**Incident Objectives**

- Prioritize sound risk management to provide for incident responder and public safety.
- Minimize loss or damage to threatened communities and resources by implementing strategies with reasonable probability of success while balancing responder risk appropriately.
- In coordination with resource advisors protect whitebark pine during suppression action, avoid cutting, and limit fire intensities from planned firing operations.
- Protect threatened and endangered fish species habitat by limiting impacts within Riparian Conservation Areas by restricting retardant use in the 300' buffer on either side of streams.
- A 600' restriction on retardant use is required in Chinook Salmon spawning areas. Limit fire intensities from burnouts in RCA's.

**Management Objectives**

- Protect property, improvements, and infrastructure.
- Ensure coordinated, timely and accurate release of public information.
- Foster and maintain relationships with all cooperators and stakeholders.
- Protect economic, natural, cultural and heritage resources.
- Maintain fiscal accountability and keep costs commensurate with values at risk.

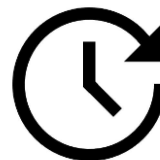
