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**Strategic Direction**

The SRF Lightning Complex is managed with a full suppression strategy. Firefighting resources will follow risk-based decision making and implement tactics that offer the highest probability of success to achieve the strategy of suppressing the fire and restoring suppression related damages while protecting local values.

Values at risk include the safety of the public and firefighters; privately and tribally held timberlands; the communities and outlying areas near Willow Creek, Hawkins Bar, Burnt Ranch, and Salyer; water, transportation, electrical infrastructure as well as natural and cultural resources.

**Leaders' Intent**

Everyone will work as a team to provide the highest level of service and safety while assigned to the incident. All assigned resources will ensure transparent, timely, and accurate communication at all levels of the incident while working to strengthen relationships with each other and with cooperators. All incident personnel should be prepared to take appropriate actions regarding:

- Safety - including the identification and mitigation of hazards to yourself and others.
- Timely and thoughtful risk-based decision making.
- Manage fatigue by taking breaks and maintaining work/rest cycles.
- Professional behavior, conduct, and timely/effective communication.
- Manage health and wellbeing and environmental impacts by following common sense, practicing good hygiene, communicable disease mitigations, and recycling.

**Management Objectives**

- Provide for firefighter and public safety through hazard recognition and application of the risk management process.
- Coordinate public information to provide timely and continuous situation updates to affected agency partners, cooperators, and public.
- Coordinate suppression and repair activities with READs to minimize impacts on natural and cultural resources.
- Effectively manage and track costs for all incidents identified within the SRF Lightning Complex.
- Reduce incident generated waste by encouraging recycling throughout the incident.

**Control Objectives**

Prevent the fire from spreading to private property, surrounding communities and values at risk.

**Campbell Fire**

- Keep the fire within the current perimeter.

**Ammon Fire**

- Keep the fire within the current perimeter.

**DISCUSSION:** High surface relative humidity along with scattered showers and isolated wet thunderstorm is being observed across NW CA again today. Storms have and will continue to be wet, producing locally heavy rain and perhaps some small hail and gusty outflow winds. The upper low that has been meandering about SW of Cape Mendocino will finally move northeastward over the area on Wednesday. Thus, more showers and isolated thunderstorm will occur again Wednesday afternoon, followed by a trend of drier conditions for Thursday as the low moves eastward and high pressure builds toward the coast. A warming trend will begin on Friday and high temperatures will rise above normal this weekend.

## SAFETY MESSAGE

With this incident winding down **driving** home or to new incident will be one of the most hazardous things we do. Based on recent accident trends, vehicle accidents are the source of more deaths and serious injuries to wildland firefighters than any other single cause.

Take a good, hard look at your driving habits. Are you training yourself to do the right things the right way, like fastening your seat belt, checking your mirrors, and maintaining safe following distances?

Inattentiveness is a major contributing factor in motor vehicle accidents within the wildland firefighting community. Since the average adult attention span is 15 to 20 minutes, we must develop techniques that allow us to refocus our attention on our driving.

Many things can lure our attention away from our driving: fatigue, eating / drinking, reading directions or maps, writing, cell phone / radio use, conversation within the vehicle, and music.

Drive only when you are well-rested and alert, avoid driving during the hours from 2200-0600. Take a 10-15-minute break after every 2 hours of driving.

Practice situational awareness be aware of what is happening in front, behind, and on both sides of your vehicle.

Never drive when taking medications that make you drowsy.

Delegate navigation and communication to a passenger or pull over.

By constantly moving your vision, checking mirrors and distant road conditions, you can avoid highway hypnosis and daydreaming.

When talking with passengers, keep your eyes on the road and both hands on the steering wheel. Avoid serious or argumentative conversations.

Switch off driving with others if multiple people are in the vehicle.

Do not be in a hurry; be patient.

Safe driving starts with a safe vehicle. Before operating any vehicle, do a walk-around to look for potential problems, make sure the lights and blinkers work, and adjust your seat and mirrors. If it is the first time you have driven the vehicle, make yourself aware of where everything
