## WEATHER DISCUSSION:

**...RED FLAG WARNING 200 PM to 900 PM TODAY...  
 ...EXCESSIVE HEAT WARNING THROUGH 1100 PM TODAY...**

A hot and very unstable atmosphere will persist across the area through the operational period. There is enough moisture in the middle levels of the atmosphere to bring the threat of isolated to widely scattered thunderstorms to the area. If any thunderstorms do develop, they will likely produce little, if any, precipitation. Therefore, gusty outflow winds (up to 45 MPH) and dry lightning strikes will be the main threat. Given the current fuel conditions, this potential for dry thunderstorms has resulted in the issuance of a **RED FLAG WARNING** for the area this afternoon and evening.

Other than the thunderstorm threat, very warm and dry conditions will persist through the operational periods. Westerly/upcanyon winds, gusting up to 15-20 MPH, can be expected this afternoon and early evening with light and variable winds tonight.

On Thursday, some slight cooling is expected although relative humidity will remain low. Ridgetop winds will remain from a north to northeast direction Thursday afternoon and Thursday night with the northeast flow battling the typical diurnal winds at lower elevations.

**STABILITY/MIXING HEIGHT:** High instability. Mixing height 15000-20000 feet.

**OUTLOOK FOR THURSDAY:** Mostly clear. High temperatures 84-94. Low temperatures 54-64. Min RH: 12-22%. Max RH: 30-50%. Ridgetop winds: North to northeast 5-10 MPH Gusts 12-18 MPH. Slope/valley winds: typical diurnal winds with upcanyon gusts around 15 MPH in the afternoon.

## OUTPUTS

### FIRE BEHAVIOR

#### GENERAL:

NFDRS- Energy Release Component is 64 and above the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile. BI – Burning Index is 46 also above the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile. 100hr FM 10%, 1000 hr FM 11%. LFM in Manzanita approaching critical at 85%. Annual grass is completely cured. The Mill fire is burning in annual grass, light to heavy brush and scattered high desert timber fuels. The Mountain fire is burning in annual grasses, light to heavy brush and scattered hardwood litter and timber litter. Fire area ranges from 2700' to 6000' elevation. On September 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022, a Fuels and Fire Behavior advisory was issued for Northern California. Due to extreme drought, extremely dry fuels and extended periods of hot weather, fire behavior will be elevated for the near future.

#### SPECIFIC:

##### Mill

Increased winds this afternoon may affect isolated pockets of heat within the perimeter.

##### Mountain

The fire is actively burning in steep broken terrain absent of modern fire history; expect torching, short duration crown runs and spotting. General movement of the fire will be to the West and North. Fire backing into creek drainages has the potential to make slope reversals with rapid runs to ridgetops. Winds will be stronger on the ridges and provides an opportunity for mid to long range spotting. **Chance of Thunderstorms today.**

- Div BB Monitor for rollout and fire weakened trees.
- In GG Interior pockets of unburned fuels will remain ember threats during times of strong winds.
- In Div LL, The Moffett Creek drainage will enhance diurnal winds. Monitor for rollout and trees across the line.
- Div OO Monitor for rollout and fire weakened trees.
- Div's PP, TT and WW Monitor for post fire hazards.

#### AIR OPERATIONS:

Sunrise 6:42 am Sunset 7:32 pm. Expect smoke inversion to lift. Partly cloudy.

## SAFETY

Chance of thunderstorms in Northern California today. Thunderstorms can produce strong winds that can travel up to 50 miles. Monitor for afternoon buildups.

# Fuels and Fire Behavior Advisory

## Northern California

September 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022



**Subject:** Potential for extreme fire behavior due to critically elevated fire danger indices, low live and dead fuel moistures, and very hot and dry conditions across much of northern California.

**Discussion:** An extended period of hot, dry weather with embedded periods of enhanced winds will impact Northern California. The elevated fire weather concerns with fuels reaching their yearly minimum moisture values will create conditions conducive to long range spotting, rapid fire growth, and high resistance to control.

**Difference from normal conditions:** The current values for Energy Release Component (ERC) are at or above the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile for the majority of Northern California, with live fuel moistures dropping to critical levels as herbaceous and woody fuels cure. These conditions will be exacerbated by a predicted heat wave, resulting in anomalous daytime highs with little relief in temperature or humidity recovery overnight. Some PSA's, may reach daily record ERC values, with all covered PSA's predicted to reach or exceed the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile for an extended period. The combination of extreme ERC's with high temperatures and poor overnight humidity recovery is highly correlated with extreme fire behavior in Northern California.

