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HEALTH & SAFETY MESSAGE

Firefighter & Public Safety Is The #1 Priority

Remember: **IF IT'S PREDICTABLE ITS PREVENTIBLE!**

Safety Checklist

LCES must be established & known to **ALL** firefighters **BEFORE** needed.

Ensure that all members of your crew are fully briefed on conditions and actions and that this situational awareness is maintained throughout the operational period.

Drink enough water to replace fluids lost through perspiration. Drink at least one quart of water per hour. Symptoms of heat related problems include: elevated body temperature, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, fainting, muscle cramps, seizures and confusion. Treatment includes getting the patient out of the hot environment, implementing cooling measures, rest and rehydration. **Monitor each other for heat related illnesses!**

Remain alert to other activities around you; others may not realize that you are in the area.

Utilize activity appropriate PPE when working with power equipment.

Operate apparatus in a safe and prudent manner; turn your headlights on! Utilize all safety restraints provided on vehicles. Do not exceed posted speed limits Operate apparatus as to provide for fire fighter and public safety. Utilize **LCES** to improve safety when operating on roadways. Watch for livestock and wildlife.

Avoid **COMPLACENCY**. Complacency on the job injures and kills. It can spread from one worker to another. Keep your Situational Awareness high, and communicate hazards you see.

Review Safety Zones in IRPG on page 6, in your crew briefing.

