37. Strategic Objectives (define planned end-state for incident):
Following the incident objectives developed during the WFDSS process and in line with the Delegation of Authority strategic objectives are as follows (clockwise from north):

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-NORTH of Mahogany Butte to protect grazing allotments, private inholdings, and cultural and natural resources.
-EAST of FSR 542 and FSR 541, Deadline Ridge, and Rock Creek to protect vacation homes, Magic Mountain Ski Resort, improved campgrounds, grazing allotments, private inholdings, and cultural and natural resources.
-SOUTH of County Road E2900N and County Road E 3000 N to protect residences, grazing allotments, and cultural and natural resources.
-WEST of Cottonwood Ridge and Rams Horn Ridge to protect residences, grazing allotments, and cultural and natural resources.

Threats to life and property:

Significant WUI. Residences and outbuildings within the Trapper Creek drainage where evacuation orders remain due east of the fire. There are numerous organizational camps, campgrounds, a ski area, and recreational residences northwest of the current fire perimeter in Rock Creek and Dry Creek where evacuation orders remain. Additional structures and complex ownership exists east in the Goose Creek drainage. Other federal, state, and county jurisdictions, cooperators and mutual aid areas in or near the fire area.

Threats to public and private infrastructure:

12 hours: **Electric transmission lines, communication repeaters, structures, and bridges are within and near the fire's perimeter.**

Threats to cultural and natural resources:

Areas of cultural significance, critical sage grouse habitat, grazing allotments, Cassia Crossbill habitat, big game winter range, and multiple roadless areas.

All of the above threats will remain valid and continue based on observed fire behavior.

Threats to life and property: Fire activity continues to impact displaced residents evacuated.

24 hours: **Threats to public and private infrastructure:**

Precautionary residential power outages will continue.

Threats to cultural and natural resources:

Priority sage grouse habitat remains threatened and continues to be negatively impacted by fire spread.

All of the above threats will remain valid and continue based on observed fire behavior.

48 hours: **Threats to life and property: Fire activity continues to impact displaced residents evacuated.**

Threats to public and private infrastructure:

Precautionary residential power outages will continue.

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Threats to cultural and natural resources: Priority sage grouse habitat remains threatened and continues to be negatively impacted by fire spread.	
72 hours: A warming and drying trend is expected to establish mid week.	
Anticipated after 72 hours: Long term outlook does not show any fire slowing/season ending events.

Explain major problems and concerns such as operational challenges, incident management problems, and social, political, economic, or environmental concerns or impacts.

In alignment with the Sawtooth National Forest Plan and WFDSS direction for the Badger Fire, implement a full suppression strategy to meet incident objectives. Critical Resource Needs are necessary to meet incident objectives and fulfill the Delegation of Authority. The addition of CRNs will improve the probability of reducing fire spread while providing for firefighter and public safety.

41. Planned Actions for Next Operational Period:
In DIV F suppression resources will continue to provide structure protection within the Rock Creek drainage and actively working the fire's edge with aerial support as necessary. Resources will perform burnouts as necessary to check fire spread. Bucket and scooper work will support ground resources along the west flank of the division to halt further fire spread to the west. Suppression resources assigned to DIVs A and B will actively engage the fire's edge with production of direct and/or indirect fire line to halt fire spread to the southwest and seek targets of opportunity. Crews will continue to mop up, monitor, and patrol in all other divisions.
