Spot Forecast for SRF Lightning Complex...USFS
National Weather Service Eureka CA

.DISCUSSION...Little change in the fire weather pattern as unsettled weather due to a large low pressure system off the Mendocino Coast drives clouds, showers, isolated thunderstorms and locally gusty winds across much of the area. The greatest threat for storms will occur on Tuesday. Storms will be wet and will likely produce locally heavy rain and perhaps some small hail and gusty outflow winds. Otherwise, below normal temperatures and humid conditions will persist into Wednesday. Drier and warmer conditions are forecast for Thursday and Friday after the storm exits to the east and high pressure builds in from the west. The dry and warmer weather will last into the weekend.

SAFETY MESSAGE

Ensure instructions are clearly understood. Communication is a basic responsibility for all fire personnel. Ask appropriate questions to clarify uncertain issues. **Speak up when you observe hazards that may place you or others at risk.**

Always maintain situational awareness. Awareness is a vital component of Your Safety. Pay attention to what is happening around your area of operations. Always display an awareness of what is happening around you by asking questions or sharing information.

Do not expect someone else to be responsible for your safety. Take it upon yourself to make My Safety your number one priority.

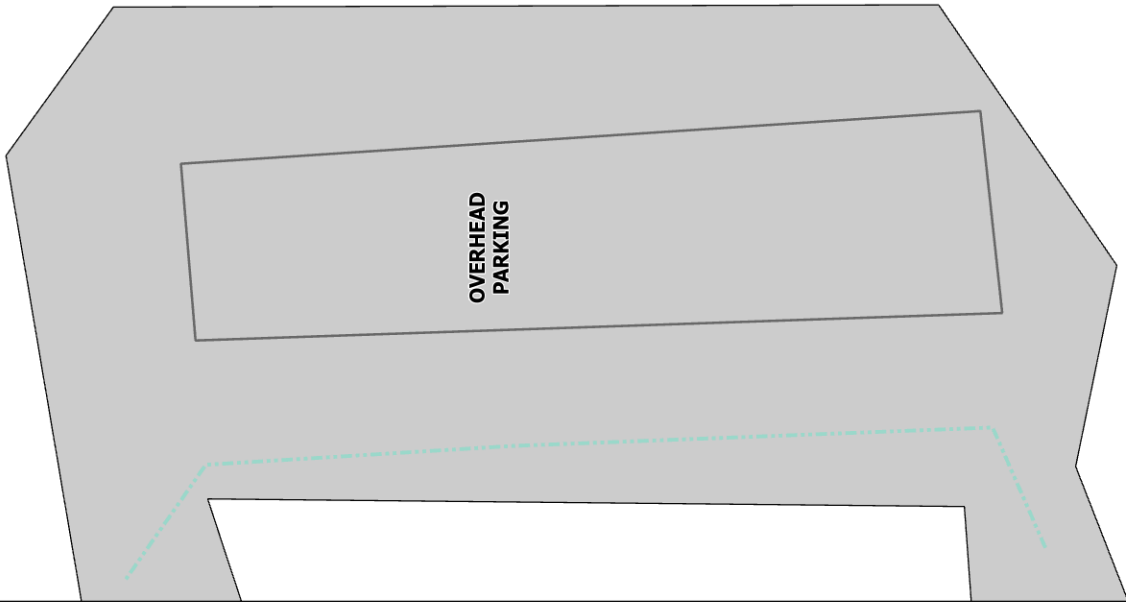

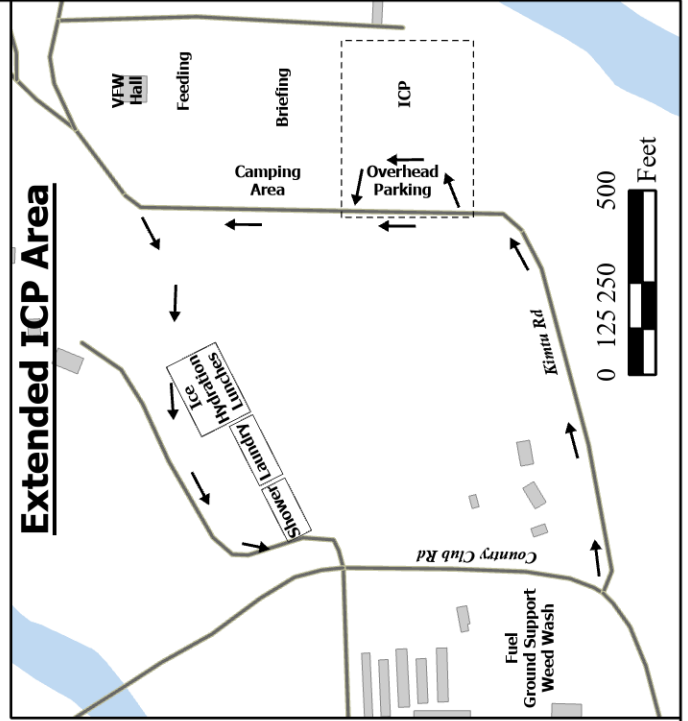

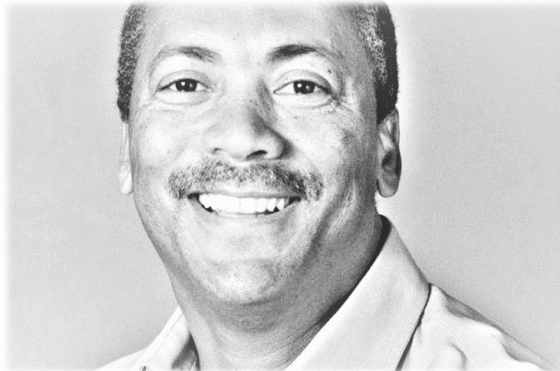
Reporting Harassment

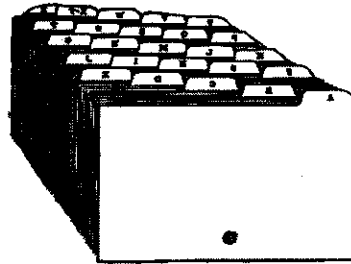

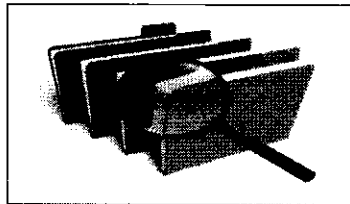
