Weather Concerns (synopsis of current and predicted weather; discuss related factors that may cause concern):</p> <p>24 hr: Warm temperatures and low relative humidities will continue over the fire area.</p> <p>48: A dry cold front will approach the fire area bringing southwest to west winds of 10-15 mph with gusts to 30 mph. Winds will then shift to a west to northwesterly direction. Strong winds of 10-15 mph with gusts to 30 mph are expected likely through Friday night. However, 40-60% cloud cover may increase RH values by 5-10%.</p> <p>72 hr: Persistent gusts of 25 mph are likely. Temperatures will remain cool and higher humidities under cloudy skies.</p> <p>72+ hr: A strong high pressure ridge will develop for much of next week. Temperatures are expected to be 10-15 degrees above normal. RH will return to the teens.</p> <p>A rise in temperature, a drop in relative humidity, and increasing winds combined with record low fuel moisture values have the potential to increase fire activity along uncontrolled fireline.</p>

DIV B: Resources will improve and hold completed line construction from the A/B break north to Goose Creek. Line construction will begin/continue west of Third Fork Rock Creek near Buttars Creek.

DIV C: Resources are holding secured fire line from Sagehen Flats through to Buck Brush Flats and south from Buck Brush Flats to Magpie Basin along Rock Creek Road.

DIV F and K: Resources are improving and holding recently constructed containment line at the southern end of DIV F to the F/K division break. Resources are improving and holding recently completed line on the northern end of DIV K near Fuller Pasture and Bear Flat.

DIV O: Resources will improve, hold, and patrol fire line between Durfee Meadow and Trapper Creek.

DIV A/Z: Resources will improve, hold, and patrol completed hand and dozer line construction from the A/Z break west to Little Piney Creek.
