Gusty west to northwest winds sustained at 10-20 mph with gusts to 30-35 mph although higher RHs.</p> <p>48: Continued impact from the dry cold front. West to northwest winds 10-20 mph with gusts to 30 mph. Temperature down 10 degrees, RH up 10 percent.</p> <p>72 hr: Post frontal northwest winds with persistent gusts of 25 mph likely. Cool temps and elevated humidities.</p> <p>72+ hr: Less winds. Sunny skies leading to an increase in temps. RHs 30-35 percent range. High pressure will dominate much of next week. 10-15 degrees above normal. RH will return to the teens. <p>12 hours: Moderate fire behavior continues to be observed east of Deadline Ridge, Pike Mountain, and Diamondfield Jack in Division B that has the potential to impact Wildland Urban Interface and Magic Mountain Ski Resort. Moderate fire behavior near Cotton Ridge and along Third Fork Rock Creek in DIV B. Areas of isolated interior heat remains south of the F/K break at Fuller Pasture and Bear Flat. Primarily scattered heat along the fire perimeter in DIVs A, B, and Z. Primarily isolated interior heat is present in DIVs B and K. An incoming dry cold front with an increase in gusty.</p>
<p>24 hours: -Same as Above-</p>
<p>48 hours: The passing dry cold front will generate west to northwest winds 10-20 mph with gusts to 30 mph. While favorable wind directions for DIV B, this has the potential to impact DIVs A, K, and Z with extremely dry fuels and no precipitation expected.</p>
<p>72 hours: Post frontal northwest winds will continue to create conditions that could potentially impact DIVs A, K, and Z. Increased fire behavior is possible in timber stringers and islands where unburned fuels remain.</p>
