Overnight conditions will moderate with temperatures, clouds, and possible moisture.</p>	
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Pistol/Scarface Group: Fire continues to back west and southwest, down slope from the headwaters of Cabin Creek drainage towards Rapid River drainage. Continued fire activity near the tributaries of Md. Fk. Salmon River and Little Soldier Creek and Marble Creek with fire spread northwest.

Seafoam Group: Continued burning in the eastern portion of the Seafoam area with active fire in Corduroy spreading northeast. Active fire will continue in Seafoam Creek.

Sulphur Group: Potential for backing and flanking south of Sulfur Creek and east of Silver Moon Creek impacting Sulphur Cr. Ranch. Active backing into the wind in the Blue Bunch Mtn. southwest towards the Blue Bunch/Bear Valley creek and Boundary creek. Fire could spread in Md. Fk. Salmon drainage.

(Tuesday)

Predicted decrease in fire behavior with the forecasted weather.

Pistol/Scarface Group: Fire in Little Creek will continue to creep further northeast by predicted winds. Fire in Little Soldier Lookout area will continue to back into Cabin Creek Drainage.

24 hours: **Seafoam Group:** Increased potential for creeping with single tree torching in the eastern portion of the Sheep Mtn. Mine and Sheep Mtn. Road area. Fire activity will continue in the Lucinda Creek area.

Sulphur Group: Southwest winds will limit the fire spread with backing fire and possible short runs when alignment occurs. Movement has been observed and will continue southwest of Blue Bunch Mtn. towards Ayers Meadows, backing occurring south of Sulphur Springs Ranch, creeping, flanking and isolated torching could continue.

Continued moist and cooler temperatures.

Pistol/Scarface Group: Fire in Little Creek will continue to creep further northeast by predicted winds. Fire in Little Soldier Lookout area will continue to back into Cabin Creek Drainage.

48 hours: **Seafoam Group:** Increased potential for creeping with single tree torching in the eastern portion of the Sheep Mtn. Mine and Sheep Mtn. Road area. Fire activity will continue in the Lucinda Creek area.

Sulphur Group: Southwest winds will limit the fire spread with backing fire and possible short runs when alignment occurs. Movement has been observed and will continue southwest of Blue Bunch Mtn. towards Ayers Meadows, backing occurring south of Sulphur Springs Ranch, creeping, flanking and isolated torching could continue.

72 hours: **(Thursday)**

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Cooler temperatures with clearer skies and drying.

Pistol/Scarface Group: Fire in Little Creek will continue to creep further northeast by predicted winds. Fire in Little Soldier Lookout area will continue to creep in to Cabin Creek Drainage.

Seafoam Group: Continued burning/smoldering in the eastern portion of the Sheep Mtn. Mine and Sheep Mtn. Road area will continue. Fire activity will continue in the Lucinda Creek area.

Sulphur Group: Southwest winds will limit the fire spread with backing fire and posable short runs when alignment occurs. Movement has been observed and will continue southwest of Blue Bunch Mtn. towards Ayers Meadows, backing occurring south of Sulphur Springs Ranch, creeping, flanking and isolated torching could continue.

Anticipated after 72 hours: **(Friday and beyond)**
Cooler temperatures, possibly back to drying trend.
