Major Hazards and Risks All Divisions

- **DRIVING:** Wear seat belts. Drive slowly/ defensively at all times and maintain safe vehicle separation distances. Use spotters at all times when backing or in tight areas.
- **DEHYDRATION:** Drink lots of water with some Gatorade or some other electrolyte drink. We have been in a cooling trend, but hot, dry weather patterns may be just around the corner. Drinking lots of fluids is the only way to prevent dehydration.

POINTS TO PONDER

- >Drive Smart – Look up Six Minutes For Safety -DRIVING.
- >Look Up – Wildland firefighters are being killed and/or injured more annually from falling snags.
- >Look Down – Ash pits and stump holes are the most common cause of burn injuries (just a few days ago we had a firefighter with second and third degree burns in North Ops from an ash pit!).
- >Look Around – FF’S can be the cause of, and recipient of rolling debris. Especially during rainfall events.
- > Stay Focused – Multiple resources of multiple typing doing multiple jobs = Multiple potential for injury.

.DISCUSSION...

Idaho: A cold front will move through the region early Sunday morning. Breezy southwest winds are anticipated ahead of the front, becoming more west to northwesterly behind the front. Wetting rain chances are high for the Clearwater/Nez Perce, but less likely further west in the Palouse/Hells Canyon. A few thunderstorms will be possible across the southern half of the fire zones, which could result in gusty and erratic outflow winds. Cooler and more moist RHs will persist into Monday with a warming and drying trend going into mid next week.

- * Sky/Weather.....Partly cloudy. Rain in the morning. Chance of rain showers and slight chance of thunderstorms in the afternoon.
- * Max Temperature.....65-75 valleys and 55-65 ridges.

Mop-up Guidelines

Mop-up from the fire edge to a distance interior that:

- 1.) Minimizes hazard exposure to suppression resources;
- 2.) Is commensurate to the risk of escape from torching and spotting;
- 3.) Is a minimum distance of 100 feet if firefighter safety is not compromised.

Concentrate on ragged green fingers or islands that have potential to torch and spot. One hundred percent mop-up of all spot fires outside the perimeter.
