**3. Objective(s):**

**Strategic Direction:**

- The Boise fire is managed with a full suppression strategy. Firefighting resources will follow risk-based decision making and implement tactics that offer the highest probability of success to achieve the strategy of suppressing the fire and restoring suppression related damages while protecting local values. Values at risk include the safety of the public and firefighters; the communities and outlying areas near Orleans and Forks of Salmon; water, transportation, natural and cultural resources.

**Control Objectives:**

- Keep fire south of 10N13/25 Rd (Orleans Lookout Road / Antenna Ridge) continuing to Orleans Mountain Ridge to Nordhiemer.
- Keep fire west of the Salmon River
- Keep fire north of the North Folk Red Cap Creek in the Trinity Alps Wilderness
- Keep fire east of the current perimeter

**Management Objectives**

- Prior to engagement, ensure sound risk management principles are in place to provide for firefighter and public safety.
- Implement fire suppression activities in coordination with Incident Resource Advisors.
- Minimize impacts to communities, cultural resources, natural resources including old growth forest, critical power, communication and other infrastructure, private property inholdings, Tribal Lands, threatened, endangered species and watersheds.



# Fire Weather Forecast

**DISCUSSION:** High pressure over the region today and through this week. Conditions will turn warmer and dryer through the week. Due to all the rain that fell Friday night into Saturday morning, moist soils will keep min RH up at 35 to 40% in exposed areas, but staying around 50% under the forest canopy. Winds will be mostly terrain driven with downslope/downvalley in the morning and becoming upslope/upvalley in the afternoon. Exposed ridges will have winds out of the west-northwest at 8 mph and gusting 10 - 15 mph. Inversion is stronger this morning and it's not expected to break until early to mid afternoon, which will shorten the burning period.

### SUNDAY:

- **WEATHER:** Mostly Sunny
- **WIND (20 FT):** Ridges and exposed drainages: west-southwest at 8-10 mph after 1300. Otherwise, terrain driven downslope / downvalley in the morning and upslope / up-valley during the afternoon. Light and variable winds under the shelter of the forest canopy.
- **MAX TEMPERATURES:** 75-79 lower slopes and drainages, 67-74 mid-slope.
- **MIN RH:** 35% in exposed areas and 50% under the canopy.
- **MAX RH:** 80%
- **INVERSION:** Moderate mid-slope...mixing out 1300 - 1400 hrs.

---

### MONDAY:

- **WEATHER:** Mostly Sunny
- **WIND (20 FT):** Ridges and exposed drainages: west-southwest at 8-10 mph after 1300. Otherwise, terrain driven downslope / downvalley in the morning and upslope / up-valley during the afternoon. Light and variable winds under the shelter of the forest canopy.
- **MAX TEMPERATURES:** 74-79 lower slopes and drainages, 68-73 mid-slope.
- **MIN RH:** 32% in exposed areas and 45-50% under the canopy.
- **MAX RH:** 70%
- **INVERSION:** Moderate mid-slope...mixing out 1300 - 1400 hrs.

---

**Extended outlook: Tuesday through Thursday:** High pressure will remain over the region this week. Temperatures will be close to normal for this time of year. Highs will be in the mid to upper 80s to low 90s and minimum RH will also dip back down to 25-30% in exposed areas and 40-45% under the forest canopy. Winds will be mostly orographic with downslope/downvalley at night and in the morning, becoming upslope/upvalley late morning through the afternoon. Ridges and exposed west to east aligned drainages will have west-northwest winds at 8 - 12 mph. The high pressure overhead will also bring cool and clear nights with stronger inversions setting up. Inversion will likely not mix out completely until 1400.

## WEATHER SUMMARY

- Mostly sunny.
- Max temps: 75-79° lower slopes and drainages, 67-74° mid-slope.
- Min RH: 35% in exposed areas and 50% under the canopy.
- Winds-slope/valley: Terrain driven early, then west-southwest at 8-10 mph after 1300.

## FIRE BEHAVIOR

### GENERAL:

*Fire behavior:* Conditions will not support spread until fuels have a chance to dry out.

*Fuels:* Live fuel moistures, 1000 hr. and other dead fuels were at or near critical levels before the rain. Currently those indices are well below average, but will recover. Fuels include timber with litter and understory, brush, and some areas of standing snags and blow down.

*Topography:* The fire is burning in steep, rugged terrain. The fire is burning at elevations between 1600-5500' and slopes between 40-over 100%. All aspects represented in the fire area.

### SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR:

#### All divisions:

The rain from Friday night into Saturday morning will suspend any growth of the fire today. Snags, stump holes, and heavy fuels will continue to hold heat and show a bit of smoke. Surface fuels will not support spread until they have a chance to dry out in the coming days.

We will continue to monitor conditions in the coming days to determine the rate of recovery. Any field observations of changing conditions are appreciated.

## AIR OPERATIONS

No limitations besides the morning inversion are anticipated.

## SAFETY

While the rain has mitigated fire related hazards it has introduced other hazards, including tree root instabilities, rolling rocks, and unstable soil. Take care.
