Increasing temperatures and decreasing RH values will continue throughout the remainder of the week and into the beginning of the weekend. The increased fire behavior is expected to start around Friday with RH reaching the teens. Forecasted winds will be breezy/windy Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday.</b></p>																																					

<p><b>36. Projected Incident Activity, Potential, Movement, Escalation, or Spread and influencing factors during the next operational period and in 12-, 24-, 48-, and 72-hour time frames:</b>  <b>(Overnight)</b>          12 hours: <b>Smoldering and creeping expected in all groups with minimal fire behavior for this timeframe. The below conditions exist as weather warms and dries.</b></p>
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**Scarface Group: Continued fire activity near the tributaries of Md. Fk. Salmon River and Little Soldier Creek and Marble Creek with fire spread northwest. Backing fire into Thomas Creek and Little Creek towards the Md. Fk. Salmon River potentially impacting Sater Cabin and Thomas Creek Airport.**

**Seafoam Group: Continued burning in the eastern portion of the Seafoam area with active fire in Corduroy spreading northeast. Fire continues to impact the Mountain King Mine vicinity. Active fire will continue in Seafoam Creek.**

**Sulphur Group: Potential for backing and flanking south of Sulfur Creek and east of Silver Moon Creek impacting Sulphur Cr. Ranch. Active backing into the wind in the Blue Bunch Mtn. southwest towards the Blue Bunch/Bear Valley creek and Boundary creek. Fire will spread in Md. Fk. Salmon drainage.**

**Pistol Group: Fire continues to back west and southwest, down slope from the headwaters of Cabin Creek drainage towards Rapid River drainage.**

**(Friday)**

**Predicted increase in fire behavior with the forecasted winds.**

**Scarface Group: Fire in Little Creek may be pushed further north east by predicted winds. Fire in Little Soldier Lookout area will be directed back into the main fire.**

**24 hours: Seafoam Group: Continued burning/smoldering in the eastern portion of the Sheep Mtn. Mine and Sheep Mtn. Road area will continue. Fire movement could align with fuels and topography, moving the fire updrainage towards the Seafoam GS.**

**Sulphur Group: Southwest winds will direct fire spread further south and east. Movement will be minimized by backing fire due to predicted southwest winds.**

**Pistol Group: Fire continues to back west and southwest, down slope from the headwaters of Cabin Creek drainage towards Rapid River drainage.**

**(Saturday)**

**48 hours: All Groups: Warming and drying expected to increase fire behavior. Isolated torching and group torching is expected with possible short runs due to drying trend and alignment with terrain.**

**(Sunday)**

**72 hours: Drying trend with rising temperatures and a drop in RH over the fire area. Fire established in the areas of each group identified in the 12-hour timeframe may result in increased fire behavior and ROS.**

**(Monday and beyond)**

**Anticipated after 72 hours: Forecast on Monday shows increase in gusty winds, Tuesday predicted cold front passage with a chance of moisture.**
