

***** STRONG WEST WINDS TODAY WITH DRY COLD FRONT *****

DISCUSSION: A dry cold front will move across the area early today, and strong west winds will move in behind it. A wind shift is not likely to be noticeable today, but there will be a sudden increase in west wind speeds as the inversion mixes out late morning. These winds are likely to be the strongest we've seen on this incident. This system will bring a little more moisture (rain will not occur), and this will mean slightly higher humidities than normal. Humidities are not low enough for a red flag warning, but conditions will be near critical this afternoon due to the wind alone.

SUNDAY: * VERY WINDY *****

- **WEATHER:** Partly cloudy, dry and very windy.
- **WIND (20 FT): Ridges, exposed areas, and wind-aligned drainages:** Variable 3-6 mph through 1000, then becoming west 6-10 mph through 1400, then increasing to 18-23 mph with gusts to 30 mph. **Sheltered areas:** Variable (downslope) 1-3 mph through 0900, then upslope 2-5 mph through 1400, then west 4-8 mph with gusts to 12 mph.
- **MAX TEMPERATURES:** 78-83
- **MIN RH:** 15-20%
- **CHANCE RAIN:** 0%
- **HAINES:** 3
- **MIXING HEIGHT:** 500 ft AGL or less, increasing to 4,000 ft AGL around 1200, then increasing to 8,000 ft AGL.
- **MIXING WINDS:** West 20-30 mph.

SUNDAY NIGHT:

- **WEATHER:** Mostly clear.
- **WIND (20 FT): Ridges and exposed areas:** West 18-23 mph with gusts to 30 mph possible through 2000, then becoming northwest 5-10 through 0300, then north 3-6 mph. **Sheltered areas:** West 4-8 mph with gusts 12 mph through 2000, then becoming downslope 1-3 mph. Local north winds 2-4 mph.
- **MIN TEMPERATURES:** 42-47 valley bottoms, 52-57 mid-slope and above.
- **MAX RH:** 75-80% valley bottoms, 50-55% mid-slope and above.
- **CHANCE RAIN:** 0%
- **INVERSION:** Weak developing around mid-slope.

MONDAY:

- **WEATHER:** Partly cloudy.
- **WIND (20 FT): Ridges, exposed areas, and wind-aligned drainages:** North 3-6 mph through 1200, then becoming northeast 5-10 mph. **Sheltered areas:** Variable (downslope) 1-3 mph through 0900, then upslope 2-5 mph. Locally northeast 3-6 mph.
- **MAX TEMPERATURES:** 76-81
- **MIN RH:** 18-23%
- **CHANCE RAIN:** 0%
- **HAINES:** 4
- **MIXING HEIGHT:** 500 ft AGL or less, increasing to 3,000 ft AGL around 1200, then increasing to 6,000 ft AGL.
- **MIXING WINDS:** North-northeast 5-10 mph.

INPUTS

WEATHER SUMMARY: ****Strong West Winds With Dry Cold Front****
Warm and dry with humidity in the high teens and gusty West winds; primarily terrain driven at eye level early, then West in the afternoon

Temp: 78-83F RH: Min 15-20% Wind: Light and Variable turning West 18-23 with gusts to 30 mph at the 20ft. level. Inversion to mix out of drainages around 1400 hrs.

Both ERC and 1000 hr Fuel Moistures are setting records. Live fuels recorded on 8-5-18 in sage were 89% and 71% at locations closest to the fire. Fine Dead should be 4% on a West Aspect in the afternoon with a PI of 80%.

OUTPUTS

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL:

In the morning expect minimal fire activity until the inversion breaks around 1400 hrs. The good RH recovery will slow the fire spread on the slopes and ridges in the timber, but not completely stop spread in the heavy dead and down. Burning conditions will continue to be active in the heavier dead fuels. High frontal winds will test containment on lines that are aligned to the North and South. Terrain may funnel the strong wind and create adverse wind conditions in unexpected areas. Trees torching out on ridge tops or saddles may generate up to a mile spotting distance.

