3. Objective(s):

Leaders Intent:

- An aggressive full suppression strategy will be implemented for the Monument Fire. Efforts will be made to minimize impacts for residences, critical infrastructure, commercial timberland and surrounding communities through the application of well-planned tactical responses.

Management Objectives:

- Ensure that strategies and tactics provide for firefighter and public safety through the application of sound risk management principles.
- Minimize the threat to private property, communities, businesses and critical infrastructure.
- Establish and strengthen cooperators, partner and stakeholder relationships.
- Follow identified standard procedures to minimize the spread of COVID-19.
- Communicate effectively and often with the public and surrounding communities.
- Minimize the cost of the incident by employing tactics that have the highest probability of success while minimizing firefighter exposure.

Control Objectives

- Keep the fire North of 47 Rd and 60 Rd to protect private property, private timberlands and communities of Hayfork and Hyampom.
- Keep the fire South of Siskiyou and Trinity County line, while preserving wilderness characteristics.
- Keep the fire East of 60 Rd and New River to protect communities of Denny and Burnt Ranch.
- Keep the fire West of the North Fork of Trinity River and Sailor Bar Creek to preserve wilderness characteristics and communities of Junction City, Coopers Bar and Red Hill.

4. General Situational Awareness:

- Diurnal winds will continue to challenge suppression efforts..... see attached Spot Weather Forecast.
- Be prepared for very active to extreme fire behavior with long-range spotting.
- The fire is burning in the 2008 Cedar Fire footprint; be extra aware of snags and hazard trees.



WEATHER DISCUSSION

Very **HOT** and **DRY** conditions continue. There is a slight chance of **DRY THUNDERSTORMS** Thursday morning through Friday as weak monsoonal moisture pushes through the region. Surface winds will remain terrain driven, with up canyon winds in the late afternoon and early evening gusting up to 20 mph in the Trinity River Canyon. Ridge level winds will continue to shift directions during today, southeast ridge level/transport winds early in the day, and northwest late the day are the most likely directions.

WEDNESDAY:

WEATHER: Sunny, smoky.
 MAX TEMPERATURES: 95-105°F **Heat Advisory in effect**
 MIN HUMIDITY: 8-14%.
 20 FT WINDS: Ridges: Southeast 4 to 8 mph with gusts up to 12 mph, becoming northwest 4 to 8 with gusts up to 12 in the very late afternoon/early evening.
 Drainages: Upcanyon 2 to 5 mph in the morning becoming 6 to 8 mph with gusts up to 20 mph in the Trinity River Canyon during the late afternoon.

 MIXING HEIGHT: 100-400 ft AGL increasing to 13,000 ft AGL in the early afternoon.

THUNDERSTORM OUTLOOK

Dry thunderstorms will be possible as early as Thursday morning, through Friday. Early development on Thursday morning is unlikely (5%), but it is not zero. Storms become more likely (15%) on Thursday with afternoon heating. The most likely development area will be along the higher terrain of the Trinity Alps, but storms could also develop to the south and move towards the fire area.

Main hazards - Lightning and gusty outflow winds. Keep an eye on the sky and look for signs of virga (rain that isn't reaching the ground) for the potential for gusty and erratic outflow winds.

Expect poor smoke dispersion before the inversion breaks by late in the morning. Mixing heights start out at less than 400 feet; rise to 13,000 feet with daytime heating; then return to less than 400 feet after sunset. Anticipate terrain induced turbulence in the Trinity River corridor, especially during peak hours of afternoon heating.

