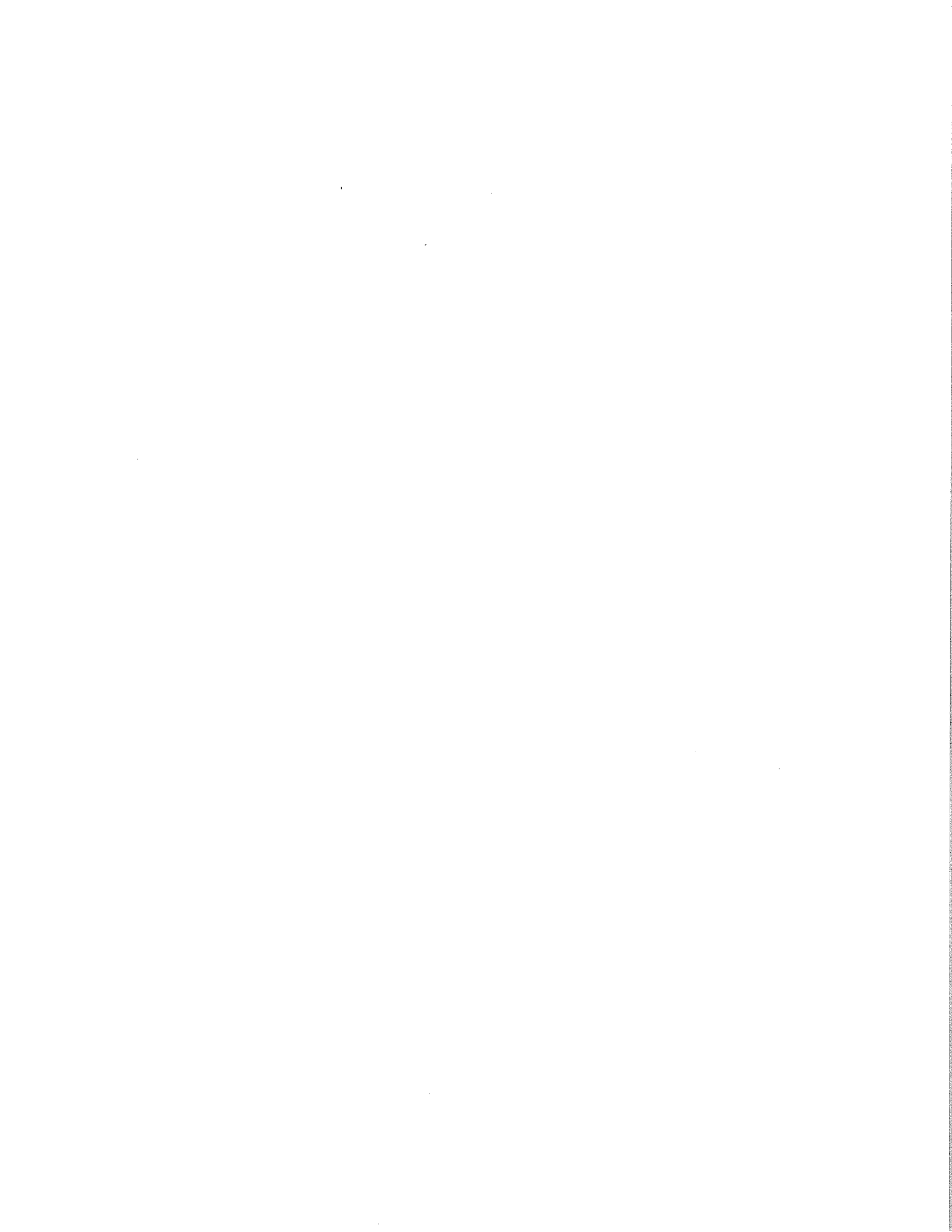

CIIMT4 INCIDENT EXPECTATIONS

CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR

This team is committed to “**ZERO TOLERANCE**” of careless, illegal, inappropriate and unsafe actions.

Alcohol and/or illegal drugs are **NOT** allowed within the incident environment or while actively assigned to the incident. Local Law Enforcement Officials will be called to deal with any suspected illegal activities. Each employee has the responsibility to be ready, willing, and able to perform the duties for which they are qualified.

