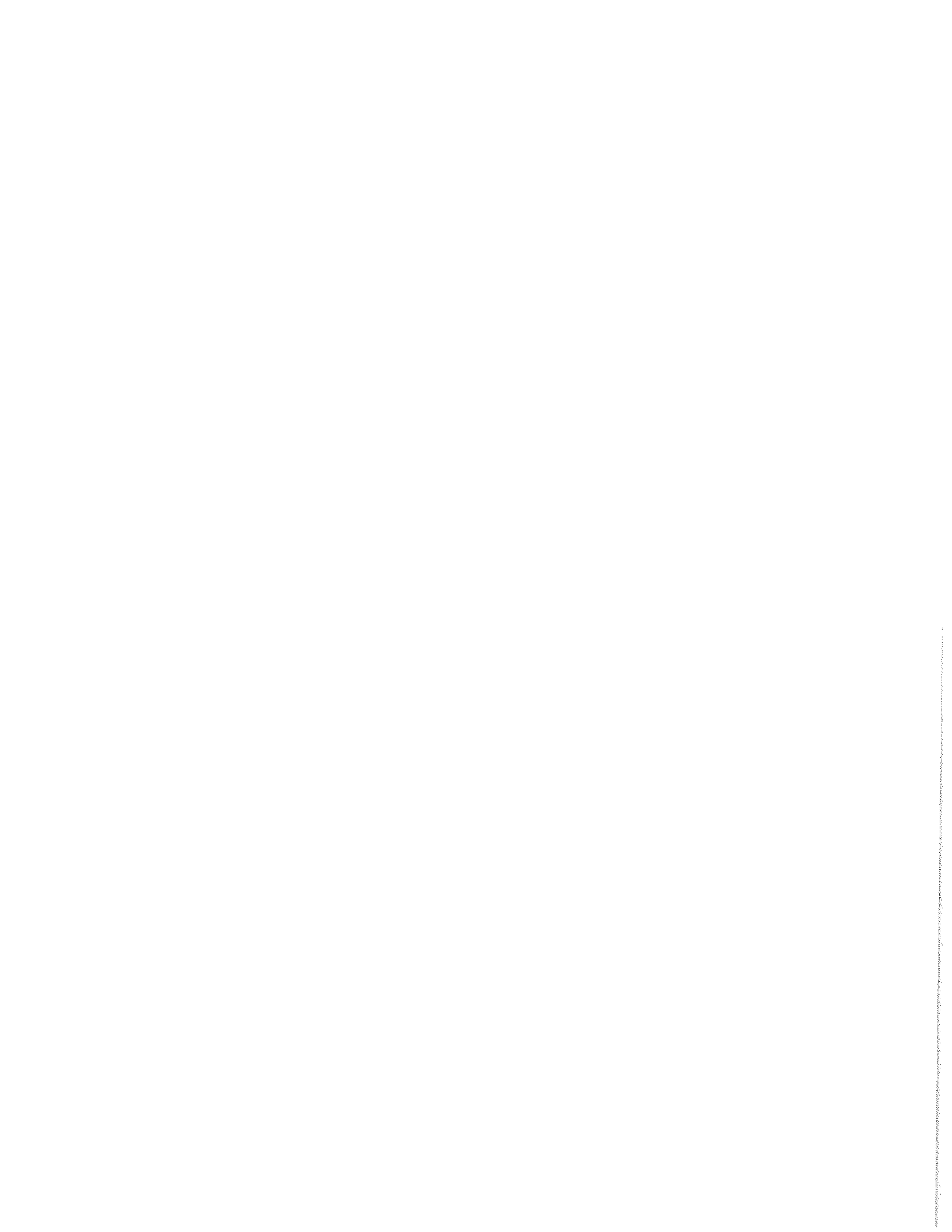

WEATHER DISCUSSION: A low pressure system over the Pacific Northwest will pivot one last weather disturbance through Northern California today. This will bring cloudy skies and continued very moderate conditions to the fire area. In the afternoon and early evening there will be a chance of light showers and a slight chance of an isolated thunderstorm. The best chance of shower activity in the fire area will be between 1400 and 2000. Wednesday will be a transition day with warming and drying and a little north wind. A little more warming and drying is expected on Thursday as high pressure builds in.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Mostly Cloudy with a chance of light showers and a slight chance of afternoon thunderstorms. Best chance of showers 1400-2000. Less than one tenth inch precipitation expected in absence of a thunderstorm. LAL 2 in the afternoon.

