The presence of forecasted cloud cover and higher humidities should keep potential for increased fire activity to a minimum. If thunderstorms should develop and lightning ignite new fires, there is potential for large fire growth in the event the storms do not produce ample precipitation. The Clearwater Complex is still mainly smoldering as well as each of the fires in the Municipal Complex.

There continues to be a slight risk to the Community of Pierce. The Northern portion of the Clearwater Complex (known as the Lolo 2 fire area) contains unburned fuels near the holding lines. Close attention is focused in the

12 hours: Lolo drainage area for any potential flare ups. Any fire escaping containment could move rapidly up the drainage with ground fire, group torching and short crown runs that may have impacts to the Community of Weippe located approximately 3 miles to the Northeast.

The communities of Weippe and Pierce may become impacted should the Clearwater fire become active.