Sexual Harassment inappropriate actions or comments will not be tolerated. Everyone is expected to act in a professional manner. It is your responsibility to stop inappropriate actions or comments immediately upon becoming aware of such. Sexual Harassment must be reported to the Human Resource Specialist or Incident Commander. When outside of your designated sleeping area, you are required to wear at least a shirt, appropriate shorts, and shoes or sandals. If you need clarification of these expectations contact the Human Resource Specialist or IC.

SAFETY

The commitment to and accountability for safety is a joint responsibility of firefighters, managers and administrators. Individuals must personally be committed and responsible for their own performance and accountability. Everyone assigned to this incident can expect an assignment that follows all safety rules & regulations. Every person is expected to perform his or her duties in compliance with all known safety practices at all times. Anything less is unacceptable.

EMPHASIS AREAS

Work Rest Cycles - The 2: 1 work/rest ratio is mandatory. For every two hours on shift you will be required to rest for one hour. Every effort shall be used to limit work hours to a maximum of 16. If circumstances require you to exceed 16 hours, this needs to be coordinated in advance with your supervisor and the Justification/Mitigation form completed to support the excessive hours prior to submitting for approval by the IC. It is your responsibility to comply with this direction and provide the appropriate documentation to your Supervisor and Finance.

Position Qualifications- Personnel shall only be assigned to positions for which they are qualified. Proof of qualifications shall be approved prior to being assigned to any position. Operational contract equipment must provide proof that they have received the annual fire refresher training. If not, this training must be received prior to going to work on the fire line.

Engagement/Disengagement - The 10 Standard Orders & 18 Watchout Situations will be followed at all times and mitigated as needed. Staying aware of your situation is critical. Follow the Risk Management Process outlined in the Incident Response Pocket Guide.

Debriefing All Branch Directors/Division/Group Supervisors will report to their Supervisor and Situation Unit at the end of the operational period for debriefing with emphasis on the accomplishment of objectives. All unit logs (ICS 214) will be turned in after the debriefing to Documentation reflecting accomplishment and/or significant incidents that occurred during the operational period.

Crew Time Reports/Shift Tickets - It is your responsibility to ensure all time is properly accounted for and recorded each shift. The records are to be reviewed and signed by the next level supervisor. A finance related, "Rules of Engagement" document may be provided in the IAP explaining further requirements.

Injuries/Claims - Ensure all injuries and potential claims are reported to the Comp/Claims Unit for completion of appropriate paperwork. Contract claims will be reported to the Procurement Unit Leader.

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

....South ridgetop winds increase and more unstable....

The combination of increasing south ridgetop winds and more unstable airmass will help mix the smoke out by 1300 as the inversion lifts...especially over the midslopes and ridgetops today. A few gusts between 15 and 20 mph are possible in the exposed south to north aligned ridgetops during the afternoon. Very warm temperatures and low afternoon relative humidities will continue today. Nighttime recovery relative humidities will range between 40 and 50% at ridgetops with southeast winds gusting up to 18 mph possible toward sunrise.

WEATHER FORECAST Monday:

WEATHER: Areas of smoke, otherwise mostly sunny.

HIGH TEMPERATURES: 87-95 valleys. 77-83 ridgetops.

HUMIDITY: 26-33% elevations below 2000 feet. 28-35% above 4000 feet.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP – Southeast winds 8 to 14 mph, becoming south 10 to 15 with a few gusts up to 20 mph possible after 1400.

SLOPE/VALLEY - Light until 1200 then up-canyon 4-8mph with gusts to 13 mph after 1400.

HAINES INDEX: 4. **INVERSION:** Lifting by 1300 midslope and ridgetops and partially lifting in the deeper valleys near Denny.

WEATHER FORECAST For Monday Night:

WEATHER: Areas of smoke, otherwise mostly clear.

TEMPERATURES: 54 to 59 valleys, 57 to 63 ridgetops and midslopes.

HUMIDITY: Ridgetop and midslope relative humidity 38 to 48%. 85 to 95% lower slopes/valleys.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Southeast winds 10 to 15 mph with a few gusts up to 20 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY - Evening down-canyon winds 3 to 6 mph.

