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priority on the fire. Interior islands of unburned fuel continue to be consumed. Division M, W and Y are being secured with aggressive mop up. Areas outside the control lines will be closely monitored for any new spot fires. Hose is being pulled from Division P. Fire activity remains low during the evening, morning hours. Crews continue with mop up in Div L,M,N,W,Y.

Drift smoke from the fire has been settling in the Ukiah Valley and could create potential health and economic impacts, including Vineyards and Pear Orchards. Reports of smoke have been received from the Santa Rosa area of Sonoma County.
