WEATHER DISCUSSION: Gusty southwest winds will once again be possible early this evening. Winds will gradually diminish after sunset and become more terrain driven. Temperatures will remain cool with another round of poor overnight recoveries over the ridges...but lower elevations will see better overnight recoveries.

WEATHER FORECAST:

TONIGHT:

WEATHER: Mostly clear. Areas of smoke... especially deeper canyons and drainages.

MIN TEMPERATURES: 60-67 lower elevations... 56-64 elsewhere

24 HOUR CHANGE: little

MAX HUMIDITY: Lower elevations 40-55%

24 HOUR CHANGE: little

upper valleys and higher elevations 20-35%...driest above 4000 feet

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP – Southwest to south in the evening 10-20 mph with gusts up to 30 mph...becoming east to southeast by morning 4-8 mph with gusts to 15 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY – Southwest/upslope in the evening 7-13 mph with gusts up to 20 mph...becoming easterly/downslope by morning 3-7 mph.

STABILITY/INVERSION: slightly unstable in the evening becoming stable after sunset with a weak inversion possible.

MONDAY FORECAST:

WEATHER: Mostly sunny. Areas of smoke.

MAX TEMPERATURES: lower elevation 83-93...higher elevation 71-81

MIN HUMIDITY: 12-25%...locally higher under smoke east side of fire

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP –Southeast to east in the morning 4-8 mph with gusts to 15 mph...becoming south to southwest winds 10-20 mph with gusts up to 30 mph in the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY – Notheast/downslope winds 3-7 mph in the morning...becoming southwest/upslope 8-15 with gusts to 25 mph upper slopes.

Extended Outlook Tuesday through Thursday: The weather will begin to moderate on Tuesday as the upper trough from the weekend begins to weaken over the region. Temperatures will be in the mid 70s to lower 90s with continued low daytime humidities. Overnight humidities will remain in the moderate to poor range. Winds will be typical diurnal flow with gusty southwest winds in the afternoon/evening.

For Wednesday through Thursday...the weather pattern will change across the area as high pressure aloft builds over the desert southwest. The strengthening high pressure aloft...combined with decreasing onshore flow...will produce a noticeable warming trend. By Thursday...expect afternoon temperatures to range from the 90s at lower elevations to the 80s at the ridgetops. As this pattern develops...southeasterly flow will develop aloft which will allow for the intrusion of some monsoonal moisture into the area. This increase in moisture will result in some partly cloudy skies and the slight chance of showers and thunderstorms in the afternoon and evening hours... starting on Wednesday

INPUTS

WEATHER SUMMARY

Refer to Weather Forecast for details: Mostly clear. Areas of smoke.

Min Temp – 56-67°. Max RH – 20-45%. Ridgetop Winds–SWS 10-20 mph gusting to 30 in PM becoming ESE 4-8 mph in AM. Slope/Valley Winds – SW/upslope 7-13 mph with gusts to 20 in PM becoming E/Downslope 2-5 mph in AM.

FUELS

Very heavy loading of decadent brush (chaparral, ceanothus, chemise, scrub oak, manzanita) (FM4, SH5, SH7) across the entire fire area, 15 foot high with Pine and Big Cone Doug Fir in the drainage bottoms and ridge tops above 4000'. The dead component in much for the brush exceeds 60%, heavy stands of grass are completely cured. Minimum fine fuel moisture: 4-8%, 1000 hour: 5-8%, Live fuel moisture: 60-65%. ERC's are running above 90%.

OUTPUTS - FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL: Predicted BI for today was 192 (down 62). Local Thresholds for active fire behavior: Winds (over 15 mph), RH (less than 25%), Temperature (over 90°) and BI (over 201)

Last night's fire behavior was active along the uncontrolled fire edge. For tonight expects similar fire activity. **Below 2500'** expect the fire to burn actively until around 2400. Max Fire Behavior: ROS 50-80 c/h, FL 15-25, Spot Dist 1/3 m, PI 70%. **Between 2500' and 5500'** expect active burning as a result of very poor RH recoveries. Max Fire Behavior: ROS 30-60 c/h, FL 15-25, Spot Dist 1/5 m, PI 85%. **Above 5500'**, fuels transition to timber with an understory component. Expect decreased fire behavior in these areas. Max Fire Behavior: ROS 5-10 c/h, FL 5-10, Spot Dist 1/3 m, PI 70%.

Branch I & II – For the divisions along the **Foothill Drive corridor**, the fire activity has diminished. Expect little heat. In the **Mt Wilson area**, the fire has transitioned into a timber fuel model resulting in a significant reduction in the fire behavior. Expect the timbered, north aspect slopes to the north of Mt Wilson to burn with moderate fire behavior. As the fire spreads laterally eastward in the West Fork San Gabriel River, there is a chance of the fire making an upslope run on the south side of the drainage towards Newcomb Pass and areas along the containment line. If this happens, spotting over the ridge is possible.