EXTENDED FORECAST: A southwest flow aloft will continue through midweek, with warm temperatures and dry conditions. The daily inversion should lift between 1200 and 1400 daily with breezy mid and upper slopes winds on Tuesday. A few gusts between 15 and 20 mph will be possible in the aligned south to north ridgetop valleys. Nighttime thermal belts are expected as southeast off shore flow develops at night. Additional moisture will help produce clouds and slightly cooler temperatures and higher relative humidities on Wednesday.

WEATHER SUMMARY:

Winds: Day, Ridges SE 8-14 mph, then south 10-15 gusting to 20 mph, after 1200.

Slopes/Valley: Light until 1200, then up-canyon 4-8 mph with gust to 12 mph after 1500

Night: Ridges-SE 10-15

Slopes-Evening down canyon 2-5 mph

Min. RH: Day 24-32% below 2000', 28-35% above 4000'.

Night, 38-48% mid-slope/Ridges. 85-95% lower slopes/valleys.

Temperatures: Day, 85-95 Valleys 77-83 Ridgetops.

Night, 54-59 valleys and 57-63 ridgetops/mid-slopes.

FIRE BEHAVIOR FORECAST

GENERAL FIRE BEHAVIOR:

Smoke will be hang over the fire for most of the morning with a weaker thermal belt in place mid-slope creating an environment that could produce higher fire activity than yesterday. Primary fire spread will be where fuels & topography align which could lead to single/group tree torching or more in the higher elevations. Rates of spread will be from 1 to 9 chains per hour with flame lengths 1-9 feet in the timber. Rates of spread will increase on steeper slopes due to roll-out. Most of the active areas of the fire are in a backing alignment. **Falling snags and rollout will challenge containment lines and will increase the potential for fire spread over barriers that would normally hold the fire.**

Specific:

Branch I: DIV L may experience some surface fire burning in the heavier fuels and interior pockets will continue to burnout.

Branch II&III: Denny Group can expect burnout of unburned fuels, both on the line and internally, as a result of firing operations. Poor visibility will be limited due to smoke. In Division T, expect the fire to continue to impact the 5N04 Rd, especially from rollout in steep terrain. Expect flanking fire in heavy fuels and surface litter. Single and group tree torching may be observed. In DIV Q, Fire will continue to spread laterally. In the SE portion of the fire, expect active backing and flanking fire. Single/group tree torching may be observed and rollout will continue to challenge lines. Short range spotting (less than ¼ mile) is also possible. Expect greater rates of spread in the grass found in the old burns.

Air Operations: Strong inversion will remain over the fire, possibly lifting above 3500' around 1200-1300.

Safety: Maintain situation awareness with the uncertainty of atmospheric stability. **Strong inversions will limit visibility until early afternoon.**

Hazard Trees

- **Situational Awareness:** Survey your work area for hazard trees (green or black) early in the shift. ***The longer an area has been burned, increases probability for undermined trees.***
- **Flag, Avoid and Notify:** Flag any identified hazard trees and notify your supervisor and any potentially impacted fire personnel.
- **Make a Plan:** Make your plan to reposition to a more secure area if conditions dictate PRIOR to the need arising. Post lookouts. Don't wait until the last minute to execute the plan.
- **Be alert for changing conditions:** Wind increases the hazard. Be aware of local diurnal wind patterns. Avoid working under burned trees if winds increase appreciably.

Fatigue/Smoke Effects

- Be alert for signs of fatigue and take breaks as necessary.
- Maintain 2:1 work/rest ratio.
- Monitor incoming resources for level of fatigue.
- Allow for extended rest periods if needed.
- Avoid working in heavy inversions for prolonged periods if possible. Take occasional breaks in clear air to mitigate buildup of CO, and CO2.
- ***“Over hydrate” to assist in flushing smoke particulates from your system.***

Driving

- Drive defensively! Expect the unexpected around every curve.
- ***Where operationally feasible, rest drivers one hour before returning to camp.***
- Always fasten seat belts ***before*** the vehicle is set into motion.
- When driving, keep speed at or ***below*** the posted speed limit.
- ***Stay as far to the right of the road as is safely possible.***
- ***Stay away from soft shoulders on the downhill side of roads.***
- Allow opposing heavy vehicle traffic to ***pass slowly on the uphill side*** of narrow access roads, after ensuring there is adequate room.
- Watch out for debris and wildlife in the roadway.
- ***Increase following distance between vehicles in dusty or smoky areas.***
- ***Use a spotter*** when backing or turning around your vehicle.