### Concerns to Firefighters and the Public:

- The advisory coincides with the Labor Day holiday weekend that is likely to result in increased outdoor recreation and visitor use to public lands across Northern California. The increase in public use carries an increased risk of fire starts as well as potential for evacuations of visitors/ recreational users in the event of a fire starting.
- Energy Release Component (ERC) in areas covered by this advisory are at or above the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile and are expected to approach or exceed the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile. **Anticipate increased spread rates, long range spotting, and active nighttime burning.**
- The combination of persistent drought, a building heat wave, and a very dry atmosphere will continue to decrease already low fuel moisture values:
  - 1000-hour fuel moistures are below average and approaching the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile,
  - Live woody fuel moisture in brush is near or slightly below average, making them readily available and will likely reach critical levels because of the forecasted hot, dry weather.
  - The above average herbaceous fuel load at low and mid elevations (below 5,000 ft.) is fully cured, with high elevation herbaceous fuels rapidly curing during the hot, dry forecast.
  - Higher than average surface fuel loading is present in areas that experienced winter snow and ice storms in the Coast Range and northern Sierra Nevada.

**Expect fires to ignite easier and spread faster. Do not expect fires to exhibit reduced fire behavior when entering areas of live fuels; anticipate increased spread rates and spotting.**

- Periods of enhanced winds are expected during the hot and dry period. Given the current and anticipated fuels conditions, increases in winds will make direct attack of any new starts difficult and may hamper use of aerial resources.
- Review the current [North Ops Outlooks](#) and [national fuels and fire behavior advisories](#).

### Mitigation Measures:

- Suppression actions need to be based on good anchor points, escape routes, and safety zones. **Remember LCES. Experienced lookouts are essential under these conditions.**
- Base all actions on current and expected behavior of the fire. **Augment initial attack resources as incident activity dictates**
- Fire managers should be aware of high use recreation and visitor sites in their area. **The holiday weekend will bring increased visitor use, increasing risk of starts during critical fire weather.**

**Area of Concern:** Northern California except for the following Predictive Service Areas: North Coast, Bay Marine, and west of Highway 101 in Mid-Coast to Mendocino.

### Major Hazards and Risks:

**HEAT – SNAGS- TERRAIN - RECEPTIVE FUELS - DRIVING - FATIGUE**

**Fire Behavior:** The fire will be under a **RED FLAG WARNING** and **EXCESSIVE HEAT WARNING**. Be prepared for spot fires and erratic winds. Fuels are receptive to fire. Be aware of past trends of fire activity. Take frequent weather observations and be prepared for increased winds. Consider P.A.C.E and know your L.C.E.S. Be prepared for erratic fire behavior.

**Situational Awareness:** Access your current situation constantly, maintain radio communication with your division, adjacent divisions, and monitor air-to-ground frequencies to understand what is happening around you at all times. Pay attention to any changes in weather and fire behavior. There is a chance of **LIGHTNING** over the fire area. Be aware of where you have parked your vehicle, there may be a chance of adverse driving conditions.

**Steep slopes/rolling material/snags:** Watch your footing while hiking in steep terrain. Be careful of loose rolling debris. Maintain Situational Awareness while working around trees and snags.

**Line Construction:** Use Downhill Line Checklist (IRPG). Conduct thorough briefing for all personnel. Ensure LCES in place prior to engagement. Establish Safety Zones. Utilize Risk Management Process.

**COVID:** Maintain good hygiene and report any symptoms to supervisor.

**Environmental Hazards:** Watch for damaged propane tanks and other hazards around damaged structures. Wear appropriate PPE when overhauling structures.

**Fatigue:** Take frequent nutrition and hydration breaks throughout the day. Hydrate with a 2 water to 1 electrolyte drink ratio on hot dry days. Monitor personnel for fatigue and plan accordingly with work assignments.

### **Lookouts, Communication, Escape routes, Safety zones**

#### **TAILGATE SAFETY**

- **Accountability:** Supervisors know where their crews are at all times.
- **Thunderstorm Safety:** Review page 17 of the IRPG.
- **Hydration and Nutrition:** Monitor each other for proper hydration and nutrition.
- **Communication:** Everyone knows the comm plan and follows it.
- **Briefing:** Leaders intent is fully communicated, and safety briefing is provided.
- **Safety gear:** Everyone has the appropriate PPE and is using it.
- **LCES:** They are clear, understandable and made known to everyone.

#### **Planning For Medical Emergencies**

Supervisors and all firefighters need to Review your ICS 206 ask and be able to answer the following questions:

#### **What are we going to do if someone gets hurt?**

- Is there personnel and equipment available to assist?

#### **How will we get them out of here?**

- What is your best extraction and transport method? Road, helispot, hoist? Primary plan and contingency plan in place?

#### **How long will it take to get them to the hospital?**

- Will you request air or ground resources?
- Are helicopters able to fly?

# SAFETY COMMUNICATION

## HIGH TEMPERATURES & HEAT ILLNESS

With the significant heat wave across California, all CAL FIRE employees are expected to review and implement the following heat illness prevention measures. With high heat, body temperature can rise to dangerous levels and lead to heat related illnesses such as heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Heat related illnesses can affect anyone, regardless of age or physical condition. Those who have not properly acclimated to hot conditions, include new employees and employees returning to work after a week or more off, are at an increased risk of heat related illnesses.

