**3. Objective(s):**

**Leaders Intent**

An aggressive full suppression strategy will be implemented for the Beckwourth Complex. Efforts will be made to minimize impacts to residences, critical infrastructure and surrounding communities through the application of well-planned tactical responses. Only critical Stage 1 fire suppression repair will be completed at this time.

- Management Objectives**
- Ensure that strategies and tactics provide for firefighter and public safety through the application of sound risk management principles.
  - Minimize the threat to private property, communities, businesses, and critical infrastructure.
  - Establish and strengthen cooperator, partner, and stakeholder relationships.
  - Follow identified standard procedures to minimize the spread of COVID-19.
  - Minimize the cost of the incident by employing tactics that have the highest probability of success while minimizing firefighter exposure.
- Control Objectives**
- Keep the fire north of Highway 70 to minimize the impacts on commerce and travel along the Highway 70 corridor.
  - Keep the fire south and west of 395 with an emphasis on protecting residences, ranchland, and critical infrastructure.
  - Keep the fire east of Beckwourth Milford Road to protect the community of Portola, grazing allotments, and recreational values.

**General Situational Awareness:**

Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry and receptive fuel beds, active area for fire history and drought stressed trees.

In the COVID-19 environment, high density populations or large groups are particularly at risk. To help protect yourself, your family and to ensure all employees return home safely, make sure to practice social distancing.

Enhanced hygiene (especially handwashing), PPE & monitoring practices help limit the infection rate of first responders.

**...Red Flag Warning for Dry Lightning & Outflow Winds in Effect Until 11 AM Monday...**

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** Monsoon moisture will increase today bringing a chance of thunderstorms to the fire complex today through this evening, then clearing skies overnight. Some storms may produce frequent lightning as well as strong downdrafts and outflow winds. Any thunderstorms in the morning may be dry then more likely becoming wet in the afternoon and evening. There is potential for rain across the complex, but a more likely threat is from lightning and outflow winds. Temperatures will be a little lower today while humidity will be higher. The general wind will continue to be southwesterly with afternoon gusts to around 25 mph, but remember that strong and erratic winds are possible from thunderstorms many miles away.

**WEATHER FORECAST for MONDAY:**

**WEATHER:** Red Flag Warning for dry lightning and outflow winds until 11am. LAL: 3  
Partly cloudy. A 30% chance of thunderstorms, mainly afternoon and evening.  
Areas of smoke and haze.

**TEMPERATURES:** Valleys/Lower Slopes: 84-94° Mid-Slopes/Ridges: 78-88°

**HUMIDITY:** 17-27% **HAINES INDEX:** 3

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP** - Southwest 5-10 mph increasing to 10-15 mph by afternoon. Gusts to around 25 mph.

**SLOPE/VALLEY** - Upslope/upvalley 2-8 mph in the morning, becoming west southwest 7-14 mph with gusts near 25 mph in the afternoon. **Strong, erratic outflow winds possible.**

**STABILITY/INVERSION:** Weak stability in the morning, inversion around 5800', lifting late morning.

**WEATHER FORECAST for MONDAY NIGHT:**

**WEATHER:** Partly cloudy. A 30% chance of thunderstorms in the evening. LAL: 3  
Areas of smoke and haze.

**TEMPERATURES:** Valleys/Lower Slopes: 50-65° Mid-Slopes/Ridges: 60-70°  
(Warmest along mid-slopes in thermal belt)

**HUMIDITY:** Valleys/Lower Slopes: 45-65% Mid-Slopes/Ridges: 40-50%  
(Lowest along mid-slopes in thermal belt)

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP** - Southwest 10-15 mph with gusts to around 25 mph in the early evening, gradually decreasing after sunset to southwest 5-10 mph.

**SLOPE/VALLEY** - West southwest 7-14 mph with gusts to 25 mph in the evening becoming downslope/downvalley 1-6 mph. **Strong, erratic outflow winds possible.**

**STABILITY/INVERSION:** Becoming more stable overnight with inversion developing after midnight.

**OUTLOOK for Tuesday through Thursday:** A small (<10%) chance of isolated thunderstorms each day. Little change in temperatures while humidity trends lower. Gusty winds developing each afternoon / evening.