SPECIFIC:

Direct attack opportunities will be present in all divisions with light fuel loading in the early parts of the shift. Low ROS and flame length during the early part of operational period will be favorable and provide opportunities to secure containment in the Northern flank and other areas critical to meet strategic objectives. Conditions after 1400 hrs should produce **EXTREME BURNING CONDITIONS**. ROS of 140-180 ch/hr and flame lengths 10-15 ft. in the grass shrub mix. In the heavy timber litter/understory expect ROS of 50-60 ch/hr and flame lengths of 15-17 ft. Expect group torching and short duration crown runs in aligned drainages, with spot distances of up to 1 mile.

Divisions E/G/J will be wind tested. Areas of concern include small doglegs that may have developed during firing ops, ridges, saddles, and drainages open to the West that can funnel wind. Good mop-up depth will be critical to holding any of these parts of fireline especially in the timber fuels.

Divisions A/Z will experience adverse wind conditions as the strong West wind funnels through the drainages. Any fire activity that can result in torching trees will increase spotting risk across HY 299 or southern containment lines. Most dead fuels in these divisions have nearly consumed so the risk will be minimal, but still present due to wind strength and direction.

Division M will experience adverse wind; however, IR shows very little heat left over near the line. The overall division should be sheltered except from mid-slope to the ridge tops. Wind eddies are highly possible in the intersecting drainages in the southern parts of the division.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Smoke may obscure air operation opportunities early in the operational period. Wind speeds may affect the fire suppression effort from aircraft.

SAFETY

Fresh firing operations may contain many snags. Watch for overhead hazards when working around fire weakened trees. If involved in IA, develop a plan of attack that accounts for both slow foot travel, sudden wind shifts and rapid rates of spread. Expect extreme burning conditions for IA and escape fires that become established in a continuous fuel bed.





Mental Exhaustion

Mental exhaustion is a common occurrence and is the result of brain over activity. It does not necessarily occur in one fell swoop, but instead, it slowly accumulates over time. Being overwhelmed, having too many responsibilities, or simply having too much going on can cause you to reach an eventual boiling point, where your mind and body cannot cope anymore. Signs of mental exhaustion can include:

- You are aware that there is too much going on at once.
- You forget little, but important, things.
- You have a total mental block.
- When people ask you questions while under stress, you provide an irrational response.

Risk Management

- Only attempt an operation your comfortable doing.
- Scouting out work areas should be the first thing you do
- Communicating the hazards to others will help them reduce their exposure.
- If something doesn't seem or sound right ask.

Fire Environment

- Recognize each factor of the fire environment to spot potential problems.
- A bad situation can get worse if you ignore the signs of trouble.
- If you are unsure ask a veteran firefighter about the pieces of the puzzle that drive the fire environment.
- Developing a habit of continuing checking your environment is one of the best ways to stay safe.

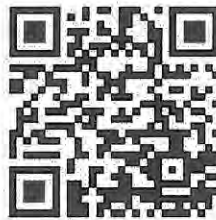

- Inappropriate information, pictures or videos
- Opinions regarding the incident or policy
- Endorsements of any kind

FEDERAL FIRE SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

Social media posts can reflect on the professionalism of your crew, your agency and Wildland Firefighting Community. The U.S. Forest Service has enjoyed a reputation as the world leader in wildland firefighting for over 100 years. Protect our legacy with good conduct on the fireline and online. When assigned to a federal fire you are considered a federal employee under the delegation of authority. Even if you are a contractor, AD or from a partner agency we recommend you follow these ethics guidelines which apply to federal employees all the time.

Think before you post:

- On official time, do official duties; if using government equipment, do government business.
- Don't use your official position/title for private gain.
- Do share government information that is publically available (such as links to Inciweb, weather reports, feature stories, official evacuation notices etc...) Do not disclose (via any medium) non-public information to further private interests or the private interests of others.
- Do not share information outside official channels that could be associated with a crime or a claim, (for instance do not post on social media about serious accidents, deaths or destroyed property).
- Do not accept compensation for statements made over social media that relate to official duties.
- Never use your official title while engaging in "political activity" (activity directed toward the success or failure of a political party, partisan candidate or partisan political group).
- Federal employees may express their opinions concerning partisan political candidates and political parties on social media when they are off duty and away from the federal workplace.
- If you have questions about content you'd like to post on social media, contact a PIO, they can help you.

