


<p>1) Protection of human life and safety is the first priority for all actions taken on a wildfire and can overrule all other strategic and incident objectives and management and incident requirements.</p> <p>2) Base management decisions on meeting objectives while also minimizing the risk of COVID-19 exposure to responders and the public. COVID-19 considerations may alter how you meet goals but should not lead to higher-risk tactics.</p> <p>3) Focus on strategies and tactics that reduce exposure to COVID19 and smoke impacts to local communities.</p> <p>4) Protect the WUI infrastructure at Diamond Lake (109 recreation residences, Diamond Lake Resort, FS campgrounds, ODFW facility) and Lemolo Lake (Lemolo Lake Resort/KOA, Pacificorps facilities, FS campgrounds) from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of highly valued assets.</p> <p>5) Ensure safe passage for public on Hwy 138 as it is a major east-west transportation route which would impact both the public and fire personnel access.</p> <p>6) Protect Sandshed/ODOT site near Hwy 138/FS Road 2610 from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of partner buildings and heavy equipment, staging area.</p> <p>7) Protect isolated Forest assets in the area (FS campgrounds at both Diamond Lake and Lemolo Lake, Hwy 138, Cinnamon Butte, Powder magazine at Mt. Bailey, and Hemlock Butte Ski Cabin) from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of valued Forest infrastructure.</p> <p>8) Coordinate suppression and suppression repair actions with the lead READ to ensure that impacts to the Oregon Cascades Resource Area are mitigated.</p>

Weather Discussion: With the ridge of high pressure remaining in place, the forecast becomes rather repetitive over the next few days. Temperatures rise into the 80s with humidity dipping into the teens. Winds continue to be terrain driven and will be similar to yesterday. Temperatures towards the tail end of the week recede a bit, but still remain well above normal with slightly higher daytime humidity values.

Winds remain light and dominated by terrain features and diurnal cycles.

FIRE BEHAVIOR DISCUSSION

GENERAL: Another day of warmer and drier weather will further promote fire behavior potential in fuels which were historically dry prior to the rain events of the past 10 days

Predicted Fire Behavior:

Further transition into drier conditions, coupled with moderate overnight relative humidity recovery and higher daytime temperatures, will now bring 100 and 1000 hour fuels back into burn availability and will smolder and creep where ignition sources are present. 1 and 10 hour fuels are fully available. In lighter fuels exposed to terrain wind, expect spread rates between 100 and 200 feet per hour. Flame lengths will remain at less than 2 feet.

Probability of Ignition:

After yesterday drying and last night's moderate relative humidity recovery **POI** is predicted to be near **73%**.

SPECIFIC:

Today: Both divisions continue to hold isolated interior heat. These heat sources remain the areas in which smoldering and creeping continue to be expected.

Tonight: Moderate humidity recovery overnight, coupled with minimal downslope and downvalley winds will stall fire spread.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Clear skies and mild winds should allow for good air operations opportunity throughout the burn period.

SAFETY:

Wildland fire personnel have experienced a long fire season leading up to October 1st. With many weeks of season left resources should take advantage of rest periods and ensure cumulative fatigue and complacency doesn't compromise personal safety.

LEARN MORE ABOUT FIRE BEHAVIOR---

The Fire Danger PocketCard provides a format for interpreting and communicating key index values provided by the National Fire Danger Rating System. The objective is to lead to greater awareness of fire danger and subsequently increased firefighter safety. The PocketCard has very important day-to-day "pre-suppression" use. The 'Local Thresholds' and 'Past Experience' information has been built by local subject matter experts and are specific to identified conditions and variables that fire responders should be aware of and understand, prior to operations. When the morning and afternoon weather is read each day, the actual and predicted indices are announced. Firefighters can reference their card and assess where today falls in the range of historical values for danger-rating.

50th Percentile -- 10% of the 3039 days from 1998 - 2017 had an Energy Release Component above 58

Local Thresholds - Watch out: Combinations of any of these factors can greatly increase fire behavior:
20' Wind Speed over 13 mph, RH less than 25%,
Temperature over 85, 1000-Hour Fuel Moisture less than 12

Remember what Fire Danger tells you:

- ✓ Energy Release Component gives seasonal trends calculated from 2 pm temperature, humidity, daily temperature & rh ranges, and grassp duration.
- ✓ Wind is NOT part of ERC calculation.
- ✓ Watch local conditions and variations across the landscape -- Fuel, Weather, Topography.
- ✓ Listen to weather forecasts -- especially WIND.