## INPUTS

**WEATHER SUMMARY:** ...Red Flag Warning for Lightning & Outflow Winds...

Temperature: 84-98 daytime, 45-65 overnight with 60-70 in the Thermal Belts RH: 9-19% daytime, 30-55% overnight  
Ridge-top Winds: SW 6-12 increasing to 10-15 gusts to 25 mph by afternoon  
Valley/Slope Winds: Terrain Driven 4-8 mph, SW 7-14 by afternoon. Overnight WNW 7-14 mph decreasing to 1-6 mph in the night with possible thunderstorm outflow winds.

Outflow winds can be erratic and very strong. With mop-up incomplete, these winds pose the greatest threat to the line; watch for developing cumulus clouds as an early indicator of escape potential. Outflow winds at night can cause undetected spotting, as thermal belts will remain receptive.

## OUTPUTS

### FIRE BEHAVIOR

#### GENERAL:

1000 hr fuel moisture is 7%. This is driving significant ERCs with frequent historic records. Live fuels are critical for most species and are available to burn. The fire has the potential to burn up to 3-4 miles in the direction of spread when aligned with wind. If it becomes plume dominated it will then spread through aggressive flanking from pyrocumulus outflow winds. Forecasted thunderstorms carry the same risks as outflow winds from pyrocumulus. Thunderstorms are expected to impact the fire area after midnight.

Probability of ignition will run about 80-100% depending on aspect and shading. As the weather develops and cloud cover forms, PIG will drop to 50% on shaded aspects late in the day.

#### SPECIFIC:

**Divisions I:** This division will experience potentially the most adverse winds. Where the line makes a dog-leg to the east just above Ramelli Creek will be a focal point of the SW wind pressure and spot potential. Incomplete burning, burned-through retardant, and on-going mop-up operations continue to have vulnerabilities at this location. Any outflow winds from thunderstorms will further challenge containment. Escape in this area will result in high flame lengths and substantial rates of spread with spotting up to ½ mile.

**All other Divisions:** These divisions will experience mostly favorable winds. Complete burns in most division have reduced threats to the line. Securing and moping up the rest of the perimeter has eliminated significant threats to the remainder of the fire area.

#### AIR OPERATIONS:

Air operations will have clear skies and no operational limits on timing of missions. Turbulence may affect operations late in the shift as weather develops with cumulus buildup.

## SAFETY

Watch for fire-weakened trees and the effect of gusty winds. Outflow winds may threaten lines and challenge containment. Plan and for watch for stump holes and other hazards during mop-up operations. Initiate lightning safety protocols if hazards develop.

**Careful attention to these five “Rights” will limit unnecessary exposure to hazards!**

1. Have the **Right Plan**: Develop a plan based on reasonable objectives least amount of fire fighter exposure possible.
2. The **Right Place**: Engage the fire in a location that has the highest probability for success.
3. The **Right Time**: Attack the fire at times of favorable weather conditions that allow efficient and effective suppression efforts.
4. The **Right Assets**: Only use those suppression assets that are needed to safely implement tactics in support of reasonable objectives.
5. The **Right Duration**: Release assets as soon as they are no longer needed to accomplish the goals of the plan to reduce exposure duration.

**Fire Fighter Fatigue**: Please continue to get enough rest. Take plenty of breaks and please continue to stay hydrated by drinking plenty of water. Ensure that all fire fighters meet the 2:1 work to rest ratio. Watch out for signs of fatigue in other fire fighters around you.

**Remember... Be alert. Keep calm. Think clearly. Act decisively.**

**Demobilizing Resources**: Remain focused on what you are doing. Drive defensively and burn your headlights while traveling to increase your visibility to other drivers. Be on the offensive and look be on the lookout for aggressive travelers. Pull over to a safe location to make phone calls or send text messages.

## **Covid-19**

- Be Smart! Stay Apart! Maintain CDC social distancing guidelines when feasible
- Practice good hygiene. Wash hands often and avoid touching your face
- Cover your nose and mouth with a facial covering and cough into your elbow if needed

## **Snags**

*Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical Incident, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."*
