#### FIRE BEHAVIOR

**GENERAL:** Most of the fire is now in a backing and flanking alignment. The smoke inversion will moderate fire behavior however, if you start to see blue skies expect a dramatic increase in fire intensity. Expect active backing fire some flanking runs and short duration intense head fire runs as the main fire backs into drainage bottoms and aligns with slopes. Fire whirls are probable at intersecting drainages and when the winds transition from upslope to down slope. Make sure lookouts have a good view of the fire, especially since the smoke will limit visibility.  
At night, expect the fire to remain active until about 0300 to 0400hrs.  
With the dry fuels spotting will be problematic it is possible to spot up to 1/4mile and from rollout. If the fire develops a large plume, spotting could increase to 1 mile. 1000hr fuels are at 6-8%FM and are receptive to spots  
Probability of Ignition will be 70-80%  
Expect single and group tree torching and sustained short duration crown runs where slope and winds align.

#### SPECIFIC:

**Branch I:** Expect mainly backing and flanking fire. As the fire progresses east, road systems will help check fire spread. Rollout will challenge containment lines.

**Branch IV:** Fire will continue to actively back to the south. Watch for slope reversals as the fire reaches drainage bottoms. As the wind transitions at night, the potential for head fire runs will increase.

**Branch X:** Main fire progression will be towards Scott Bar and down the Hwy 96 corridor. Rollout will continue to be problematic and challenge any established lines. If skies clear and a plume develops, spotting distances will increase and the river and highway will be compromised.

For all branches, If thunderstorms do develop expect strong out flow winds and erratic fire spread.

**AIR OPERATIONS:** Smoke will limit air operations unless or until the inversion mixes out

### SAFETY

Spotting has been a primary driver of this fire, make sure Lookouts are posted in places where they can potential spotting.



- \***Briefings** – All resources require briefings. Use briefing checklist in pocket guide.
- \***Debrief Actions** – as necessary. Use pocket guide After Action Review to stimulate discussion and provide guidance.
- \***Communicate Hazards to Others** –
- \***Acknowledge messages** –
- \***Ask if you do not know** – Ask questions in unfamiliar situations. The only dumb question is the one you did not ask.

*The greatest problem with communication is the illusion that it has been achieved*

- Immediately separate yourself from others.
- Notify supervisor if you or others experience:

- Review and follow crew and division plans to isolate, triage, and transport symptomatic personnel.

### **Hygiene on the Fireline**

- Maintain a supply of hand sanitizer and hand wipes. Inform supervisor of needed resupply.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often:
  - o Radios, phones, doors, pumps, fuel cans, etc.

### **Social Distancing and Protective Equipment**

- Face covering required indoors due to the current community level of high in Siskiyou County.
- Initiate, practice, and remind others of social distancing.
- Conduct briefings and conversations outdoors and at least 6 feet apart.