TEMPERATURES: Maximum temperatures 63-69.

HUMIDITY: Min RH 33-40%.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Light and variable in the morning becoming mainly northwest 5-10 mph gusts to 15 mph after about 1100. **Gusty and erratic winds possible in vicinity of thunderstorms.**

SLOPE/VALLEY - Downslope to downcanyon 1-5 mph becoming upslope to upcanyon mainly southwest to northwest 4-8 mph with gusts to 12 mph after about 1100.

HAINES INDEX: 2-3

STABILITY/INVERSION: Inversions breaking by early afternoon. Slightly less stable than Monday.

OUTLOOK FOR Tuesday Night : A slight chance of showers or an isolated thunderstorm in the early evening... otherwise mostly cloudy in the evening becoming partly cloudy. Minimum temperature 38 to 46. Max RH recovery 75-85%. Winds northwest 5-10 mph gusts to 15 mph on the ridges becoming light and variable after midnight. Slope winds mainly southwest to northwest 4-8 mph in the evening becoming downslope to 5 mph after midnight.

Extended forecast for Wednesday: Skies clearing. Warmer with highs 73 to 79. Min RH 19-25% Ridge winds becoming northwest to northeast 5-10 mph gusts to 15 mph in the afternoon. Slope winds becoming upslope 4-8 gusts to 12 mph in the afternoon.

Extended forecast for Thursday: Fair Skies. Temperatures warming. Highs 78 to 84. Ridge winds southeast 3-8 mph in the morning becoming west in the afternoon 6-12 gusts to 20 mph. Slope winds downslope 1-5 mph in the morning becoming upslope mainly southwest to northwest 4-8 gusts to 12 mph.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

INPUTS:

- **Fuels:** Increased humidity and cloudiness will reduce fine fuel availability and fuel temperature.
- **Topography:** Slopes with higher fuel loading will continue to support fire movement.
- **Inversion:** should lift by noon.

FIRE BEHAVIOR: Fire behavior should be mild with higher humidity, lower temps and cloud cover. The fire will continue to make short runs in receptive fuel beds. Lines will be tested with the predicted Northwest wind. Be aware of alignment for East west oriented drainages.

DIV A/C/E/F: Fire behavior will be mild. The fire will continue to creep and back throughout the entire western flank. Some slope runs are possible.

DIV G/I/K: Expect containment lines to be tested due to the predicted Northwest winds. The fire could potentially make runs based on alignment and topography.

DIV X/V/Q/M: Fire spread will be minimal on the division.

EAST ST Group: Be prepared for the predicted Northwest wind.

Eliminate the hazards with qualified sawyers and modify suppression tactics or fireline location to avoid high risk areas. Always provide timely feedback to others regarding any hazard trees.



Social media posts can reflect on the professionalism of your crew, your agency and Wildland Firefighting Community. The U.S. Forest Service has enjoyed a reputation as the world leader in wildland firefighting for over 100 years. Protect our legacy with good conduct on the fireline and online. When assigned to a federal fire you are considered a federal employee under the delegation of authority. Even if you are a contractor, AD or from a partner agency we recommend you follow these ethics guidelines which apply to federal employees all the time.

Think before you post:

- On official time, do official duties; if using government equipment, do government business.
- Don't use your official position/title for private gain.
- Do share government information that is publicly available (such as links to Inciweb, weather reports, feature stories, official evacuation notices etc.).
- Do not disclose (via any medium) non-public information to further private interests or the private interests of others.
- Do not share information outside official channels that could be associated with a crime or a claim, (for instance do not post on social media about serious accidents, deaths or destroyed property).
- Do not accept compensation for statements made over social media that relate to official duties.
- Never use your official title while engaging in "political activity" (activity directed toward the success or failure of a political party, partisan candidate or partisan political group).
- Federal employees may express their opinions concerning partisan political candidates and political parties on social media when they are off duty and away from the federal workplace.
- If you have questions about content you'd like to post on social media, contact a PIO, they can help you.

STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES—FINANCE SECTION

WORK REST CYCLE

IT IS NATIONAL DIRECTION TO MEET 2 TO 1 WORK/REST RATIO (1 hour of sleep/rest for every 2 hours of work). Every effort shall be made to manage work hours so you don't exceed the maximum of 16 hrs. Work hours exceeding 16 hours shall be approved by your supervisor in advance, and a justification/mitigation form completed for review by Section Chief & approved by IC. It is each person's responsibility to comply with this direction to manage for fatigue and safety.

OPERATIONAL SHIFTS

Pay status for assigned overhead and crews on the fire-line will not start prior to the posted briefing time and will terminate on arrival back in camp (except for debriefing—additional hours may be accrued by those required to attend debriefing). Supervisors will be allowed ½ hour prior to briefing and after return to camp to ready crew and equipment.

DUTY STATUS

Division/Group supervisors and Unit Leaders are responsible for establishing on and off duty status. The objective is a 2 to 1 work/rest ratio. Personnel will normally work, travel, and/or be placed on ORDERED standby 8 to 16 hours per day and be off duty 8 hours or more (breaks count towards 8 hrs). Off duty time will be in a non-pay status. Each federal employee is guaranteed **at least 8 hours** of pay status each 24-hour period (midnight to midnight) unless it is the first or last day of an assignment or stated otherwise in a contract or agreement.

PERSONNEL/EQUIPMENT TIME REPORTING

Personnel time will be reported to the Time Unit and daily once they are signed by the next level supervisor. OES resources will be monitored by OES Agency Rep (if assigned) for 2/1 Work Rest compliance. Situations entitling you to HAZARD PAY are to be noted in remarks (ie. HP=Uncontrolled Fireline, hovering hookups, low level flights, etc.)

Private Contracted Equipment time must be tracked on a Shift Ticket daily and hours on shift noted even if it is a daily rate. When swapping out operators you need to notify Finance as well as changing from single to double shift and vice versa.

Supervisor's - If you are responsible for daily tracking of equipment or personnel, please ensure you understand the agreement, and follow the rules provided in this document. Do not sign documents for resources you did not manage unless you have knowledge of their assignment hours.

MEAL AND OTHER WORK BREAKS

Compensable meal periods are the exception, not the rule (5 CFR 551.411 © and 29 CFR 785.19(a)). **Until the fire is controlled**, personnel on the fire-line **MAY BE** compensated for meal periods if all of the following conditions are met: 1) The fire is not controlled and 2) The Operations Section Chief makes a decision that it is critical to the effort of controlling the fire that personnel remain at their post of duty and continue to work as they eat, and 3) The compensable meal break is approved by the supervisor at the next level and documented on CTR. For personnel in support positions, and fire-line personnel **after control** of a fire, a meal period of at least 30 minutes must be ordered and taken for each work shift of eight hours or more. In those situations where personnel cannot be relieved from work and must remain at a post of duty, a meal period may be counted as time worked, which will be compensable. **If breaks are NOT able to be taken, CTR should have a statement in remarks explaining the situation.**

CALIFORNIA INTERAGENCY INCIDENT MANAGEMENT TEAM 4 EXPECTATIONS

CONDUCT AND BEHAVIOR

This team is committed to “**ZERO TOLERANCE**” of careless, illegal, inappropriate and unsafe actions.

Alcohol and/or illegal drugs are **NOT allowed** within the incident environment or while actively assigned to the incident. Local Law Enforcement Officials will be called to deal with any suspected illegal activities. Each employee has the responsibility to be ready, willing, and able to perform the duties for which they are qualified.