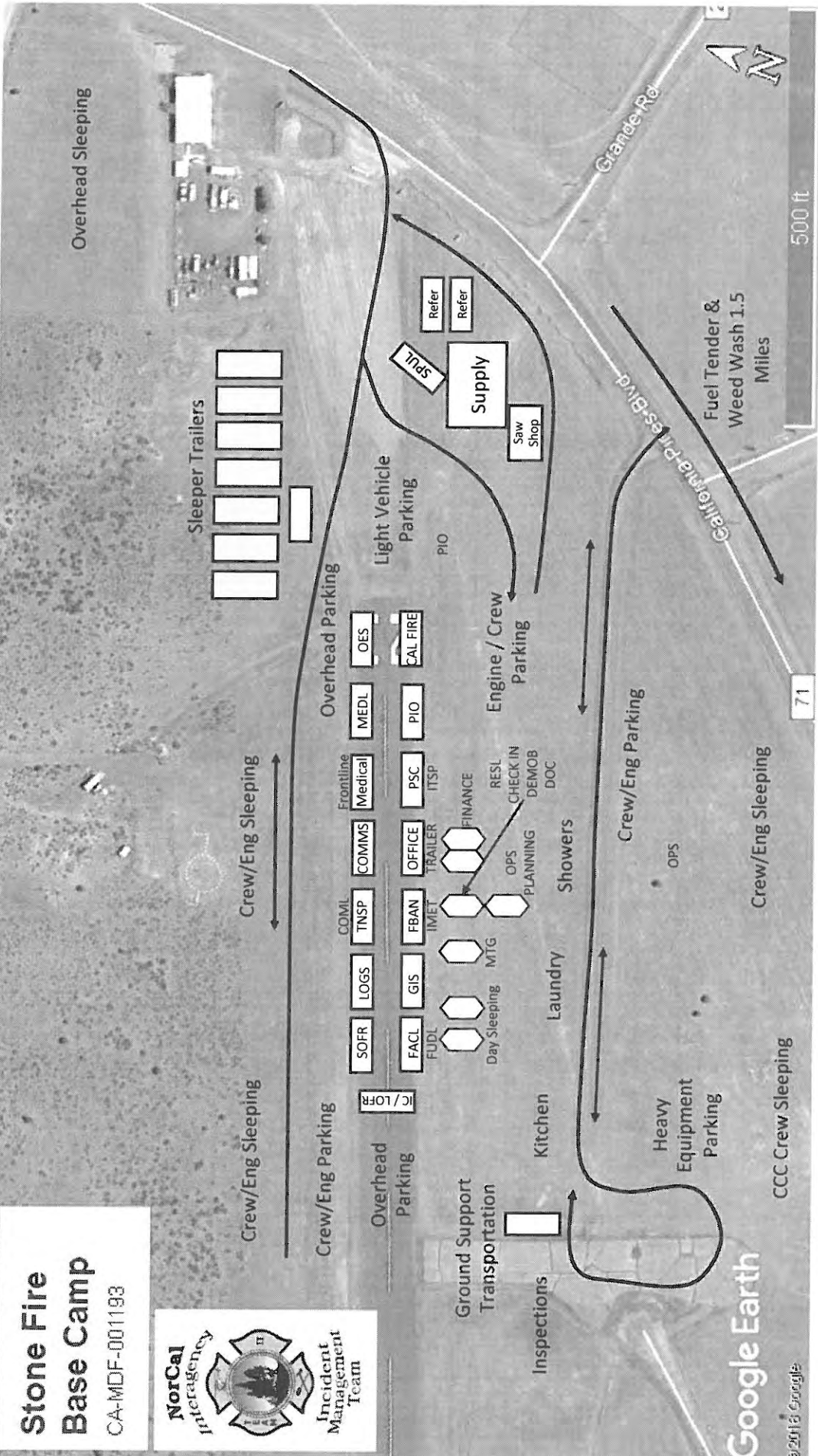
PICTURES AND VIDEO OF INCIDENT

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