Past Experience:

Data Range: 20yr
Watch Out: When dry fuels combine with any of the following: Haines 5 or 6, alignment of wind and slope, or poor RH recovery. Substantial holding concerns may result. Some Siches found on tree bark in timber stands. Note that fires often have benign fire behavior for multiple days before conditions cause rapid growth.
Local Thresholds: Extreme fire behavior possible when ERC > 55 aligns with low RH (<12%), especially following several days of poor RH recoveries.
Note: Max Fire Spread Rates on Bobe were experienced late in September around the peak in ERC's for 2009 fire.

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Major Hazards & Risks: *Weather, Heavy Equipment, Falling Snags, Powerlines and Hunting Season.*

Weather/Hydration: Temperatures will continue to be above average throughout the week along with lower relative humidity's. Personnel will need to monitor and increase their hydration intake throughout the day. Remember the recommended 3/1 water-to-sports drink ratios to maintain a healthy balance.

Driving/Heavy Equipment: Driving is one of the most hazardous tasks we do on an incident each day. As we travel to the line and throughout the workday our risk of an accident never decreases. Remain diligent by driving defensively, staying alert, adhering to posted speed limits and always being aware of your surroundings. Heavy equipment operations have specific hazards associated with them. Needs for spotters and road guards around high traffic areas are paramount to safe operations.

Falling Snags/Felling Operations: Hazard trees are throughout the fire area. Ensure you are safe by maintaining situational awareness, looking where you are working, and where you are parking before you engage. There will be fallers along interior roads to drop hazard trees. Fallers make sure you have road guards before felling trees along roadways.

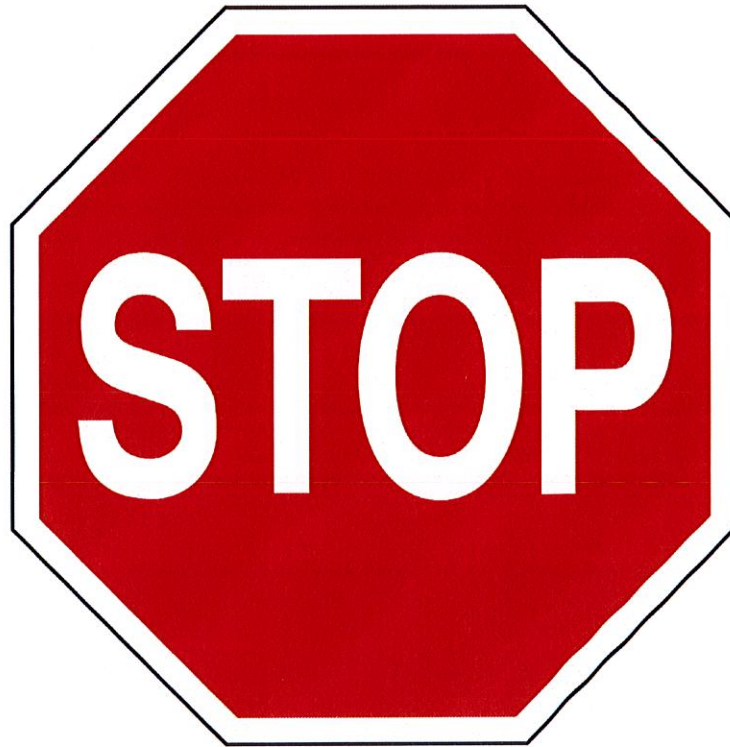
Powerlines: Always treat downed powerlines as if they are LIVE wires. Refer to Powerline Safety in the (IRPG) **Incident Response Pocket Guide** pages 24 & 25.

Hunting Season Opening Soon: Firearms hunting season will open in Western Oregon this Saturday October 3rd. Be aware of increased activity on public lands and increased traffic trying to access areas that may still be under forest closures. Crews need to ensure public safety in any of the area's firefighters are working.

Notice of Right to Representation

As a bargaining unit employee represented by a labor organization, you have the right to request representation from your certified labor organization at any investigative examination/interview where you reasonably believe the examination might result in disciplinary action being taken against you. You may make this request at any time prior to or during the interview. If you request union representation, your agency may opt to: (1) suspend questioning and grant your request then resume the interview; (2) discontinue the interview; or (3) offer you the choice to proceed with the interview without a Union representative or to forego the interview.

Clarification about the Above Notice

If a management representative wants to question you (a bargaining unit employee) about an allegation that you were involved in some occurrence that could result in a proposal to discipline you, Union believes it is in your interest to have a Union representative present when you are questioned. **You have to invoke that right by asking for representation. Management is not obligated to inform you of this right, and they are not obligated to automatically arrange for a Union representative to be present.** In the event that you request representation and a Union representative has not been dispatched to the incident, contact will be made with the Union representative listed above, and arrangements will be made for that representative or his designee to come out on site, or to meet with you by telephone.

