**OBEY FIRE BANS**

Help prevent wildfires!

**OBEY FIRE RESTRICTIONS**

Pack a shovel, fire extinguisher, and a bucket of water.

Be prepared to put out a fire.

Build your burn pile away from woodland or brushland.

**LEARN before you BURN**

Check for burn restrictions!

Check if burning restrictions or bans are in effect. Contact your local fire department or:

Consider using campfire alternatives

Make sure your fire is **Dead Out!**

**Drown Stir Feel**

When fire danger is high, delay your burn or consider composting.

**Consider burning alternatives.**

When fire danger is high, or when restrictions are in effect, delay your burn or consider composting.

**Make sure your burn pile is dead out.**

Drown, stir and drown again. Make sure it is out by feeling with your hand.

Before you burn, check for burn bans and restrictions in effect.

**Avoid burning when it's hot, dry and windy.**

Check for county and state burn restrictions.

Avoid parking or driving on dry grass. Your vehicle can start a wildfire.

When it gets hot, vegetation like leaves and grass dry out.

Low humidity and lack of rain will make these fuels more flammable.

Wind spreads flames faster. A small fire can spread quickly.

**Don't burn on hot, dry, windy days.**

Don't burn when it's warm, dry and windy.

Sky lanterns are illegal in Oregon airspace.
