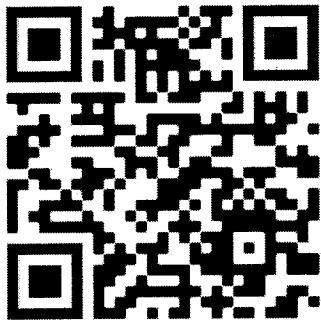



WEATHER DISCUSSION: The upper level ridge will build off the West Coast today resulting in a continued moderately strong NW flow to remain in place over the fire. However, the coldest air with yesterday's trough has moved east and temperatures will moderate to near normal levels for this time of year. Winds at 12,000 ft MSL are expected to be between 25 and 35 kts today with the strongest winds occurring this morning.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Sunny and breezy.

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 43-47°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 30-40% **HAINES:** 2 Low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Granddaddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain –NW 8-12 mph with gusts to 24 mph until 1000, then NW at 10-15 mph with gusts to 30-35 mph in the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek - NW winds at 5-9 mph with gusts to 16 mph until 1000 MDT, increasing to 8-12 mph with gusts to 25 mph. Upper Hells Canyon – NW winds at 4-7 mph with gusts to 15 mph until 1000, increasing to 7-11 mph with gusts of 20 mph in the afternoon.

Inversion: Thermal belt between 9500 and 11000 ft breaking by 1000.

LAL: 1

OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT:

WEATHER: Clear and cold.

MIN TEMP (10kft): 20-25°F basins and 30° ridges. **MAX HUMIDITY (10kft):** 35-45%, except higher in drainages.

HAINES: 2 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - W wind 10-15 mph with gusts 25-30 mph in the evening then NW at 5-10 mph with gusts to 20 mph after 2300 MDT.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon – NW 10-15 mph with gusts 20 mph in the evening then NW after 2200 MDT at 7-12 mph with gusts 20 mph.

INVERSION: Moderate inversion between 9000 and 11000 ft.

LAL: 1

OUTLOOK FOR TUESDAY:

WEATHER: Mostly sunny (20% cloud cover).

MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 48-52°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 30-40% **HAINES:** 2 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - WSW wind 10-15 mph with gusts 25 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon – Down drainage winds at 4-7 mph with gusts to 15 mph, shifting to up drainage after 1000-1100 at 6-10 mph with gusts to 20 mph.

INVERSION: Moderate inversion between 9000 and 10500 ft breaking by 1100.

LAL: 1

EXTENDED FORECAST: The ridge will remain to our west through the week although it will strengthen and move inland by end of the week. A weak disturbance on Wednesday may increase the NW winds some and cool temperatures a little. Other than min RH's between 35 and 45% Wednesday, min RHs will likely lower to 20-30% the rest of week with temperatures creeping back to slightly above normal by Friday and Saturday.

Temps at ICP will be between 30 and 35 tonight

INPUTS

WEATHER SUMMARY: ***See attached Fire Weather Forecast***

Discussion: Cool temperatures with northwesterly winds will persist today.

Weather: Sunny and moderately windy.

Max Temp: 43-47°

Min RH: 30-40%

Winds (20 foot):

Ridgetop: NW 10-15 mph gusts to 35 mph.

Slope/Valley: West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon - NW winds 8-12 mph with gusts to 25 mph

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL

The fire is burning primarily through mixed conifer stands with a shrub understory and timber/broadleaf stands with a litter understory. Many of these stands have an extremely high mortality rate with a 50% or more standing snag component. Lower elevations are a grass/shrub mixture with scattered pinyon/juniper.

Energy Release Component for the Ashley FDRA for 10/10 is 88, a record value for the date, and at the 97th percentile.

SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR

In mixed conifer stands with shrub understory: spread will be greatly subdued again today with most activity limited to areas with concentrations of heavy fuels, especially dead and down. Expect single and group tree torching where large diameter surface fuels are available to drive vertical fire movement. Maximum spotting distance of 400 yards, Probability of Ignition <50%.

Timber/Broadleaf litter stands: Low rate of spread with flame lengths <1 foot due to poor 1-hr and 10-hr fuel moisture values.

In the grass/shrub fuels at lower elevations where precip has recently occurred will struggle to maintain fire activity but isolated patches may burn at low/moderate rates, particularly when on south aspects or with wind.

Nighttime: expect daytime burning conditions to persist until sunset. Through the night fire behavior will be limited to smoldering in large diameter fuels and in sheltered areas where a canopy is present.

Critical areas of concern:

DIV H/B: fire will continue to slowly work through discontinuous fuels but not in an organized pattern.

DIV W: fire will continue to persist in sheltered areas and where jackpots of unburned fuel remain.

DIV M: there is potential for continued fire activity north of Moon Reservoir but spread will be limited.

AIR OPERATIONS

Air operations may be impacted by winds during the day. Smoke should not be an issue in most areas.

Sunrise: Monday, 10/12 07:30

Sunset: Monday, 10/12 18:45



SAFETY

Some areas of the fire may have received little, if any, precipitation. Extremely dry fuels, even after having received some moisture, may still carry fire. Fire activity will pick up as fuels dry out in coming days. Maintain situational awareness today in light of the active fire behavior potential that still exists in some locations.



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



- Task = What is to be done
- Purpose = Why it is to be done
- End State = How it should look when done

Hazard Tree Safety

- Inspect area for hazard trees before starting work. Are there trees that have been falling, leaning, hung up, or have broken tops? Are there high-risk species? How long has the fire been burning in the area?
- Identify hazards and fell or avoid the hazard and flag.
- Take down hazard trees only with qualified sawyers and then only if necessary.