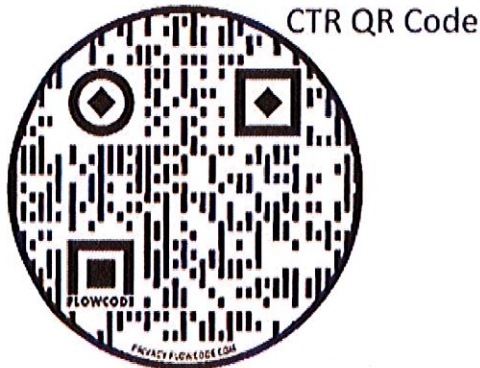

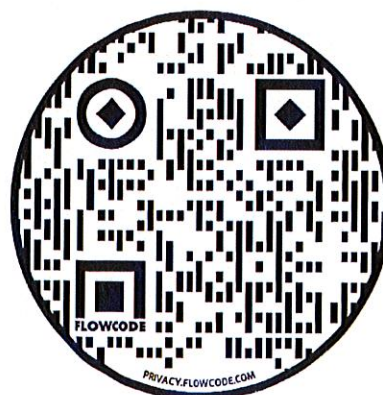

Vehicle Travel Info

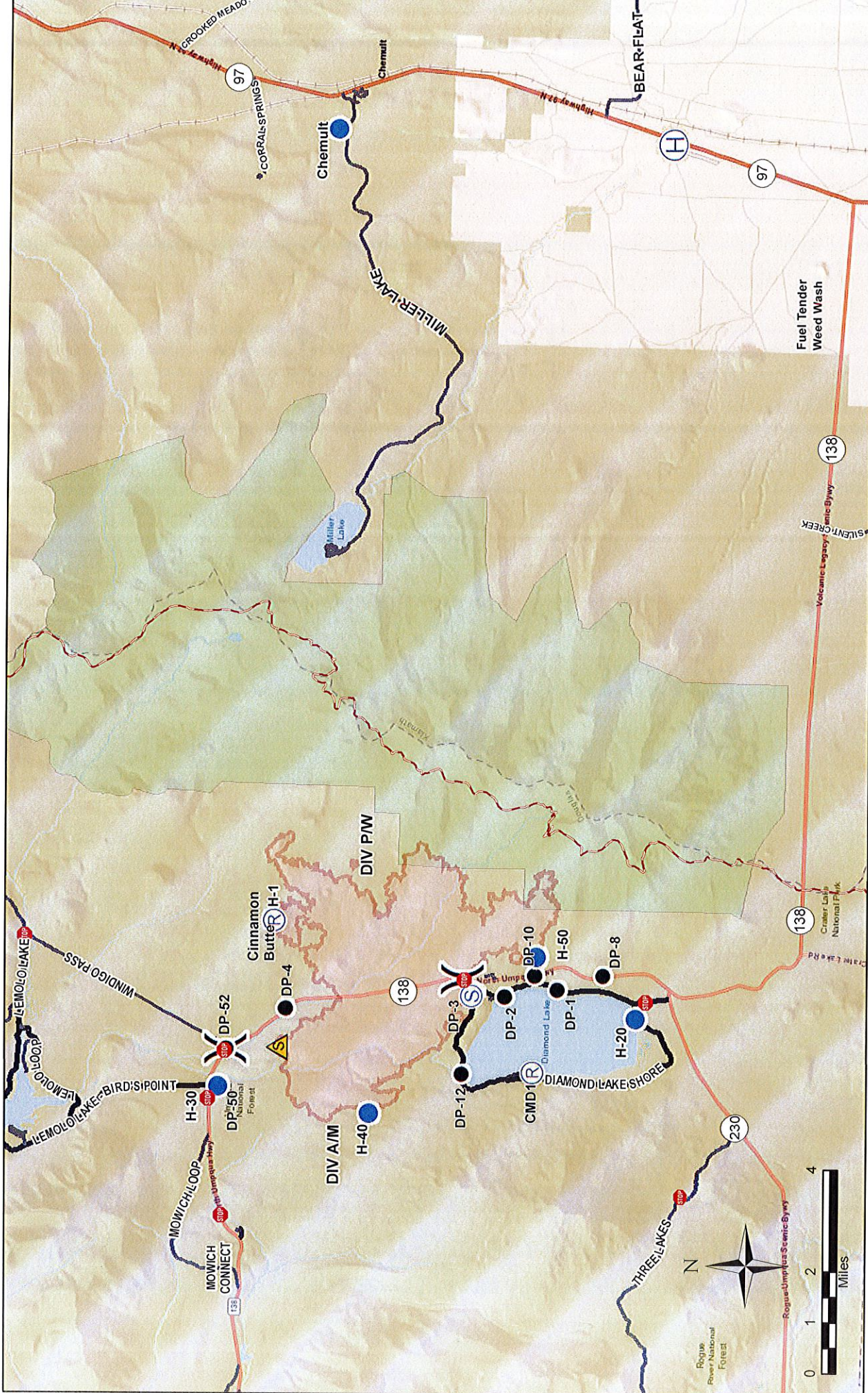

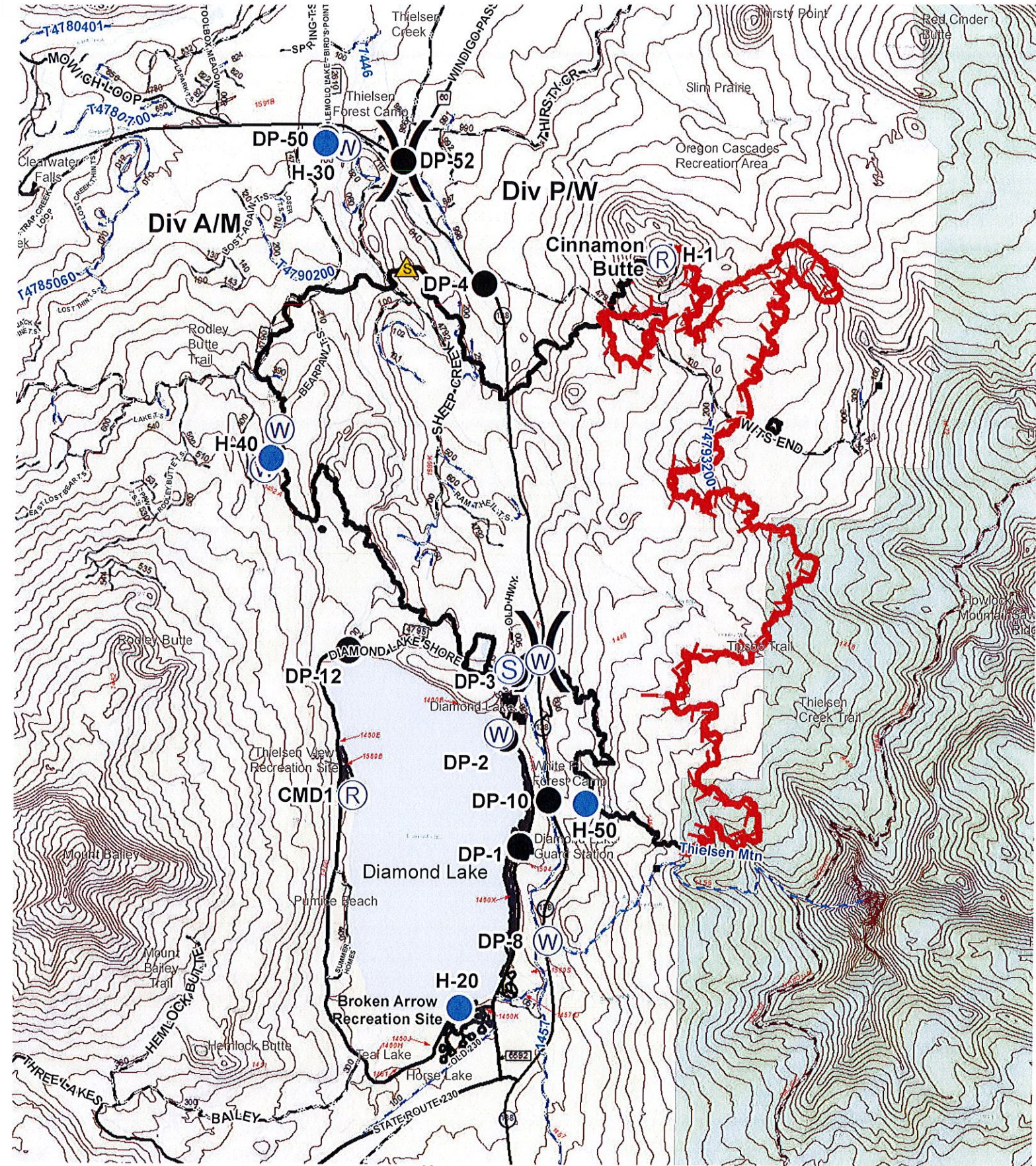
