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**3. Objective(s):**

- Management Objectives**
- Provide for the safety of firefighters and the public through utilization of strategic and deliberate risk assessment processes. Ensure incident within an incident protocols are established.
  - Develop and implement operational objectives based on identified values at risk and highest probability of success limiting fire spread.
  - Follow established guidelines and mitigations regarding COVID and other infectious diseases.
  - Enhance relationships through timely communication and active involvement with the public, stakeholders, and cooperators.
  - Coordinate with the READ's to ensure natural, cultural, and historical values are protected.
  - Maintain fiscal responsibility keeping cost commensurate with the values at risk.
  - Provide initial attack response to new fire starts within the TFR boundary. Assist with initial attack efforts outside the boundary as requested.

- Control Objectives**
- Keep the fire North of Keysville while providing for structure defense where appropriate.
  - Keep the fire out of the communities of Alta Sierra and Wofford Heights and south of the Way Burn Scar.
  - Keep the fire East of Granite Road while providing for structure defense where appropriate.
  - Keep the fire West of Wofford Blvd (Highway 155) while providing for structure defense where appropriate.

**General Situational Awareness:**

Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry and receptive fuel beds, active area for fire history and drought stressed trees with historic mining in the area.

All persons must wear a mask indoors at all times regardless of vaccinated status, as well as outdoors when physical distancing cannot be maintained.

Maintain a module of one, wash your hands, and sanitize surfaces.

**Weather Discussion:** For today, expect slightly warmer and drier conditions that yesterday. Below 5500 ft, afternoon humidity will drop into the teens. Above 5500 ft, the lowest humidity will occur in the morning, with humidity rising above 20% during the afternoon. Light southeast winds in the morning will become breezy westerly winds after 1500.

For tonight, light ridgetop winds will develop after 2300, with typical downslope/down-valley winds within drainages. Expect poor overnight humidity recoveries at all elevations. Above 5500 ft, the highest humidity will occur around 0300, and then drop to around 14% by 0900. Below 5500 ft, the highest humidity will occur during the early morning hours like normal.

The warming and drying trend will continue on Tuesday and Wednesday.

### FUELS:

Fire areas include a range of conifer systems in the upper elevations above 5000', transitioning into scrub oak, sage, and annual grasses on the eastern slope down to Lake Isabella. Anticipate heavy fuel loading, drought stress, bug kill, and a lack of fire history to the west of the fire, with a mix of Ponderosa Pine, White Fir, and Incense Cedar.

The area is currently classified as 'Exceptional' drought by the US Drought Monitor, with Energy Release Components exceeding the 90<sup>th</sup> percentile, not far off all time high levels. Heavy dead and down fuels will likely burn completely, holding heat and actively consuming through all hours of the day. Fine dead fuel moisture is calculated at 3% or less.

### Specific

**Div. A** The flank that runs SW will continue actively backing, seeking opportunities for slope reversal runs within Alder and Bear Creek drainages.

**Div. E** The spot to the West of Alta Sierra will continue to cause issues for the structures within the community. Lateral movement is possible again with additional upslope runs and long-range spotting to the east

**Div. M** Westerly flow will again have the fire looking for routes East, especially through spotting or rollout into Shirley or Ice House Creek drainages. New spots could find some wind blockage from the upper ridge along Rancheria Road, but more exposed areas will support active growth downslope towards values at risk.

**Div. N/O/R** Lots of good work on the ground has halted fire spread; be heads up for interior spotting lofting embers across lines as well as fire weakened trees in work areas.

**Div. Y** This area has seen increased rates of spread due to more wind exposure and fuels capable of rapid movement. Be heads up working in the area with another round of dry, gusty winds out of the west.

**Div. Z** As fire continues to back down and roll out into Lumreau Creek, be heads up for slope reversed runs with the afternoon alignment of aspect, wind and slope.

**Night Division:** Anticipate daytime burning conditions to continue well into the night, seeing relief with a decrease in winds and/or relative humidity recovery.

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### **Hazards & Risks**

**Fuel Geysers:** Fuel geyser events continue to be reported from the field resulting in injuries to personnel.

Review these geyser mitigation measures:

- Assume all gas-powered equipment and fuel transport containers are pressurized. Treat them accordingly when opening, especially near any potential ignition source. Always wear PPE.
- When refueling, move at least 20 feet away from any ignition source.
- Let the saw cool five minutes.
- Turn the saw so the fuel cap is pointed away from you, cover it with a cloth and slowly open the cap to vent away from you.
- If any fuel gets on your clothing, do not go back to sawing without getting fuel free clothes/PPE on. Tell your supervisor.
- Be careful to reseal and close the fuel cap so it closes completely and the threads do not get crossed. Let any over-fill evaporate before starting.

**Air Operations:** With air operations over the fire; both fixed and rotary wing aircraft, comes a unique set of hazards and risks. Reference the blue pages in your IRPG. Consider mission need and aviation risk factors. Establish good communications with the aircraft and ensure ground personnel are aware of drop zones during paracargo, retardant and water dropping operations.

**Review Aviation Watch Out Situations!**

**Firefighter Health:** With multiple days of working on the fireline; cuts, abrasions, rashes and blisters are accumulating on your body. Prevent infections by washing your hands often, take daily showers, wash or change your clothes frequently and care for minor wounds each shift. Treatment early-on will help prevent larger medical problems later!