Branch III & XX – The area north of **Cogswell Reservoir** will continue lateral spread to the east with frequent upslope runs. Downslope winds will encourage spread down into Chileno and Little Mermaids Canyons. Spotting to the south of the West Fork San Gabriel River is possible. **Along Hwy 2**, expect the fire to continue to spread actively as it moves to eastward along the Kratka Ridge south of Hwy 2. Expect the fire to make frequent upslope runs on the south side of the ridge while backing actively into the upper Devil's Canyon and West Fork Bear Canyon drainages. Spots are likely over the Kratka Ridge, but should not be problematic. In the **Three Points** area, expect the uncontrolled fire edge to back actively down slope into the headwaters of the South Fork Little Rock River. Occasional upslope runs are possible.

Branch IV & V – Pacoima drainage: Pay attention to wind direction, wind speed and RH and the effect on burnout and holding operations. **Bare Mt:** Due to sparse fuels at lower elevations narrow strip head firing patterns will be more effective than backing. Burnout at higher elevation could also be problematic due to unfavorable winds over fire lines. Expect very active fire behavior in dense decadent brush. **All areas** have the potential to burn actively when slope and wind direction are in alignment. Expect wind eddies around side drainages and leeward sides of ridgetops.

AIR OPERATIONS

- Evening: smoke most likely on north flank. No nighttime air operations.

SAFETY.

- For crews working direct line into the Wilderness, keep one foot in the hard black, foot travel at night will be slow and natural safety zones are limited to non-existent.

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



“DO BASIC THINGS VERY WELL”

- **Lesson in Fire behavior:** Events yesterday demonstrated that the potential still exists for extreme fire behavior on this incident. **Don't let your guard down!** Review “Severe Fire Behavior Potential” (IRPG p.76). Monitor current weather conditions and forecasts. Make sure all personnel receive thorough briefings every shift. Maintain adequate escape routes and safety zones. Advise all personnel if these are compromised or changed. Set trigger points when appropriate. **MAINTAIN SITUATIONAL AWARENESS!**
- **Driving on the Incident** – Drive defensively w/head lights on; use chocks & backers; watch for rockfall off cutbanks in burned areas. Increase following distances on dusty roads; slow down for opposing traffic. Be able to stop in ½ the visible distance on blind curves. **Maintain Situational Awareness!**
- **Hazardous Terrain** – Steep, rocky terrain is common on the Angeles. Rolling material is a major issue. Rocks and trees have been loosened or dislodged by the fire. Evaluate your work area closely before entering. Spread workers out farther than 10 feet apart. Stagger workers so they are not working or walking directly above or below each other.
- **Hydration & Fatigue** - Heat stress problems continue to be a significant problem on this incident. The higher humidities reduce the effectiveness of the body's heat regulating system since sweat doesn't evaporate as well. Be familiar with signs symptoms and monitor yourself and those you supervise for symptoms. Be alert for signs of fatigue and take breaks as necessary. Maintain 2:1 work/rest ratio. Pace yourselves.

Look Up, Look Down, Look Around

- ***Fuel Characteristics** – Assess prior to beginning operations.
- ***Fuel Moisture** – Read daily shift plan and assess on site.
- ***Fuel Temperature** – Varies with exposure to direct sunlight.
- ***Terrain & Fuel Accumulations** – Scout prior to beginning operations and continuously during operations.
- ***Wind** – Measure, observe, feel and notice changes.
- ***Atmospheric Stability** – Observe indicators.
- ***Fire Behavior** – Monitor constantly prior to and during operations.
- ***Safety** – Ask questions in unfamiliar situations. The only “dumb” question is the one that wasn't asked.

PERSONAL HEALTH:

- DRINK PLENTY OF FLUIDS AND AVOID ENERGY DRINKS.
- WASH HANDS FREQUENTLY
- VISIT MED UNIT AT FIRST SIGN OF COLD OR FLU-LIKE SYMPTOMS
- TAKE CARE OF ANY INJURY A.S.A.P.

