Temperatures up 5 degrees, RHs 25-30 percent. 48+: Strong high pressure ridge will develop. Temperatures 10-15 degrees warmer than normal. 80s in lower elevations, 70s in higher elevations. A rise in temperature and a drop in relative humidities combined with record low fuel moisture values have the potential to increase fire activity along uncontrolled fireline.</p>

12 hours:	<p>Minimal fire behavior with low intensity near the DIV B/C break northwest of Cotton Ridge, east of Trail Canyon, and along Third Fork Rock Creek. If left unchecked there is increased potential to impact Wildland Urban Interface and Magic Mountain Ski Resort as temperatures begin to rise and relative humidity fall. Areas of isolated interior heat remains south of Cotton Ridge and in the Telephone Canyon area of DIVs B and C. Pockets of isolated heat throughout the southern half of the fire's footprint.</p>
24 hours:	<p>A strong high pressure system will set in over the fire area. Any residual heat near the fire perimeter in DIVs B and C may be influenced by the warming and drying trend. An uptick in fire behavior within the interior can be expected where unburned fuels consume.</p>

41. Planned Actions for Next Operational Period:

DIV B: Resources will improve and hold completed line from the A/B break north through Goose Creek up to Porcupine Spring in preparation of possible future burnout operations. Line construction will continue west of Third Fork Rock Creek near Buttars Creek.

DIV C: Crews are completing prep for future burnout operations. Northern portion of the division suppression repair has begun. Resources in the southern portion of the division will hold secured fire line following recent burnout operations. Line improvement and holding from Sagehen Flats through to Buck Brush Flats and south from Buck Brush Flats to Magpie Basin along Rock Creek Road.

DIV K: Resources are improving, holding, and patrolling secured fireline and beginning suppression repair from the DIV F/K break to the K/O break.

DIV F: Resources are patrolling secured fireline from the C/F break to the F/K break.

DIV O: Resources will patrol fire line from the K/O break to the O/A break.

DIV A and Z: The two divisions are being patrolled by air.

Repair Group: The repair group will continue snagging roads and campgrounds and stabilizing dozer line.
