<p>Use of type 1 hand crews due to steep rocky terrain in the sensitive wilderness areas, has been slowed due to crews timing out and lack of replacement resources. Thus reducing our ability to complete planned direct and indirect line construction.</p>	

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Use of mechanical equipment is not possible or practical in all areas.
 Smoke conditions limits/negates use of aircraft, ground forces have to make up the effort.
 Missed direct / indirect opportunities, due to lack of crews has lead to increased need for engines for structure point protection and indirect actions.
 Shifting winds, dead & down fuels, snags and long travel times; combined with limited resources will extend the incident till the first significant wetting rain fall.

 Shift our limited number of type 1 crews to improving indirect and direct line construction to defend the Salmon River communities. Improve previous hand lines along Patterson Ridge, Patterson Creek, Kidder Creek, Etna Mill Creek, Whiskey Butte, Yellow Jacket Ridge and Sawyers Bar Road. Fuel reduction and preparation around structures with point protection defense along Salmon River Valley communities.
 Maintain the evacuation warning for Salmon River Valley Communities. Increased direct line construction in Div P to avoid expansion of the evacuation warning.