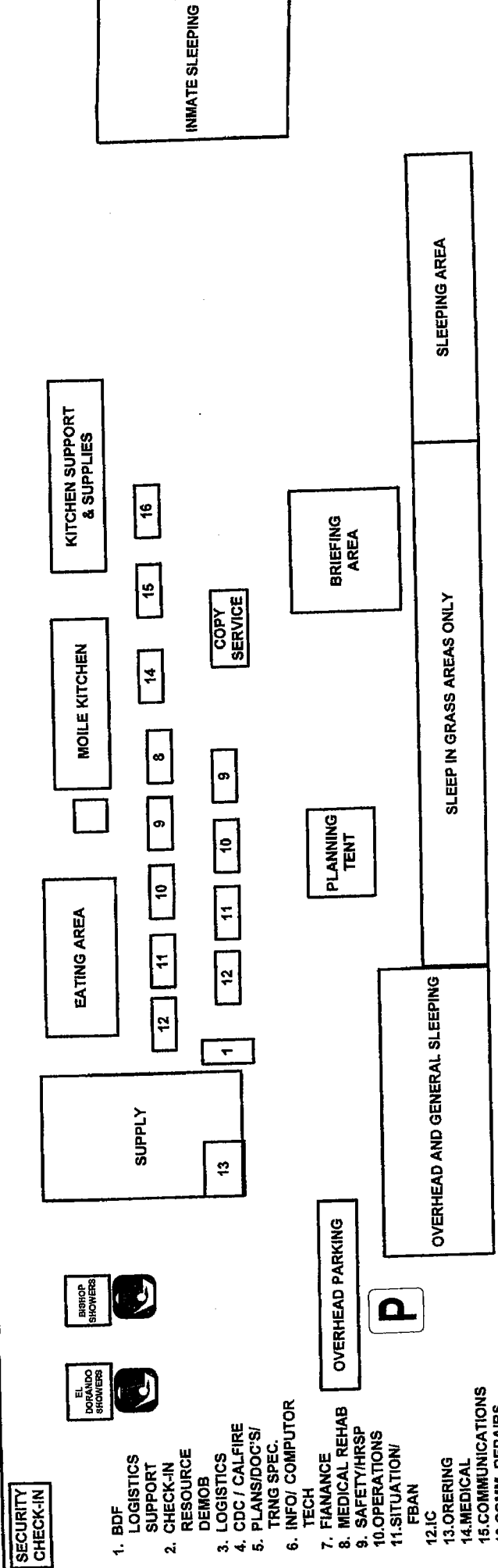

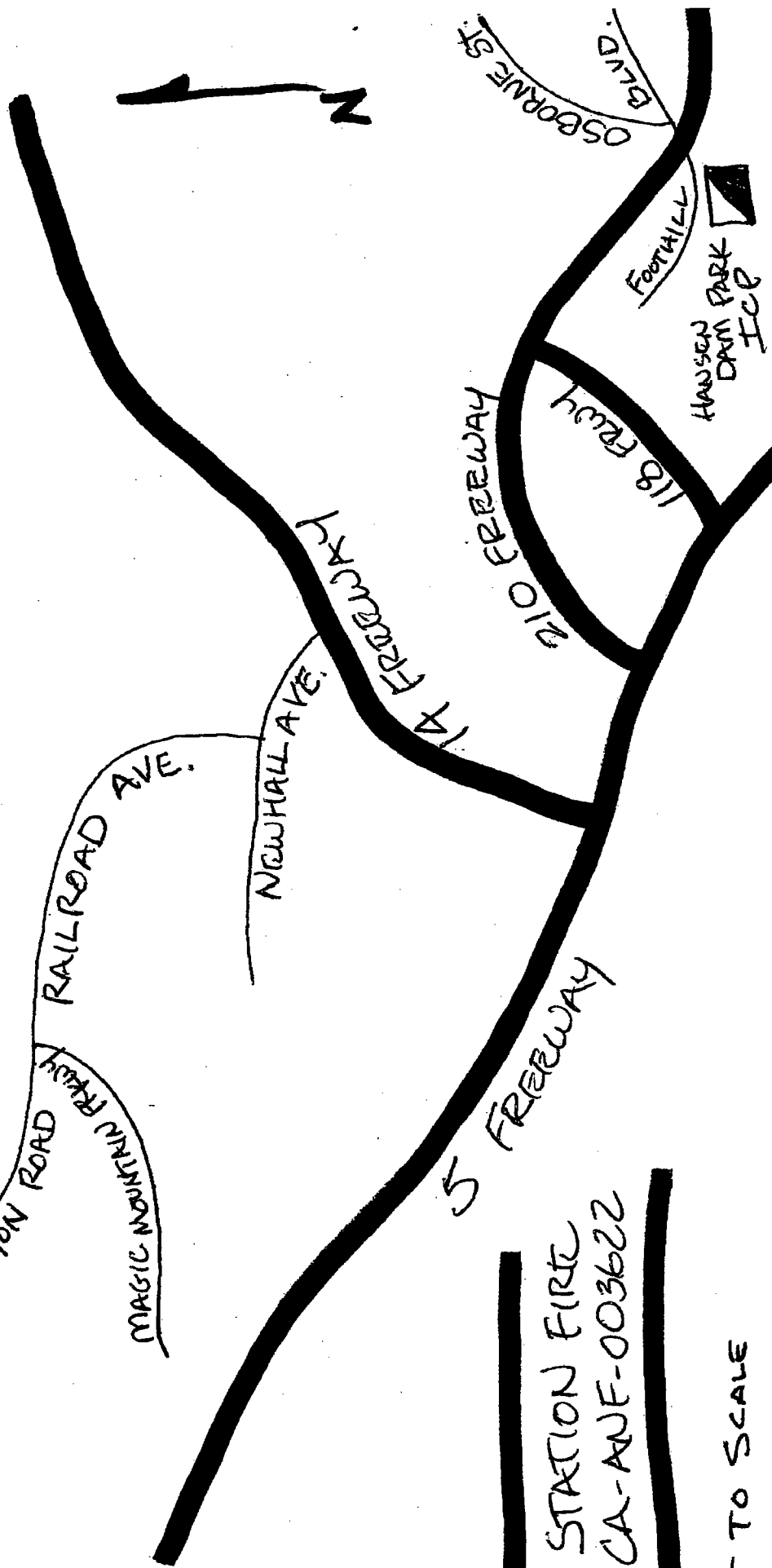
