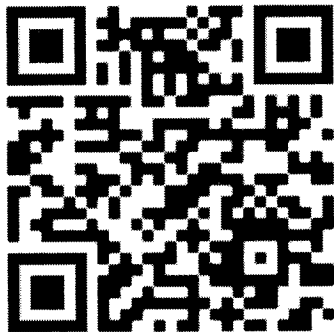



## Incident Fire Weather Forecast

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** The broad upper level ridge will remain off the West Coast through much of the week with a gradual progression eastward to the Coast by the weekend. The ridge to our west will result in NW flow across the Northern/Central Rockies that will contain a couple of fast moving disturbances. The first will clip us Wednesday increasing the NW winds and the second could clip us Saturday for another uptick in the NW winds. Temperatures, RH and winds will oscillate in conjunction with these passing disturbances. No precipitation through the weekend. AVIATION... Winds will be <=25kts at 12K ft through early afternoon then increase to 30 kts late in the day.

**WEATHER:** Sunny.  
**MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft):** 50-54°F      **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 18-24%      **HAINES:** 2 Very Low  
**(8kft):** 11-15%

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP -** Granddaddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain –NW 6-9 mph with gusts to 16 mph until 1000, then SW at 10-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph in the afternoon.  
**SLOPE/VALLEY -** West Fork Rock Creek - NW winds at 4-7 mph with gusts to 12 mph until 1000 MDT, becoming SW at 8-12 mph with gusts to 25 mph. Hells Canyon – NW winds at 3-6 mph with gusts to 10 mph until 1000, shifting to upslope 6-10 mph with gusts of 17 mph in the afternoon.

**Inversion:** Thermal belt between 9500 and 11000 ft breaking by 1000.      **LAL:** 1

**OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT:**

**WEATHER:** Clear.  
**MIN TEMP (10kft):** 30-35. **MAX HUMIDITY (10kft):** 55-70%.      **HAINES:** 2 Very low

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP -** W wind 7-11 mph with gusts 20 mph in the evening then WNW at 10-15 mph with gusts 25-30 mph towards morning.  
**SLOPE/VALLEY -** West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon – NW 6-10 mph with gusts 16 mph in the evening then NW at 7-12 mph with gusts 20 mph towards morning.

**INVERSION:** Little if any inversion due to increased winds.      **LAL:** 1

**OUTLOOK FOR WEDNESDAY:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly sunny and windy (10-20% cloud cover).  
**MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft):** 43-47°F      **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 33-43%      **HAINES:** 2 Very low

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP -** NW wind 10-15 mph with gusts 30 mph in the morning increasing to 16-22 with gusts to near 40 mph.  
**SLOPE/VALLEY -** West Fork Rock Creek and upper Hells Canyon – Down drainage winds at 4-7 mph with gusts to 12 mph, shifting to up drainage after 0900-1000 at 10-15 mph with gusts of 25 to 30 mph.

**INVERSION:** Little if any inversion due to increased winds.      **LAL:** 1

**EXTENDED FORECAST:** In the wake of the disturbance moving across the Rockies, temperatures will be a bit cooler Thursday with highs 40-45°F, winds lighter and from the SW at 8-12 mph with gusts to 20 mph, and RH values lowering to 20-25%. Warmer Friday with light SW winds and RHs between 20 and 30%. Possibly cooler and breezy Saturday as the second disturbance moves past.

**Today's General Fire Behavior:** The fire is burning mainly through mixed conifer stands with heavy dead/down component and a shrub understory. Many of these stands have an extremely high mortality rate with a 50% or more standing snag component. Fire will continue to work its way through areas of heavy fuel where isolated torching can occur. Most of the fire area is a mosaic of burned and unburned fuel allowing for the fire to fill in where fuels are receptive. Spot fires and roll out are the primary means for fire spread.

**Fuels:** Fuels are extremely dry due to lack of spring rains and non-existent monsoons for the last 3 years. All fuel size classes have been near critical levels for months. The rain and snow received a few days ago will lessen fire activity in smaller diameter fuels however larger fuels will remain dry. ERC's are beginning to drop below the maximum levels. Live fuels are entering dormancy which means they are reaching their driest state.

**Topography:** Steep rugged canyons and bluffs that top out into high elevation meadows and lake systems. Large rocky fuel breaks occur within the higher elevation bluffs. Isolated areas of continuous fuel occur within the escarpment where fire will have the ability to move.

**SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR:**

**Mixed conifer stands with heavy dead and down:** Expect isolated torching and possible spot fires or roll out. Maximum ROS 7-13 ch/hr and FL 6-9 feet.

**Aspen stands:** Expect minimal fire behavior. Maximum ROS 1-2 ch/hr and less than 1-foot FL.

**Sagebrush and grass:** If fire becomes established in sagebrush and grass and there is enough wind or slope, expect fire to move rapidly. Maximum ROS 17-36 ch/hr and FL 4-6 feet.

**Nighttime:** expect daytime burning conditions to persist into the early evening. Late expect backing/flanking spread to 2-5 chains per hour, occasional torching, and short-range spotting.



#### Safety

Some areas of the fire may have received little, if any, precipitation. Extremely dry fuels, even after receiving some moisture, may still carry fire. Fire activity will pick up as fuels dry out in coming days. Maintain situational awareness today considering the active fire behavior potential that still exists in some locations.




