It's Going to Get Hotter and Drier

- Will Exceed Thresholds for High Fire Danger
 - Live Fuel Moisture of 100% Means Extreme Fire Behavior per Modoc NF Fire OPS Guide
 - Temperature and RH values will exceed Local Pocket
 Card Thresholds for High Fire Danger
- Engage any IA with Caution and a Good Size Up

Mop-up and Patrol

- Watch for Fatigue and Complacency
 - Take a break and refocus on the task
- Use proper body mechanics to avoid injury
- Maintain LCES, be aware of light flashy fuels and any wind that may affect fire behavior

Hydration

- With the heat and low RH maintaining proper hydration is difficult yet VERY important
- Consider drinking water and sports drink at a 2:1 ratio

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

An upper level ridge is building over the fire area today. The air mass is cooler and stable today. Temperatures are expected to be down 2-4 degrees but the humidity will be similar or even a little lower than Sunday. Warming and some drying will occur Tuesday and Wednesday as the upper level ridge strengthens over the region. By late Wednesday and Thursday moisture will increase aloft leading to a chance of isolated thunderstorms once again. Should thunderstorms develop later this week...they will be on the dry side. Be on the lookout for gusty and erratic winds should thunderstorms develop.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Sunny and a little cooler.

CHANCE OF WETTING RAIN: 0 percent

LAL: 1

Temperatures/Relative Humidity: Maximum temperatures 84-87 lower slopes and valley...79-83 upper slopes. Minimum relative humidity 9-13 percent.

Eve-level Winds: south to southeast 4-8 mph shifting to southwest to west 8-12 mph after 2 pm.

Stability/Inversion: Weak inversion below 6000 feet...lifting after 10 am with mixing heights to 15,000 feet in the afternoon.

TONIGHT: Clear overnight. Lows 49-53. Humidity recoveries 45-55 percent. Winds southwest to west 5-10 mph with gusts to 15 mph in the evening, decreasing to 2-6 mph after 10 pm.

OUTLOOK FOR NEXT SHIFT: Tuesday...Sunny, warm and dry. High temperatures 88-92 lower slopes and valleys...84-87 upper slopes. Lowest humidity 8-12%. Light southeast to south winds in the morning...shifting to the west to southwest 6-12 mph in the afternoon.

EXTENDED FORECAST: Wednesday...Sunny...turning partly cloudy in the afternoon. Slight chance of late afternoon and evening thunderstorms. High temperatures 89-93 lower slopes and valleys...86-89 upper slopes. Lowest humidity 9-13%. Light upslope winds in the morning...shifting to the west southwest 6-12 mph in the afternoon.

Thursday...Mostly sunny to partly cloudy with a chance of late day thunderstorms. High temperatures 85-88 lower slopes and valleys...80-84 upper slopes. Lowest humidity 12-17%. Light upslope winds in the morning... shifting to the west southwest 6-12 mph in the afternoon.

Weather observations on or near the fire Sunday: Maximum Temperatures 86-90, Lowest Humidity 12-16%. Winds southeast to south 5-10 mph shifting to south to southwest

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL:

The weather over the fire area has begun to recover from the slight cooling effect of the low pressure trough that moved through. Fuels will respond quickly from the warming trend that is starting. If new starts occur fire behavior will be moderate under the forecast winds. Rate of spread of up to 25-84 ch/hr could occur in the grass and sage, with flame lengths up to 6-10 feet. The probability of ignition is calculated at 87%. On Tuesday and Wednesday potential fire behavior could increase with the increase with forecasted winds. Rates of Spread up to 66 ch/hr could occur, with Behave predictions showing potentially higher rates. Flame lengths will likely be near 4-6 feet, again with Behave showing greater outputs, at 9 to 15 feet and the probability of ignition is calculated at 87%.

Live fuel moistures in the sage brush remain at 100%. The 1 hr fuel moistures calculate a range of 3-7%.

Thunderstorm activity will present itself again starting Wednesday. Be aware of thunderstorm development and the possibility of winds associated with these storms. Wind can rapidly increase fire behavior.

Remember that fine fuels can change rapidly with conditions. Even if it rains cured grass can become available to burn quickly, this can be sped up by wind and/or a dry air mass.


SPECIFIC: Annie Fire- The chance for fire behavior inside the fire perimeter has been greatly reduced by the suppression effort, spotting presents the most significant problem on the fire. Where dust devils or thunderstorm winds interact with the fire area there is the possibility of lofting embers causing spotting.

IA- For resources responding during initial attack. In the grass fuel types with an increase in wind to 12 mph, rates of spread can reach 84 ch/hr on slopes near 30%; flame lengths can reach 10 feet on these same locations. Conifer stand fuels at the higher elevations will continue to resist aggressive burning. When starts happen in these fuels rates of spread may achieve 8 ch/hr and flame lengths will be 2 feet.

AIR OPERATIONS: Smoke should not be a problem for air operations.

SAFETY

Know when fire behavior is going to challenge your suppression tactics and be flexible to alter tactics or strategy based on current and expected fire behavior. If fire behavior will exceed the line production capability of your organization and you have ordered additional resources, seek opportunities to positively affect the suppression effort and build a plan for what you have ordered.

If air or ground ambulance is DELAYED:

Package and transport patient to rendezvous with Ambulance. Re-route EMS helicopter to rendezvous point as appropriate.

If Declaring an "Incident within the Incident"

The closest supervisor will respond to manage the incident. They are responsible for giving an accurate size-up, ensuring scene safety, setting priorities and initiating an appropriate response. Any Safety Officer or Line EMS will respond to the scene to assist in patient care. In the case of an accident, secure the site and begin initial investigation when the situation stabilizes.

The 5-D System for Effective Waterbars

When locating and building waterbars, place them the right **distance** apart, at a **diagonal** to the fireline, so that they **divert**, then **discharge**, then **dissipate** the energy of the flowing water. Be sure to make them deep enough so they'll be durable, and that soil does **not block** the water bar outlet.

Recommended spacing for waterbars on firelines.

Fireline slope		Maximum Distance Apart (feet)
1-5		200
6 - 20		125
21 - 40	***************************************	60
41 - 60		40
>60		25

Waterbars should be at least 2 pulaski widths wide and 12-24 inches high.