Sexual Harassment

Inappropriate actions or comments will not be tolerated. Everyone is expected to act in a professional manner. It is your responsibility to stop inappropriate actions or comments immediately upon becoming aware of such. Sexual Harassment must be reported to the Human Resource Specialist or Incident Commander. When outside of your designated sleeping area, you are required to wear at least a shirt, appropriate shorts, and shoes or sandals. If you need clarification of these expectations contact the Human Resource Specialist or IC. What we PERMIT we PROMOTE!!!!

SAFETY

The commitment to and accountability for safety is a joint responsibility of firefighters, managers and administrators. Individuals must personally be committed and responsible for their own performance and accountability. Everyone assigned to this incident can expect an assignment that follows all safety rules & regulations. Every person is expected to perform his or her duties in compliance with all known safety practices at all times. Anything less is unacceptable.

EMPHASIS AREAS

Training

All trainees and trainers are expected to follow the procedures outlined in the California Interagency Incident Management Team 4 **Training Expectations – See back page.**

Evaluations

All supervisory personnel assigned will complete an ICS 225 Incident Personnel Performance Rating form for their assigned resources according to agency policy or contractual agreement.

Injuries/Claims

Ensure all injuries and potential claims are reported to the Comp/Claims Unit for completion of appropriate paperwork. Contract claims will be reported to the Procurement Unit Leader.

Work Rest Cycles

The 2: 1 work/rest ratio is mandatory. For every two hours on shift you will be required to rest for one hour. Every effort shall be used to limit work hours to a maximum of 16. If circumstances require you to exceed 16 hours, this needs to be coordinated in advance with your supervisor and the Justification/Mitigation form completed to support the excessive hours prior to submitting for approval by the IC. It is your responsibility to comply with this direction and provide the appropriate documentation to your Supervisor and Finance.

Position Qualifications

Personnel shall only be assigned to positions for which they are qualified. Proof of qualifications shall be approved prior to being assigned to any fire line position. Non-fireline positions may be filled based on the word of the employee pending home unit confirmation, which must be requested immediately. Contract dozer operators, tactical water tender operators and contract fallers must provide proof that they have received the annual fire refresher training.

Engagement/Disengagement

The 10 Standard Orders & 18 Watchout Situations will be followed at all times and mitigated as needed. Staying aware of your situation is critical. This includes Geographic Area and incident briefings. Follow the Risk Management Process outlined in the Incident Response Pocket Guide.

Debriefing

All Branch Directors/Division/Group Supervisors will report to their Supervisor and Situation Unit at the end of the operational period for debriefing with emphasis on the accomplishment of objectives. All unit logs (ICS 214) will be turned in after the debriefing to Documentation reflecting accomplishment and/or special incidents that occurred during the operational period.

Crew Time Reports/Shift Tickets

It is your responsibility to ensure all time is properly accounted for and recorded each shift. The records are to be reviewed and signed by the next level supervisor. A finance "Rules of Engagement" document will be provided in the IAP explaining further requirements.

Social Media

It is your responsibility to know and understand guidelines for firefighter photography, video and social media use. California Interagency Incident Management Team 4 goal is simple: to participate online in a respectful, relevant way that protects our incident's professional reputation, does not confuse the public about the incident and follows the letter and spirit of the law. Be mindful that social media postings can be viewed as unprofessional, damage careers and lead to disciplinary actions. For further information, contact the Public Information Officer.

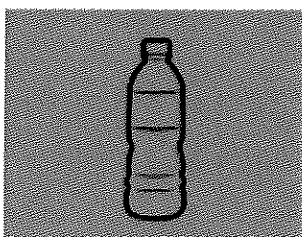
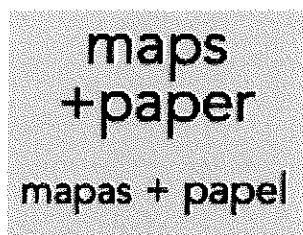

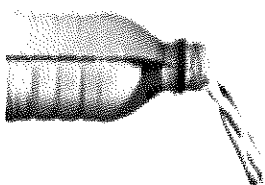
