Interior islands of unburned fuel continue to be consumed.

Divisions K, L, N and W are being secured with aggressive mop up.

Areas outside the control lines will be closely monitored for any new spot fires.

Hose is being pulled from Division P.

Suppression Repair is being preformed in Div. A, D, G, K, P and the Contingency Group.

Energy Release Components (ERC) are at historically high levels. The average slope is 70%.

Drift smoke from the fire has been settling in the Ukiah Valley and could create potential health and economic impacts, including Vineyards and Pear Orchards. Reports of smoke have been received from the Santa Rosa area of Sonoma County.

Evacuation Orders still are in effect for all areas including Dann Valley, Little Creek, Cedar Flat, Cummings/Little Red Mountain, Camp St. Michael, Hermitage, Big Bend, Camp Seabow, Elder Place, Tan Oak Park, Bald Mountain Ranch, Mad Creek and Elk Creek east of Brush Mountain.
