Gusts 25-35 mph are likely, and gusts to 40 mph are possible on SW aspect unsheltered slopes. Otherwise, although we will cool off slightly Thu, temps will remain 5 to 10 degrees above normal. 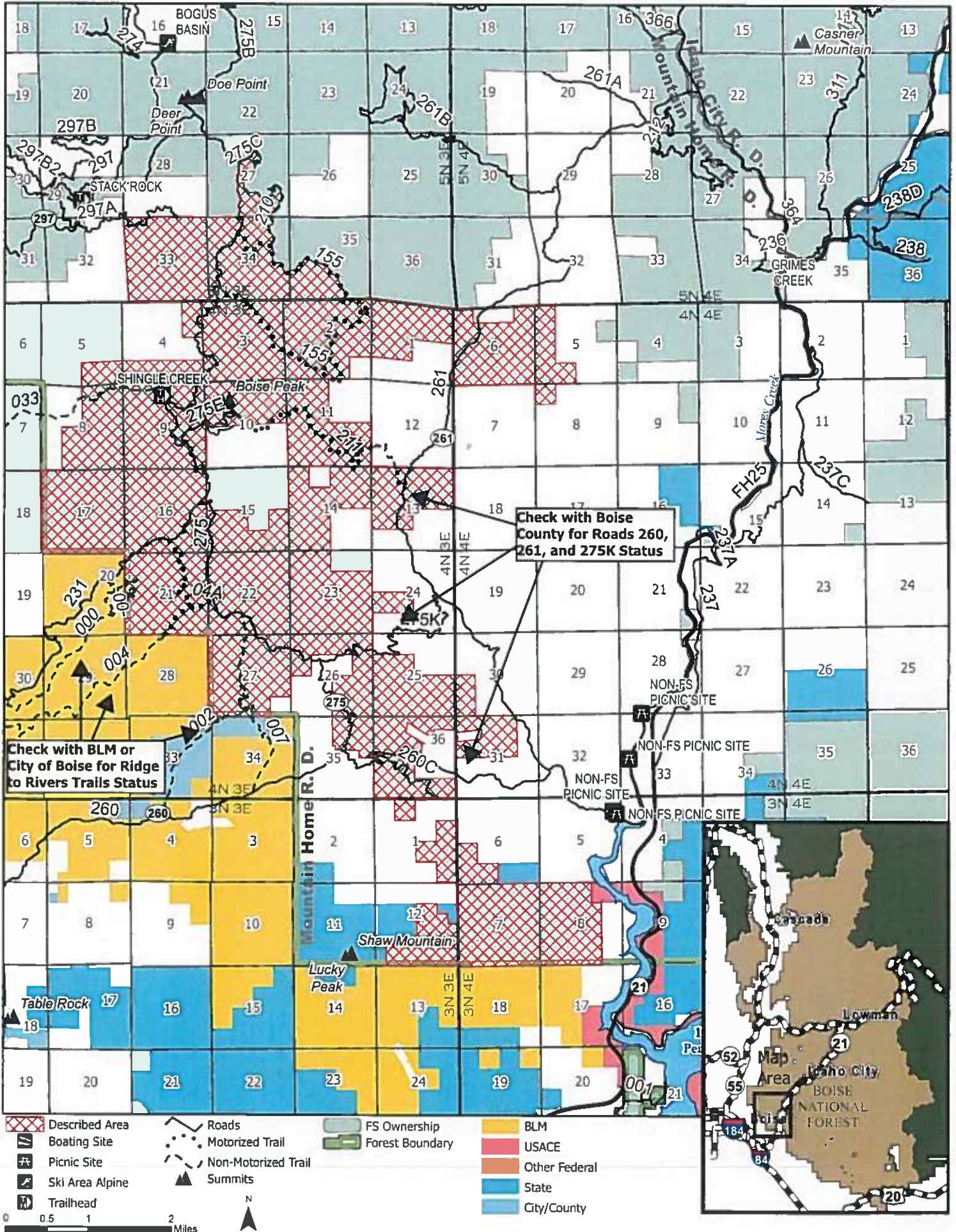

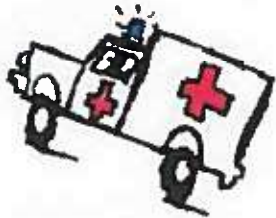

IF IT'S PREDICTABLE - IT'S PREVENTABLE



***ALL HAZARDS** are to be **MITIGATED, GUARDED AGAINST** or **WARNED**: Look up - down - around and eliminated it if possible; post guards or barriers if you can't eliminate it; Flag & "Brief" if you can't eliminate or guard.

***DEHYDRATION** - It can take it's toll=illnesses, little boo-boos. So drink lots of **WATER**. Strive to drink enough to P-N-3 about every 20 minutes.

***AIR OPERATIONS** - maintain good communications with other ground units and aircraft in your area. Ground crews must maintain a safe distance during bucket drops.

***TRANSPORTATION** - When traveling to & from incidents - lights on, use seatbelts, & never exceed posted speed limits. Don't allow fatigue to control your vehicle. Share driving responsibilities between licensed operators. Watch out for road construction, livestock, wildlife and pedestrians. Drive Defensively!

***EQUIPMENT** - When following a dozer unit stay at least 50 feet behind. Never approach a working dozer unit unless you have the attention of the operator.

***UTILITIES & TOWERS** - Deploy line scouts to identify and mark the location of potential hazards. Ensure that all ground forces are advised of the location. Ensure that all personnel & equipment utilize headlamps & light systems during evening operations.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