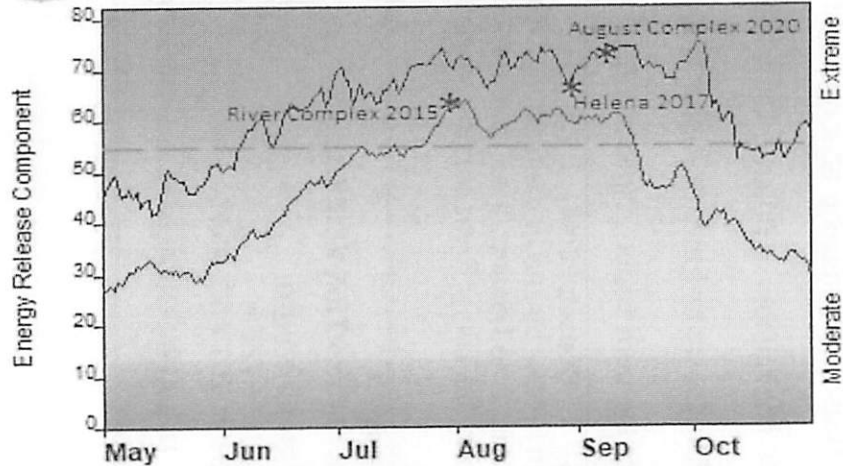

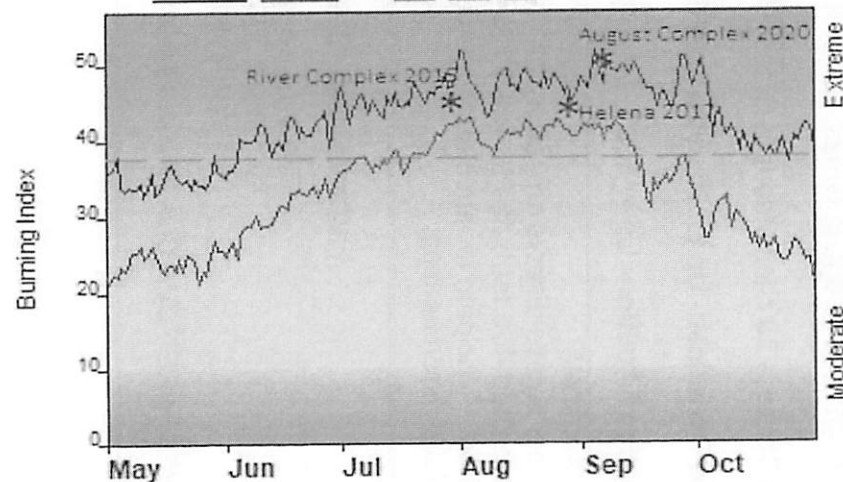
FIRE DANGER -- SHF West Side

Maximum, Average, and 62nd Percentile, based on 15 years of data



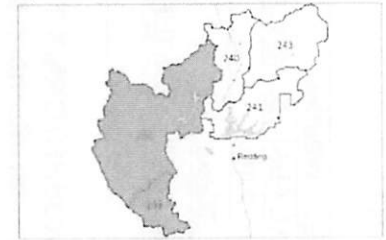

Fire Danger Interpretation

- Extreme – Use extreme caution
- High – Watch for Change
- Moderate – Low Potential, maintain awareness



- Maximum – Highest Daily Value 2006-2020
- Average – Shows average index values over 15 years, peaks in this line indicate the peak of fire season – running from mid-July through mid September in an average year.
- 66th Percentile ERC (dashed line upper left) – 34% of days from 2006-2020 had ERC above 55
- 62nd Percentile BI (dashed line lower left) – 38% of days from 2006-2020 had BI above 38

Remember What Fire Danger Tells You:

- ✓ Energy Release Component (ERC) - Wind is NOT part of ERC calculation (Upper Left)
 - Represents overall seasonal trend – driven by heavy dead & live fuel moistures.
- ✓ Burning Index (BI) - Wind IS part of BI calculation (Lower Left)
 - Represents day-to-day fluctuations – driven by fine dead moisture and wind
- ✓ Fire danger is general - Look for local variations in fuels, topography & weather
- ✓ Listen to weather forecasts!



Past Experience:

- Large fire growth may occur without significant wind due to fuels and topography. The 2015 River complex grew steadily in this manner, driven by fuels and topography, with limited large growth driven by critical weather.
- Local winds often not captured by RAWS due to highly variable terrain and canyon influences. Diurnal canyon winds often dominate in main stem and South Fork of the Trinity River. Helena (2017) exemplifies this as a human caused start driven by canyon winds that were not well captured by the BI at RAWS across the 2 FDRAs.
- Dry lightning events are a frequent driver of multi-fire days and may not coincide with the thresholds below (River Complex 2015). Numerous fires overwhelm initial attack capacity, large growth may occur days to weeks after initial ignition. Nearly 60% of ignitions in period analyzed resulted from lightning.
- August Complex (2020) resulted from a major dry lightning event, similar to 2015. The complex burned onto SHF and experienced massive growth during multiple offshore wind events post-ignition. The date of largest growth on September 8th - 9th during one such offshore event is shown, not ignition date.
- Large fire growth has been observed above these thresholds, frequency of large fires increases beyond these values:



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

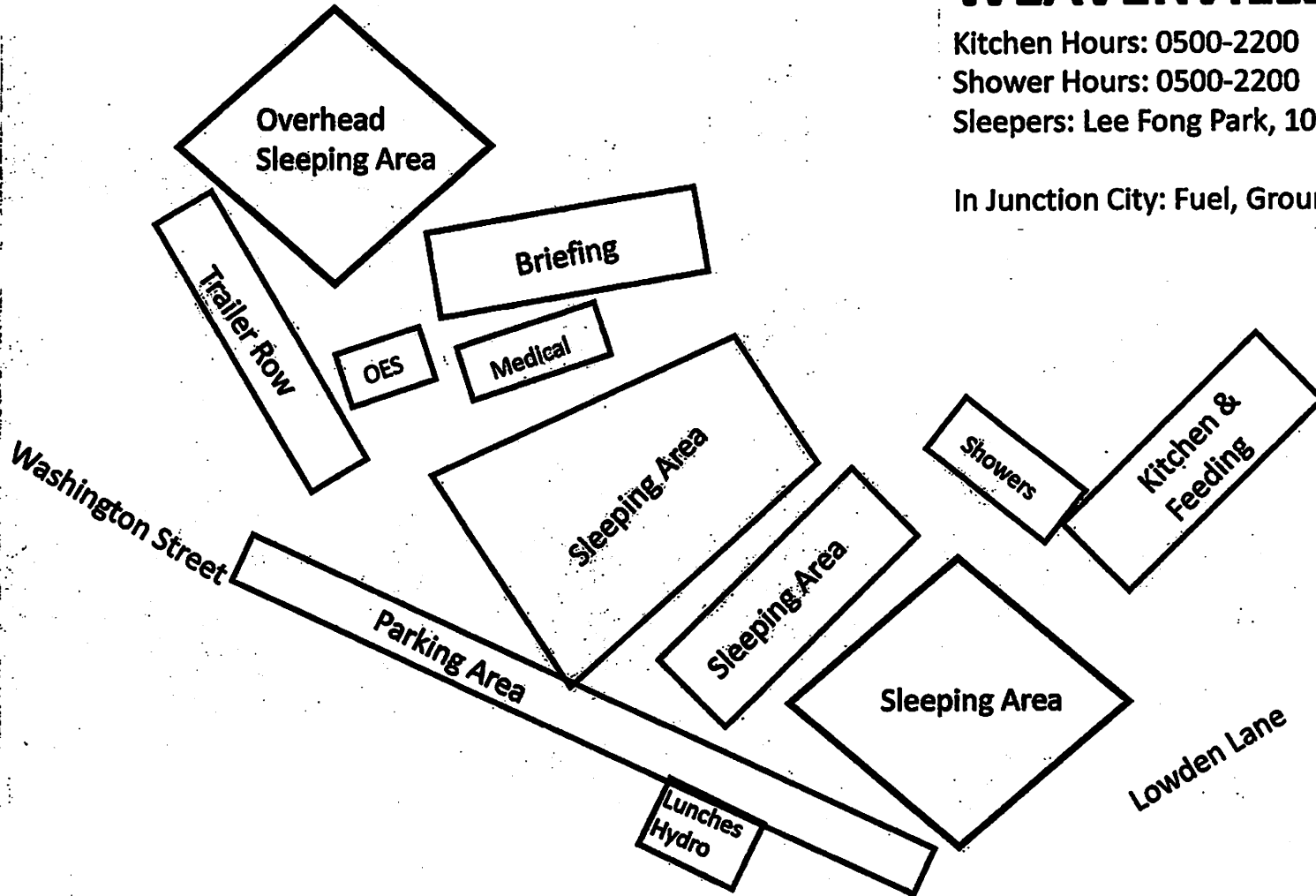