**WHILE RECOGNITION AND TREATMENT ARE IMPORTANT, PREVENTION IS ESSENTIAL.**

### Avoid or reduce outdoor activities:

- Strenuous activities should be reduced, eliminated, or rescheduled.
- Outdoor activities, including trainings and exercise, should be moved indoors or rescheduled during cooler times of the day.
- If outdoor work cannot be avoided, increase recovery time spent in cool, shaded areas, such as the cab of vehicles, shade from trees or vehicles, rock outcroppings, or buildings. During breaks, and when operationally safe to do so, loosen or remove PPE.

### Hydrate:

- Drink cool water, even if you are not thirsty.
- Begin hydrating well in advance of physical activity, including when off shift and during recovery periods.
- Avoid Hyponatremia (low concentration of sodium in the blood) by supplementing water intake with electrolyte enhanced fluids, such as sports drinks.
- Avoid carbonated and caffeinated beverages, as they can lead to dehydration.

### Monitor for symptoms:

- Signs and symptoms of heat illness may progress over the course of a few days or may have a rapid onset
- Signs and symptoms of heat illness include headache, muscle cramps, unusual fatigue, profuse sweating, unusual behavior, and nausea or vomiting


Any employees exhibiting signs and symptoms of heat illness require immediate attention. If medical personnel are not available on-site and heat illness is suspected, emergency medical personnel should be contacted immediately and on-site first aid shall begin.

ALL	<b>FATIGUE/HEAT/DEHYDRATION</b>	Be alert for signs of fatigue and take breaks as necessary. Monitor incoming resources for level of fatigue. Drink water before, during and after shifts, up to 1.5 gal. per shift. Be alert for signs of heat stress in yourself and others; Find shade when you can. Drink electrolyte drinks at a 2 water to 1 sport drink ratio.
ALL	<b>COMPLACENCY</b>	Do not underestimate the task at hand. Everyone should be briefed on the conditions and circumstances regarding their assignment. Be alert while working along roadways.
Mountain	<b>FIRE BEHAVIOR/WEATHER</b>	Know your LCES and maintain Situational Awareness. Use experienced Lookouts. Fire is under a RED FLAG WARNING and EXCESSIVE HEAT WARNING. Maintain situational awareness for possible thunderstorm activity. Monitor weather for changes in the wind, temp, and RH during the shift. Have a contingency plan with established decision points and safety zones. Be aware of past trends of fire activity.
Mountain	<b>AIRCRAFT OPERATIONS</b>	Monitor air-to-ground frequency, they are your eyes in the sky. Use air-to-ground frequency to communicate with aircraft. Use clear, concise statements when directing aircraft. Clear the area for incoming water and retardant drops.
ALL	<b>HEAVY EQUIPMENT</b>	Watch for rolling material avoid working below heavy equipment. Monitor safe working distances provide adequate working space.
Mountain	<b>LINE CONSTRUCTION</b>	Ensure LCES in place prior to engagement. Establish adequate safety zones. Use Downhill Line Checklist. Follow "Look Up, Look Down, Look Around" procedures. Utilize Risk Management Process. Reference the IRPG.
ALL CAMP HOTELS	<b>COVID 19</b>	Wear a mask when applicable. Utilize hand sanitizer and wash hands frequently. Maintain social distancing. Disinfect apparatus and coolers frequently. Adhere to local, state, and federal Covid-19 guidelines.
ALL	<b>DRIVING HAZARDS</b>	Complete appropriate DOT daily vehicle inspection. <b>Slow Down!</b> Long travel times to the line, stay alert. Stop if fatigued. Anticipate adverse driving conditions with possible wetting rains. Drive defensively! Expect the unexpected around every curve. Drive with headlights and seatbelts on. Narrow roads with limited passing room. Expect roads to deteriorate over the shift.
ALL	<b>COMMUNICATIONS</b>	Confirm correct tactical and command channel. No unassigned radio channels. Check your Air to Ground channel to make sure it is correct. Check your tactical frequency if you have moved branches or divisions.
ALL	<b>HAZARD TREES/TREE FELLING SAFETY</b>	Identify and isolate the area to provide for the safety of others. Flag and make proper notifications. Size up and mitigate concerns, put the tree fire out if possible! Work within your qualifications if considering felling a tree
ALL	<b>ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS</b>	Maintain situational awareness for illegal activity, Be aware of wild animals. (Bears, Mountain Lions, Bees, etc.) Bow hunting season is open near the Mountain fire area. Be aware of possible propane leaks and live wires in areas of damaged structures.

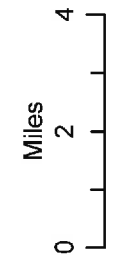
