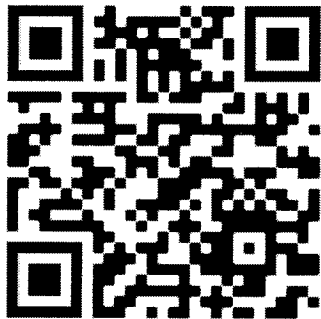



WEATHER DISCUSSION: An approaching storm system arriving late tonight will cause southwest winds aloft to increase today. These southwest winds will mix down to the surface by midday and with min RH values 16-21%, increased fire behavior is expected this afternoon. The associated cold front will arrive between 0200 and 0400 with gusty northwest winds, widespread snow above about 7000 ft., and temperatures 25-30 degrees colder than today. Snow accumulations of 2-4 inches are expected over the Granddaddy Basin with 1 to 3 inches in the Stillwater Reservoir area and Lake Fork Mountain. Less than an inch of snow is expected down by Yellowstone spike camp.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Mostly cloudy (60% cloud cover) this morning becoming partly cloudy (30% cloud cover) this afternoon. Areas of smoke in the drainages will dissipate between 1030 and 1200.

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 57-61°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 18-23% **HAINES:** 4 Low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Granddaddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain -W 5-9 mph with gusts to 17 mph until 1100, then SW at 12-18 mph with gusts to 30-35 mph in the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek - NW drainage winds at 3-6 mph with gusts to 10 mph until 1100 MDT, shifting to SSW at 8-12 mph with gusts to 24 mph. Upper Hells Canyon – NW drainage winds at 2-5 mph with gusts to 8 mph, shifting to SW at 7-11 mph after 1100 MDT with gusts to 18 mph in the afternoon. Winds could shift to become variable due to eddying effects in the upper portion.

Inversion: Weak inversion breaking by 1000. **LAL:** 1

OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT:

WEATHER: Increasing clouds with snow developing after midnight (about 0200-0400 MDT).

MIN TEMPERATURES (10kft): 29-33°F **MAX HUMIDITY (10kft):** 90-100% **HAINES:** 2 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - SW wind 12-18 mph with gusts 30-35 mph in the evening then NW at 10-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph after 0300 MDT.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon – SW 10-15 mph with gusts 20-25 in the evening then becoming NW after 0300 MDT at 10-15 mph with gusts 20-25 mph.

INVERSION: No inversion. **LAL:** 1

OUTLOOK FOR SUNDAY:

WEATHER: Windy and cold with snow in the morning, becoming showery by afternoon. Partly sunny (50-70% cloud cover in the afternoon).

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 28-32°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 55% **HAINES:** 2 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - NW wind 20-25 mph with gusts 35-40 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon - NW winds at 15-20 mph with gusts to 30 mph.

INVERSION: No inversion. **LAL:** 1

EXTENDED FORECAST:

Moderately strong WNW winds expected Monday with below normal temperatures and elevated RH values. Winds drop off and become westerly Tuesday with temps near normal, but moderate westerly winds return Wednesday with temperatures slightly above normal and RH below 30%

Temps at ICP will be in the lower to mid 50s Sunday with lows in the 20s Sunday night. Prepare accordingly!

Discussion: ***Red Flag Warning In Effect For Today From Noon Until 2000***

Weather: Mostly cloudy (60% cloud cover) this morning becoming partly cloudy (30% cloud cover) this afternoon.

Max Temp: 57-61°

Min RH: 18-23%

Winds (20 foot):

Ridgetop: W 5-9 mph gusts to 17 until 1100, then SW 12-18 mph gusts to 30-35 in the afternoon.

Slope/Valley: West Fk. Rock Creek NW drainage wind 3-6 mph gusts to 10 until 1100, then SSW 8-12 mph gusts 24 Upper Hells Canyon NW drainage wind 2-5 mph gusts to 8, then SW 7-11 gusts to 18 in the afternoon.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL

The fire is burning primarily through mixed conifer stands with a shrub understory and timber/broadleaf stands with a litter understory. Many of these stands have an extremely high mortality rate with a 50% or more standing snag component.

Energy Release Component for the Ashley FDRA for 10/09 is 90, a record value for the date, and above the 97th percentile.

SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR

Mixed conifer stands with shrub understory: potential head rate of spread 10-20 chains/hour with flame length 6-10 feet **except** during wind gusts which could result in spread rates to 40 chains/hour with flame length exceeding 15 feet. Expect single and group tree torching; and the potential for active crown fire in the afternoon but confined primarily to the interior. Maximum spotting distance ½ - 1 mile, Probability of Ignition 70%. **Nighttime:** expect daytime burning conditions to persist well into the evening. Late expect backing/flanking spread to 2-5 chains per hour, torching and short-range spotting due to extremely dry conditions. Probability of Ignition 30-40%.

Timber/Broadleaf litter stands: rate of spread 4-6 chains per hour, flame length 2-3 feet.

Critical areas of concern:

Stillwater Reservoir area: fire will continue to spread toward the reservoir and dam and also westerly/ northerly in the Granddaddy Basin.

Hells Canyon area: potential for spotting and becoming established on the east side of Hells Canyon.

Air operations may be impacted afternoon winds and by smoke in various locations during the day.

SAFETY

There is a potential for extreme fire behavior today with active crown fire and long-range spotting. Only use sanitized buckets in upper lake water sources; however, reservoir water may be used when dropping on upper terrain if more than 150' from any waterways. Report any deviations to Air Ops. Include location, original water source, number of gallons.

Prior approval for wilderness landings are required. Do proper risk assessment for any landings over 10,000'

**Look Up, Look Down,
Look Around During Mop Up**

***Look Up:** Check the sky for any weather changes such as building or approaching thunderstorms, wind shifts or increasing in speed. Watch for air operations and water drops. Look for snags and the potential for rolling material.

***Look Down:** Watch your footing. Keep an eye out for snakes, bee's nests, Stump holes, and ash pits.

*** Look Around** Check for flagging identifying hazards in the area, and general terrain features. Keep an eye on fellow firefighters for signs of heat stress and fatigue.

Aircraft Safety

*Ensure personnel out of the drop zone.

*Use correct air to ground frequency to communicate with aircraft.

*Use the clock position of the aircraft to help coordinate target location.

*Use clear concise statements when communicating with the aircraft.

*Provide feedback on drop accuracy.

Fire and COVID-19 Briefing Checklist

Self-Awareness / Screening

- Immediately separate yourself from others.
- Notify supervisor if you or others experience:
 - o Cough, more than expected
 - o Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - o New loss of taste or smell
 - o Fever o Chills
 - o Sore throat o Muscle pain
- Review and follow crew and division plans to isolate, triage, and transport symptomatic personnel.

Hygiene on the Fireline

- Properly wash or sanitize your hands often, especially before and after eating or entering a public place, and after coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid handshakes and communal use items.
- Maintain a supply of hand sanitizer and hand wipes. Inform supervisor of needed resupply.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often:
 - o Radios, phones, doors, pumps, fuel cans, etc.

Social Distancing and Protective Equipment

- Initiate, practice, and remind others of social distancing.
- Conduct briefings and conversations outdoors and at least 6 feet apart.
- Utilize face coverings as a tool when practical.
- Clean or replace dirty face coverings, equipment, and PPE.

Communications

- Face coverings and social distancing complicate communications. Ensure effective sender/receiver messaging.
