.
CWR: 48 percent.
Tstm Coverage: None.
Max temp: 67
Min RH: 47 percent.
Wind (20 ft): Southwest winds 10 to 13 mph.
Ridgetop wind: Southwest winds 10 to 17 mph.
Mixing height: 800 ft AGL increasing to 3700 ft AGL in the late morning and afternoon.
Transport winds: West around 16 mph.
Inversion burnoff: No inversion.

DISCUSSION: Aside from any thunderstorm-induced winds, winds will generally blow from the southwest, with higher winds over ridgetops and on the southeast side of the fire site. Final rainfall totals could exceed half of an inch.

As rain in the area ends Saturday, highs will rise back into the upper 60s and lower 70s on Saturday and Sunday, with min RH values remaining above 40 percent or so. Temperatures will rise through early next week, with some drying and more sun. Stronger southwest winds will fall off by Sunday afternoon and becoming light. Chances for thunderstorms will return by midweek.

TODAY'S SAFETY MESSAGE

FIRING TACTICS

Considered hazardous for two primary reasons.

First, they are usually done as an indirect tactic, and therefore present the problem of unburned fuel.

Secondly, the firing introduces a new fire that is not always predictable.

The new fire can threaten structures or firefighters and can also affect the behavior of the main fire in unpredictable ways.



These high risk tactics are listed together to increase awareness of the tactical situations most often associated with entrapments. When one of these high risk tactics is identified in an assignment, reevaluate the LCES.



Maintain situational awareness at all times!!

Provide for emergency personnel and public safety at all times. Drive slowly, safely and defensively. Manage fatigue by taking breaks and maintaining work rest ratios.

**Identify on-scene incident commander by name and position and announce:
"MEDICAL EMERGENCY" to initiate response from Communications.**

1. Treat the patient
2. **Phone 911 & Call Rescue Coordination Center (RCC) at 907-551-7230.**
Number is monitored 24/7.
3. Communicate patient complaint, condition, and location via Command Frequency
4. Establish a patient extraction plan ASAP

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR “NON-EMERGENT INCIDENT” :

Priority 3 (Green) patients do not trigger an IWI, unless there is a potential of CHANGE to Yellow or Red.

MEDICAL PLAN (ICS 206 WF)

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Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON-SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."

Severity of Emergency / Transport Priority	<input type="checkbox"/> RED / PRIORITY 1 Life or limb threatening injury or illness. Evacuation need is IMMEDIATE <i>Ex: Unconscious, difficulty breathing, bleeding severely, 2° – 3° burns more than 4 palm sizes, heat stroke, disoriented.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> YELLOW / PRIORITY 2 Serious Injury or illness. Evacuation may be DELAYED if necessary. <i>Ex: Significant trauma, unable to walk, 2° – 3° burns not more than 1-3 palm sizes.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> GREEN / PRIORITY 3 Minor Injury or illness. Non-Emergency transport <i>Ex: Sprains, strains, minor heat-related illness.</i>