Night Shift:

Patrol with a Purpose!

- Obtain a clear briefing to understand the purpose and intent of the patrol.
- Coordinate all patrol activities with adjoining patrol resources.
- Maintain strict accountability of all resources.
- Always keep the purpose of the patrol in mind before engaging.
- Always assess risk versus gain when considering taking action during patrol activities.

WORK REST CYCLE

IT IS NATIONAL DIRECTION TO MEET A 2 TO 1 WORK/REST RATIO (1 hour of sleep/rest for every 2 hours of work). Every effort shall be made to manage work hours so you don’t exceed the maximum of 16 hrs. Work hours exceeding 16 hrs shall be approved by your supervisor in advance, and a justification/mitigation form completed for review by Section Chief & approved by IC. It is each person’s responsibility to comply with this direction to manage for fatigue and safety.

OPERATIONAL SHIFTS

Pay status for assigned overhead and crews on the fireline will not start prior to the posted briefing time and will terminate on arrival back in camp (except for debriefing—additional hours may be accrued by those required to attend debriefing). Supervisors will be allowed ½ hour prior to briefing and after return to camp to ready crew and equipment.

DUTY STATUS

Division/Group supervisors and Unit Leaders are responsible for establishing on and off duty status. The objective is a 2 to 1 work/rest ratio. Personnel will normally work, travel, and/or be placed on ORDERED standby 8 to 16 hours per day and be off duty 8 hours or more (breaks count towards 8 hrs). Off duty time will be in a non-pay status. Each federal employee is guaranteed **at least 8 hours** of pay status each 24-hour period (midnight to midnight) unless it is the first or last day of an assignment or stated otherwise in a contract or agreement.

PERSONNEL/EQUIPMENT TIME REPORTING

Personnel time will be reported to the Time Unit and daily once they are signed by the next level supervisor. Local Government Resources hired under CFAA or Local Agreement w/Forest are also required to submit a Crew Time Report daily. OES resources will be monitored by OES Agency Rep (if assigned) for 2/1 Work Rest compliance. Situations entitling you to HAZARD PAY are to be noted in remarks (i.e HP=Uncontrolled Fireline, hovering hookups, low level flights, etc.)

Private Contracted Equipment time must be tracked on a Shift Ticket daily and hours on shift noted even if it is a daily rate. When swapping out operators you need to notify Finance as well as changing from single to double shift and vice versa.

Supervisor’s - If you are responsible for daily tracking of equipment or personnel, please ensure you understand the agreement, and follow the rules provided in this document. Do not sign documents for resources you did not manage unless you have knowledge of their assignment hours.

MEAL AND OTHER WORK BREAKS

Compensable meal periods are the exception, not the rule (5 CFR 551.411 © and 29 CFR 785.19(a)). **Until the fire is controlled**, personnel on the fireline **MAY BE** compensated for meal periods if all of the following conditions are met: 1) The fire is not controlled and 2) The Operations Section Chief makes a decision that it is critical to the effort of controlling the fire that personnel remain at their post of duty and continue to work as they eat, and 3) The compensable meal break is approved by the supervisor at the next level and documented on CTR. For personnel in support positions, and fireline personnel **after control** of a fire, a meal period of at least 30 minutes must be ordered and taken for each work shift of eight hours or more. In those situations where personnel cannot be relieved from work and must remain at a post of duty, a meal period may be counted as time worked, which will be compensable. **If breaks are NOT able to be taken, CTR should have a statement in remarks explaining the situation.**

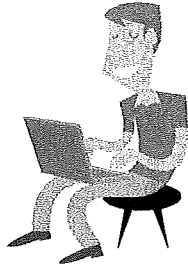
