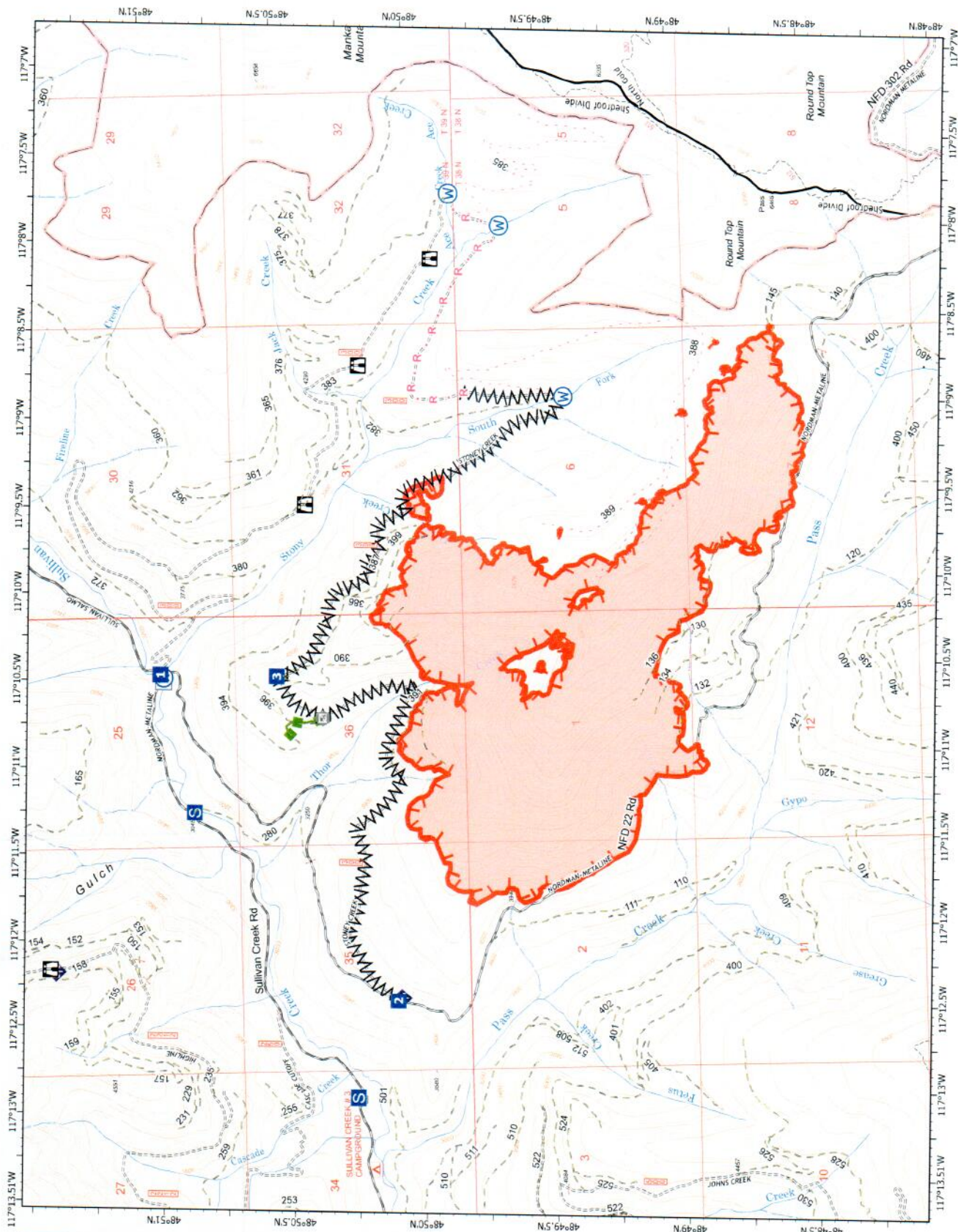

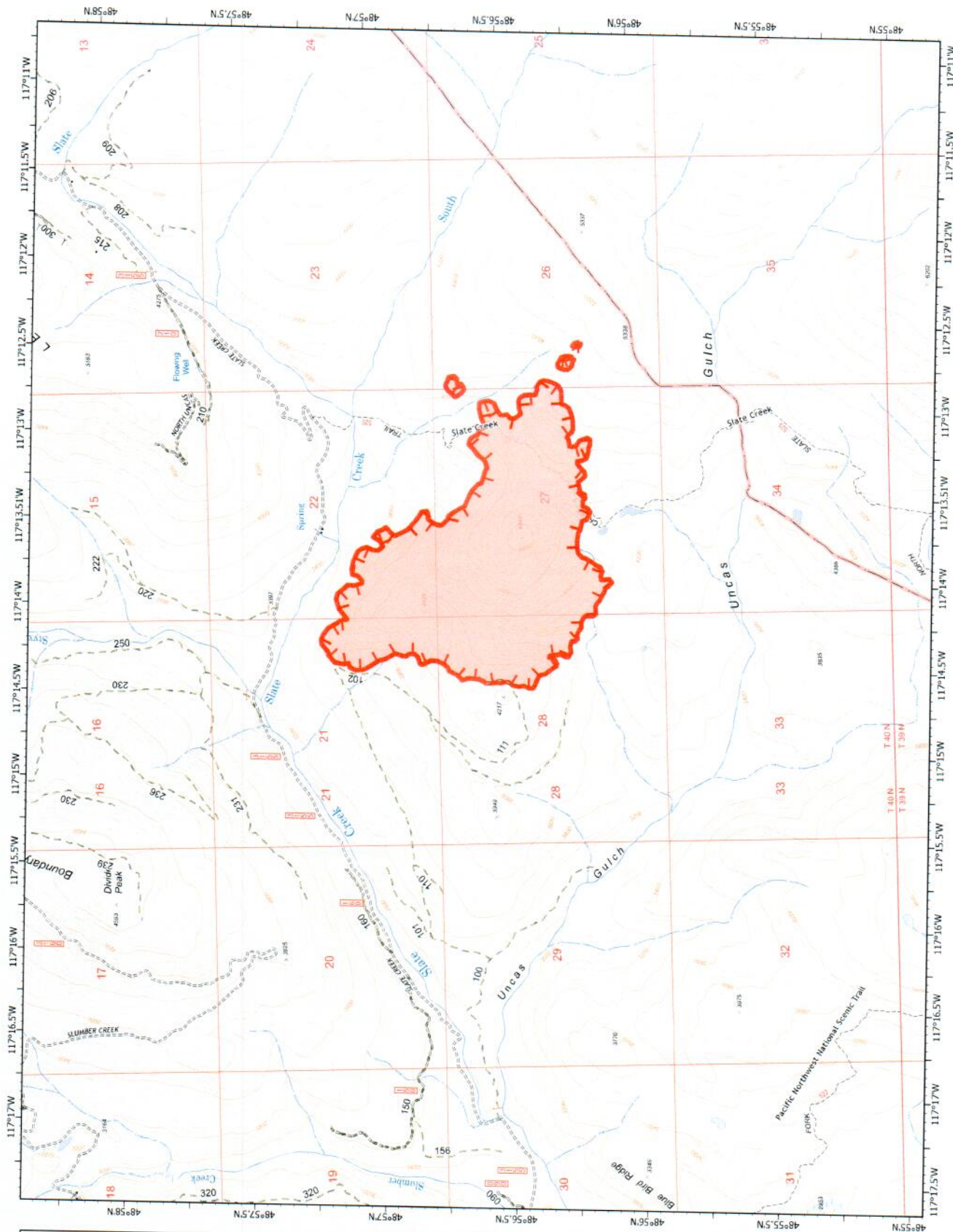

.DISCUSSION...

Pressure gradients relax Saturday as high pressure builds over the region, giving way to lighter east winds at the Thor fire. More terrain driven winds are anticipated Saturday night into Sunday while mixing levels decrease. It will remain dry with poor relative humidity recoveries through the weekend. Temperatures gradually warm a few degrees each day, peaking by Sunday afternoon.

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Major Hazards and Risks: YOUR PERSONAL HEALTH, ATTITUDE /COMPLACANCY; ROADS/DRIVING(Dust); SNAGS, COMMUNICATIONS, DEHYDRATION!!!

LCES- LOOKOUTS, COMMUNICATIONS, ESCAPE ROUTES, and SAFETY "ZONES".

Fire Order of the Day –Be alert. Keep calm. Think clearly. Act decisively.
"We are committed to Zero Tolerance of carelessness and unsafe actions."

ATTITUDE/Complacency- affects our judgment and how we respond to hazards on the fireline such as snags, rolling rocks or even driving. We get used to a particular area and think it will be the same as yesterday, but sometimes it's not the same. Yesterday's green tree may have burned out from a burnout operation and a slight breeze will send it down. THERE is still FIRE OUT THERE.

DRIVING- ROAD HAZARDS are around the very next corner- so BUCKLE UP- USE HEADLIGHTS, tap that horn, GEAR DOWN and GO SLOW. Drive defensively – watch out for the other guy. Fire vehicles must clean windshields regularly. DUST!!!

