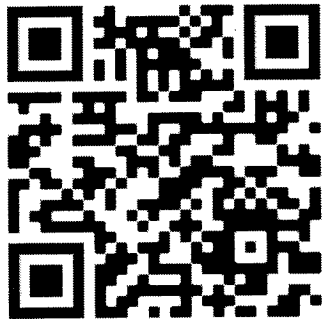


<u>General Situational Awareness:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry and receptive fuel beds, active area for fire history and drought stressed trees. - In the COVID-19 environment, high density populations or large groups are particularly at risk. To help protect yourself, your family and to ensure all employees return home safely, make sure to practice social distancing. - Enhanced hygiene (especially handwashing), PPE & monitoring practices help limit the infection rate of first responders.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: The upper level ridge will remain to our west while a trough is over the middle of the country. As a result, we will maintain a northwest flow aloft over the fire, but winds will be considerably lower. **AVIATION...** Winds will be >=30kts at 12K ft. this morning lowering to 20kts this afternoon.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Sunny.
MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 40-44°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 22-28% **HAINES:** 3 Very Low
(8kft): 18-24%

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Granddaddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain –NW 5-8 mph with gusts to 18 mph until 1000, then WNW at 10-15 mph with gusts 20-25 mph through the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon - NW winds at 3-6 mph with gusts to 14 mph until 1000 MDT, becoming NW at 7-11 mph with gusts to 20 mph.

Inversion: Breaking at 1030.

LAL: 1

OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT:

WEATHER: Mostly clear.
MIN TEMP (10kft): 20-25. **MAX HUMIDITY (10kft):** 26-32%. **HAINES:** 2 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - NW wind 8-12 mph with gusts 18 mph in the evening decreasing to 4-8 mph with gusts 14 mph after midnight.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon – NW 6-10 mph with gusts 18 mph in the evening decreasing to 3-7 mph with gusts 13 mph towards morning.

INVERSION: Strong inversion about 200 feet above drainages.

LAL: 1

OUTLOOK FOR FRIDAY:

WEATHER: Sunny.
MAX TEMPERATURES (10kft): 46-50°F **MIN HUMIDITY (10kft):** 20-26% **HAINES:** 3 Very low

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - W wind 5-8 mph with gusts 16 mph in the morning becoming WSW at 7-10 with gusts to 18 mph during the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West Fork Rock Creek and upper Hells Canyon – Down drainage winds at 4-7 mph with gusts to 12 mph, shifting to up drainage after 1000 at 6-10 mph with gusts to 16 mph.

INVERSION: Strong inversion near 200 ft. above drainages. Breaking about 1030.

LAL: 1

EXTENDED FORECAST: The overall pattern into the weekend is the ridge to our west with a trough to our east. However, this pattern is forecast to go through a transition with the trough weakening and retrograding westward to a location over Montana by Wednesday. How this transition manifests itself will have an impact on the temperatures and winds from Saturday through Wednesday. However, confidence is moderate that winds will be predominantly NW or W. Temperatures should be slightly above normal (near 50°F) Saturday and Sunday, but then mostly near or below normal (low to mid 40s) Monday through Wednesday. Min RHs should remain elevated between 25-35% compared to recent weeks and winds should be WNW around 10-15 mph with gusts of 20-30 mph.

Temps at ICP will be near 30°F tonight

Discussion: Sunny, lighter winds, decreased RH and slightly higher temps
Weather: Sunny
Max Temp: 40-44°F **Min RH:** 18-28% **LAL:** 1 **Haines:** 3
Winds (20 Foot):
Ridgetop – Granddaddy Basin/Lake Fork Mountain –NW 5-8 mph with gusts to 18 mph until 1000, then WNW at 10-15 mph with gusts 20-25 mph through the afternoon.
Slope/Valley – West Fork Rock Creek and Hells Canyon - NW winds at 3-6 mph with gusts to 14 mph until 1000 MDT, becoming NW at 7-11 mph with gusts to 20 mph.

Today's General Fire Behavior: Decreased winds will moderate fire behavior today. However; sunny skies and decreased RH will still allow for fire to be active. Expect isolated torching, roll out with uphill runs and spot fires within conifer stands.
Maximum spotting distance: 0.4-mile Probability of Ignition: 55% ERC =78 (90% =82)

Fuels: Fuels remain dry due to lack of spring rains and non-existent monsoons for the last 3 years. All fuel size classes have been near critical levels for months. Live fuels are entering dormancy which means they are reaching their driest state. The fire is mainly burning in mixed conifer stands with heavy dead/down and a shrub understory. Many of these stands have an extremely high mortality rate with a 50% or more standing snag component.

Topography: Steep rugged canyons and bluffs that top out into high elevation meadows and lake systems. Large rocky fuel breaks occur within the higher elevation bluffs. Isolated areas of continuous fuel occur within the escarpment where fire will have the ability to move.

Specific Fire Behavior:
Mixed conifer stands with heavy dead and down: Expect isolated torching and possible spot fires or roll out with uphill runs. Maximum ROS 10-18 ch/hr and flame length 8-10 feet.
Aspen stands: Minimal fire behavior, creeping and smoldering. Maximum ROS 1-2 ch/hr and flame length less than 1 foot.
Sagebrush and grass: Expect fire to move rapidly if it becomes established within this fuel type. Maximum ROS 21-43 ch/hr and flame length 5-7 feet.
Lake Fork Drainage: NW winds along with lower RH, clear skies, and dry fuels will allow for fire to burn actively through the drainage today. Mixed conifer with heavy dead and down is the prominent fuel type within the drainage.


Air Ops/Smoke Dispersion
Inversion breaking at 1030 and lighter winds

Safety

- Walking pace on flat ground is 3 mph which is 240 ch/hr. Know your pace compared to fires rate of spread on the ground you are working in.
- Flame lengths 4-8 feet are too intense for direct attack on the head with hand tools.
- Flame lengths 8-11 feet present serious control problems, torching, crowning and spotting.





- Review and follow crew and division plans to isolate, triage, and transport symptomatic personnel.

Hygiene on the Fireline

- Properly wash or sanitize your hands often, especially before and after eating or entering a public place, and after coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid handshakes and communal use items.
- Maintain a supply of hand sanitizer and hand wipes. Inform supervisor of needed resupply.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often:
 - o Radios, phones, doors, pumps, fuel cans, etc.

Social Distancing and Protective Equipment

- Initiate, practice, and remind others of social distancing.
- Conduct briefings and conversations outdoors and at least 6 feet apart.
- Utilize face coverings as a tool when practical.
- Clean or replace dirty face coverings, equipment, and PPE.

Communications


