

WEATHER DISCUSSION: A weak disturbance will move southeast across Wyoming today which will enhance the northwest winds across Grand Daddy Basin and through Fish Creek and West Fork Rock Creek. The ridge will build in for the middle of the week with mainly terrain driven winds but an approaching trough for the weekend will begin to increase southwest winds Thursday through Saturday. Cold trough passage Saturday night through Sunday.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Sunny and breezy.

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 57-61°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 12-16% **HAINES:** 5

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Grand Daddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain - WNW 5-8 mph with gusts to 14 mph in the morning becoming NW at 10-15 mph with gusts 25-30 mph after 1200 MDT. Upper Hells Canyon – W 4-7 mph with gusts to 10 mph, shifting to NW at 8-14 mph with gusts to 20 mph after 1200.

SLOPE/VALLEY - Fish Creek - NW drainage winds 2-5 mph with gusts to 10 mph until 1200 MDT, then WNW at 12-18 mph with gusts 25-30 mph in the upper two-thirds of the drainage with potential of upslope of 6-12 mph gusts to 18 mph in the lower one third of the drainage.

Inversion: Just above the valley floor up to 10,000 MSL **LAL:** 1

OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT:

WEATHER: Clear.

MIN TEMPERATURES (10kft): 36-40°F **MAX HUMIDITY (10kft):** 18-24% **HAINES:** 3

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - NW wind 7-11 mph with gusts near 18 mph until 1900 then NNW 4-7 mph.
SLOPE/VALLEY - Fish Creek and Hells Canyon - Down slope 4-7 mph with gusts to 14 mph.

Inversion: Strong thermal belt between 9500 ft. and 10,500 ft. **LAL:** 1

OUTLOOK FOR TUESDAY:

WEATHER: Mostly sunny.

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 58-62°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 11-15% **HAINES:** 5

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - NW wind 5-8 mph with gusts to 11 mph until 1000, then southerly at 6-10 mph with gusts to 18 mph.
SLOPE/VALLEY - Fish Creek - Down drainage winds at 3-5 mph with gusts to 14 mph until 1100, then upslope at 5-9 mph with gusts to 18 mph.

EXTENDED FORECAST: A ridge will build over the region Wednesday into Thursday for little temperature change and terrain driven winds, but then an approaching trough will start to enhance southwest winds by Thursday afternoon and will continue somewhat elevated through Saturday. A cold trough will likely bring snow levels down below 7500 feet by Sunday. Forecast precipitation amounts at this time range from 0.20 to 0.60 of an inch, which will be in the form of snow.

Slope/Valley: Fish Creek NW drainage 2-5 mph gusts to 10 until 1200, then WNW 12-18 mph gusts 25-30.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL

The fire is burning primarily through mixed conifer stands with a shrub understory and timber/broadleaf stands with a litter. Many of these stands have an extremely high mortality rate with a 50% or more standing snag component.

Energy Release Component (ERC) values for the Ashley FDRA are between the 90th and the 97th percentile.

SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR

Mixed conifer stands with shrub understory: potential head rate of spread 10-20 chains per hour with flame length 6-10 feet. During maximum wind gusts expect spread rates to 30-40 chains per hour with flame length to 16 feet. Expect single and group tree torching and occasional short-duration crown runs on steeper slopes with wind alignment. Spotting distances of ¼ to ½ mile possible due to gusty wind conditions. Probability of ignition 80%.

Timber/Broadleaf litter stands: rate of spread 4-6 chains per hour, flame length 2-3 feet.

Critical areas of concern:

Fish Creek/Still Water Dam area: high probability for movement toward the dam with increased spotting potential the main contributor.

Hells Canyon area: potential for spotting to the east and becoming established in Hells Canyon. Diurnal drainage winds could result in very rapid upcanyon spread if this occurs.

SAFETY

When developing strategies and tactics, safety zones and escape routes, you should be evaluating potential fire behavior (worst case scenario), not just observed fire behavior. Monitor the weather regularly for trends that may result in increased fire behavior.

- **Ask for clarification if something does not make sense or if there are questions. You are probably not the only person with that concern or question.**
- **If you see something, say something!**

A fall back plan that closely supports the primary

C- Contingency Plan (Defense)

Entirely focused on firefighter safety

E – Emergency Plan (Defense)

Entirely focused on individual firefighter survival

Planning for Medical Emergencies

Ask and be able to answer these 3 questions:

1. What are we going to do if someone gets hurt?
2. How will we get them out of here?
3. How long will it take to get them to a hospital?

All operational activities should be based on answers to these questions. See page 2 of the IRPG for more guidance.

Fire and COVID-19 Briefing Checklist

Self-Awareness / Screening

- Immediately separate yourself from others.
- Notify supervisor if you or others experience:
 - o Cough, more than expected
 - o Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - o New loss of taste or smell
 - o Fever o Chills
 - o Sore throat o Muscle pain
- Review and follow crew and division plans to isolate, triage, and transport symptomatic personnel.

Hygiene on the Fireline

- Properly wash or sanitize your hands often, especially before and after eating or entering a public place, and after coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid handshakes and communal use items.
- Maintain a supply of hand sanitizer and hand wipes. Inform supervisor of needed resupply.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often:
 - o Radios, phones, doors, pumps, fuel cans, etc.

Social Distancing and Protective Equipment

- Initiate, practice, and remind others of social distancing.
- Conduct briefings and conversations outdoors and at least 6 feet apart.
- Utilize face coverings as a tool when practical.
- Clean or replace dirty face coverings, equipment, and PPE.

Communications

- Face coverings and social distancing complicate communications. Ensure effective sender/receiver messaging.