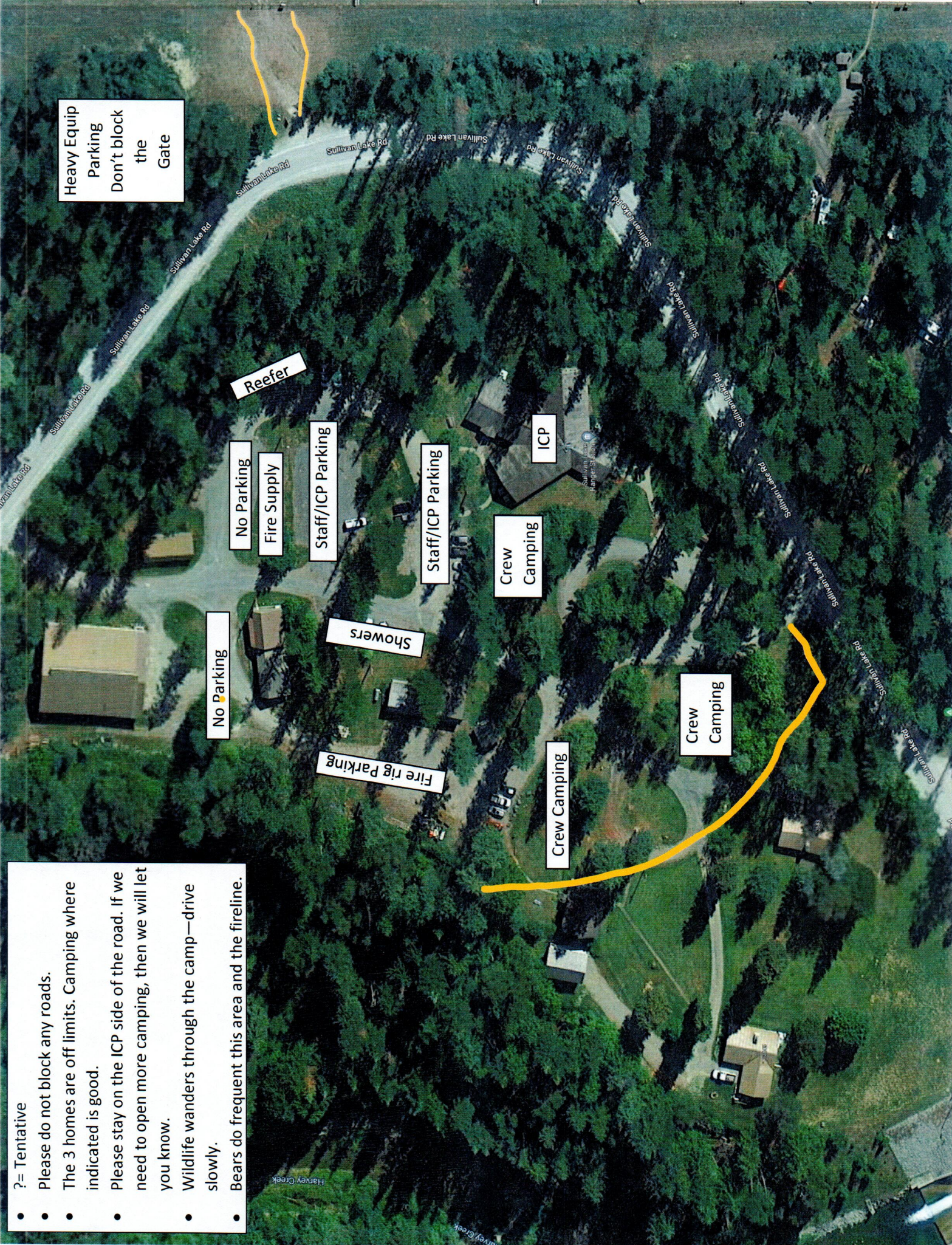

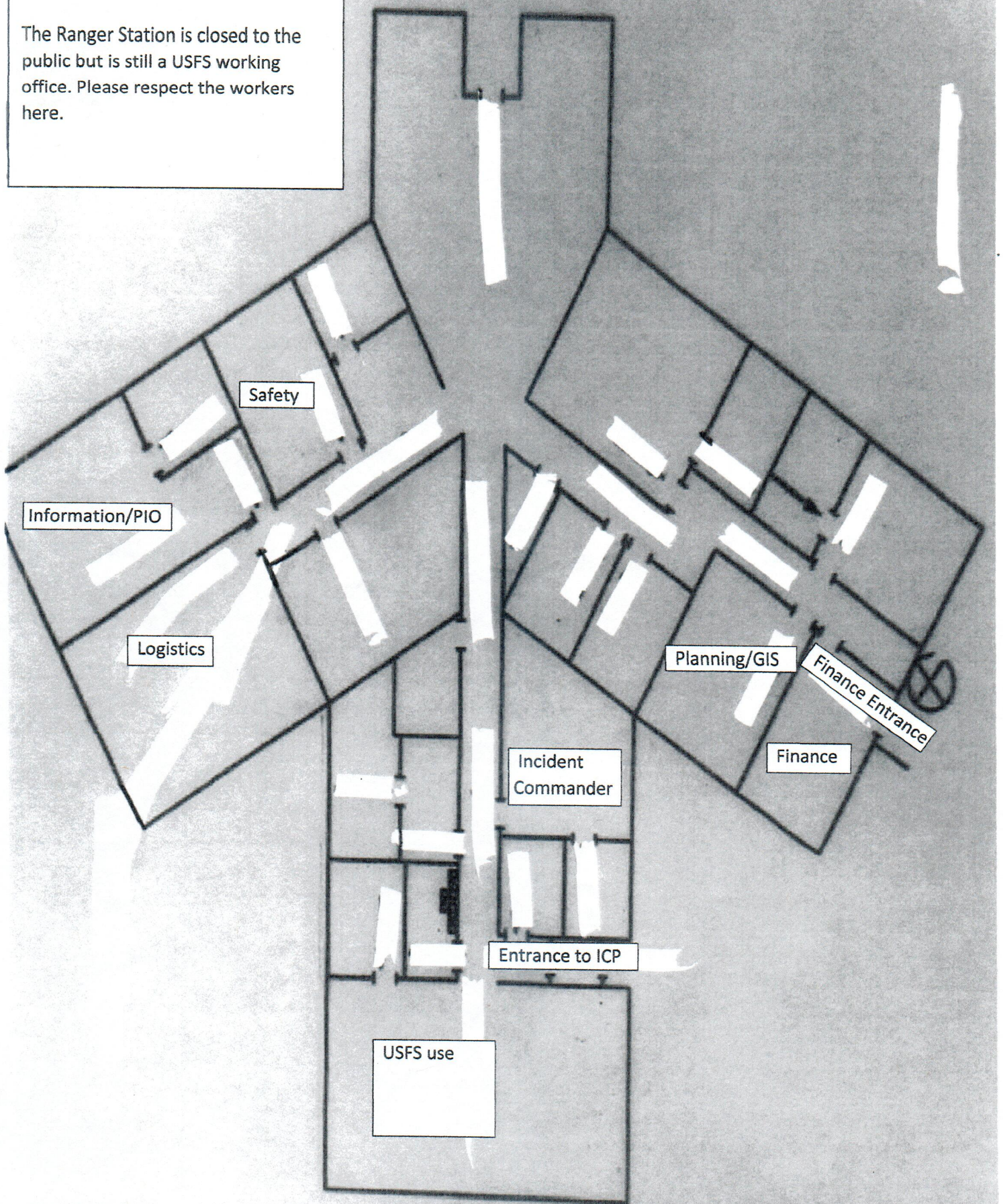