DRINKING WATER- Increase YOUR water consumption- just because it isn't "hot and dry" now doesn't negate your body's need for fluid replenishment.

Serious accidents are preceded by 100,000 to 250,000 unsafe behaviors/acts! - actions that are most deadly are "High Risk - Low Frequency", those are dangerous tasks we don't do often (sound familiar).

COMMON DEMONINATOR of a TRAGEDY = they didn't think it would happen to them; the specter of COMPALCENCY says to you: "Hey this is no problem, nothing is happening here, it's just a holding action, or mop up, you've done it this way 250,000 times before, and it's so much easier." YOU ARE SETTING YOURSELF UP.

IF IT'S PREDICTABLE - IT'S PREVENTABLE

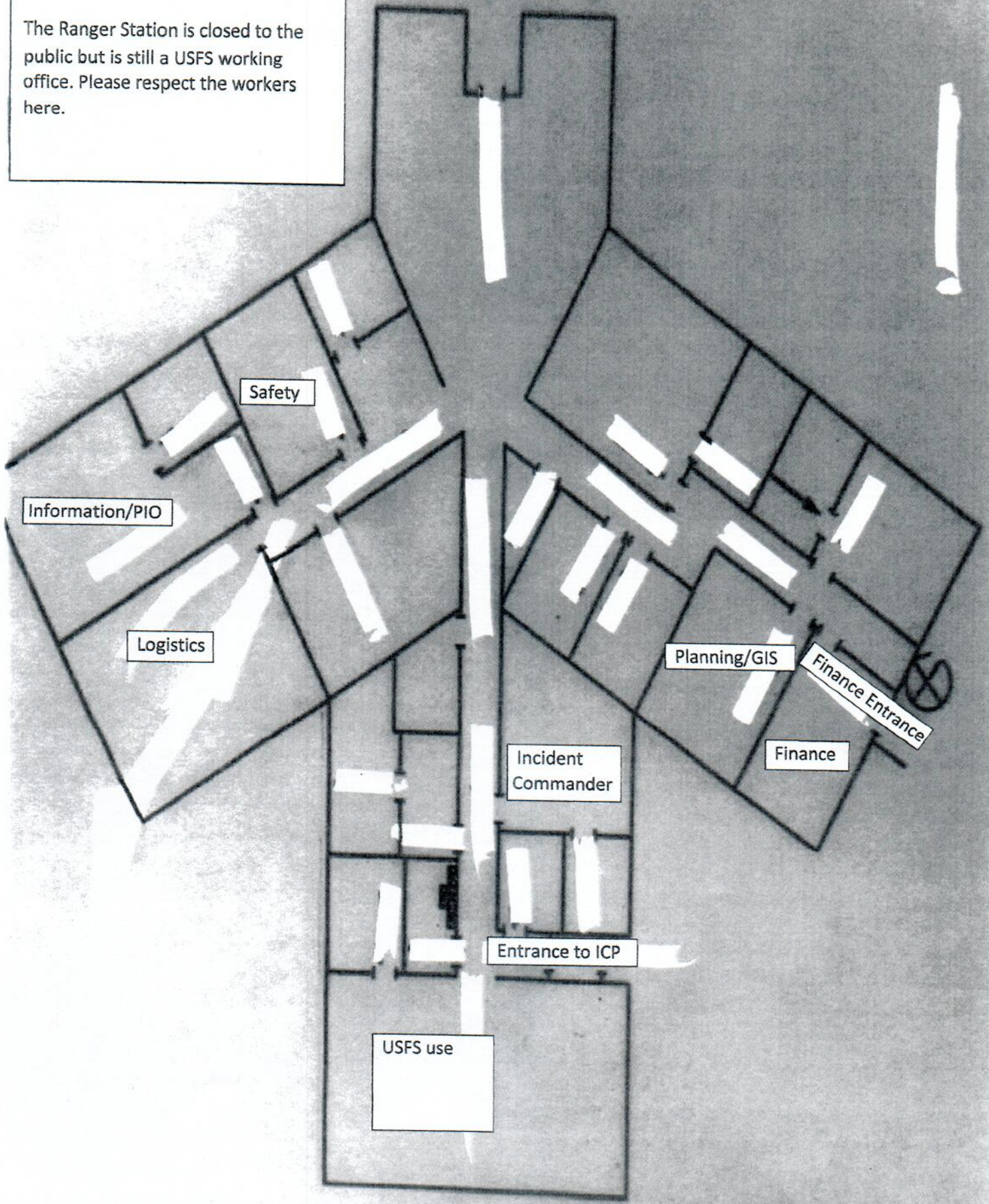
