.DISCUSSION...

Idaho: Scattered to numerous showers and thunderstorms will continue well into the overnight hours. Strong outflow winds of 25-40 mph with isolated higher gusts is the primary concern with any storm activity. Locally heavy rain will also occur right under storm cores. Shower and thunderstorm activity will gradually diminish from west to east on Friday. Daytime temperatures will cool considerably on Friday with Min RH coming up compared to today. Relatively mild temperatures continue over the weekend with another chance of showers and thunderstorms by Sunday along a cold front. Westerly winds will also be notable Friday into Saturday, especially on ridgetops.

<b>FUELS: Cougar Rock Complex- 10 fires</b>	
<p>Mixed conifer forest dominated by Western Red Cedar, Douglas Fir, Western Larch, and Grand Fir. Subalpine Alpine Fir, Engelman Spruce and Lodge Pole Pine at the higher elevations (&gt;4,800'). All age and size classes of conifer fuels are present with relatively high crown bulk density and low crown base heights. Light to moderate amounts of dead fine fuels and logging/thinning slash will contribute to surface fire spread. Herbaceous and live woody fuels are green and will generally not contribute to fire spread.</p> <p><b>Fine Fuels: 9%; 10-hr: 10%; 100hr: 20%; 1000hr: 17% (These values adjusted for recent rain showers last Sun-Mon)</b></p> <p><b>ERC: 28, below 90<sup>th</sup> percentile. Max spotting distance: 0.2 Mile plus with ridgetop winds</b></p>	
<b>OUTPUTS - FIRE BEHAVIOR</b>	
<b>General:</b>	
<p>Expect minimal to low active surface and ground fire. The rain showers we received Sunday/Monday may have penetrated the tree canopy to wet surface fuels to various extent. Smolder and creep may be common in some areas, while tree torching/short range spotting in unburnt areas could occur within the fires and areas of unsecured line. Live fuels and young conifer plantations should discourage crown fire activity. Except in the SAF/ES stands (i.e. Goat Fire) fire activity should remain on the ground under dense canopies and sheltered sites. Fire primarily moving in activity fuels/slash and jackpots of dead/down/litter. Both on and off-site smoke will damper fire activity. Warmer and dryer weather may not immediately increase fire behavior as the effects of precipitation lingers for several days.</p> <p>Backing/flanking spread &lt;2-3 ft/min with flames &lt;2-3 ft. Head fire with possible &lt;5-7 ft. flame lengths and &lt;16 ft/min rates of spread on the steeper sites, higher with torching and when slope and wind align. <b>(These values are decreased from what was experienced prior to the rain showers last Sun-Mon)</b></p>	
<b>Specific:</b>	
<p><b>Benton Fires:</b> Continued, but slower movement to the N/NW toward the Reservoir. Fire will move towards the tether line on the east side of the fire.</p> <p><b>Butte Creek:</b> Continued but slower fire growth to the E/NE of Thompson Point and towards the Reservoir. Thompson Creek is currently suppressing fire growth.</p> <p><b>Goat Creek:</b> Sub-alpine fir will continue to promote minor fire spotting through single tree and group tree torching. Fire spread is less likely following the rain showers last Sunday/Monday and those forecasted for Thursday through Saturday. Interior burning will continue to occur but with reduced intensity because of moisture received.</p> <p><b>Probability of Ignition (PIG): 46%</b></p>	
<b>AIR OPERATIONS:</b> Notable impact to aviation will be area smoke, lingering low clouds and possible thunderstorms; afternoon winds on Friday as well as gusty and erratic winds from thunderstorms are additional operational concerns.

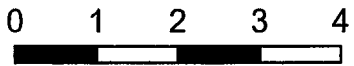

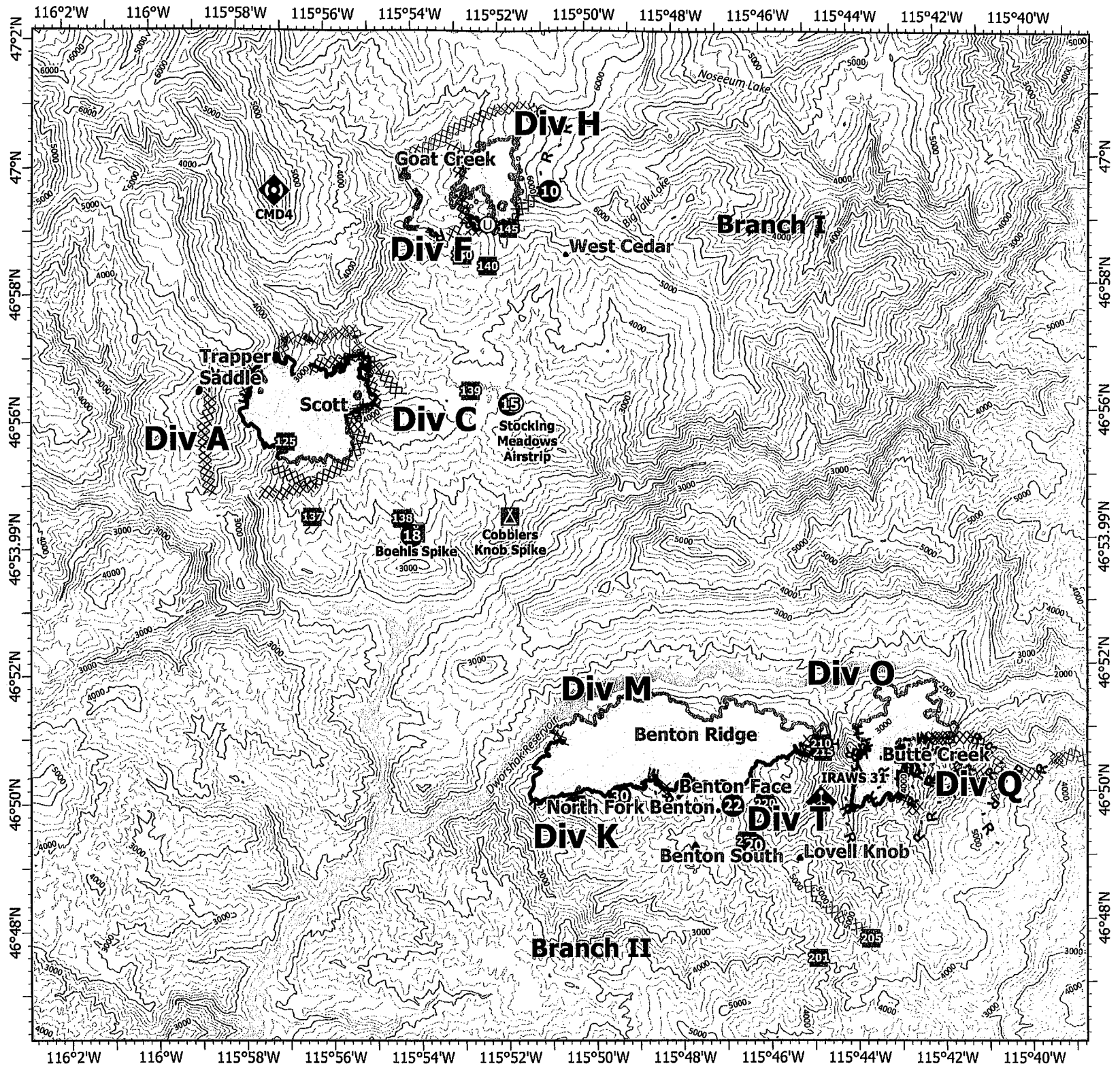
