<p>1) Protection of human life and safety is the first priority for all actions taken on a wildfire and can overrule all other strategic and incident objectives and management and incident requirements.</p> <p>2) Base management decisions on meeting objectives while also minimizing the risk of COVID-19 exposure to responders and the public. COVID-19 considerations may alter how you meet goals but should not lead to higher-risk tactics.</p> <p>3) Focus on strategies and tactics that reduce exposure to COVID19 and smoke impacts to local communities.</p> <p>4) Protect the WUI infrastructure at Diamond Lake (109 recreation residences, Diamond Lake Resort, FS campgrounds, ODFW facility) and Lemolo Lake (Lemolo Lake Resort/KOA, Pacificorps facilities, FS campgrounds) from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of highly valued assets.</p> <p>5) Ensure safe passage for public on Hwy 138 as it is a major east-west transportation route which would impact both the public and fire personnel access.</p> <p>6) Protect Sandshed/ODOT site near Hwy 138/FS Road 2610 from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of partner buildings and heavy equipment, staging area.</p> <p>7) Protect isolated Forest assets in the area (FS campgrounds at both Diamond Lake and Lemolo Lake, Hwy 138, Cinnamon Butte, Powder magazine at Mt. FIRE BEHAVIOR DISCUSSION

GENERAL:

As we return to warmer and drier weather, areas still retaining heat will start showing themselves.

Predicted Fire Behavior:

Early in the day, heat/smoldering will be restricted to smoldering stump holes and groups of larger diameter logs able to retain fire through the evening.

Once relative humidity drops and where exposed to winds, fuels will begin to dry enough to support minimal spread where small diameter fuels are present. Standing grass and needle cast in open areas (limited canopy) could support spread up to 1/8 mile and hour. Flame lengths will remain very low. The amount of energy required to dry out fuels below the surface will restrict fireline intensity.

Probability of Ignition:

After yesterday drying and last night's moderated relative humidity recovery **POI** is predicted to be near **39%**.

Even at the peak of high temperature (75) and lowest humidity (18) **POI** from modeling runs is calculated at a **maximum 54%**

SPECIFIC:

Today: Although all divisions have some remaining interior heat, the east and southeastern portions of Division P/W continues to be the most likely area for interior spread with smokes already starting to show themselves during the last burning period. With warmer and much drier conditions continuing through the week, any remaining pockets of isolated heat near the perimeter could once again start creeping and spreading.

Tonight: Moderated humidity recovery will continue to stall fire movement.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Clear skies with winds will allow for aerial resources to work the fire early.

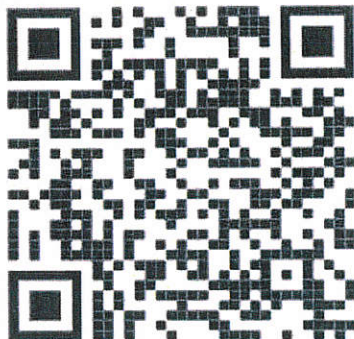

Weather Discussion: The warming and drying trend really takes hold of the region as temperatures push well above normal and humidity values fall into the teens. Gusty winds continue today into early Tuesday before finally decreasing through the afternoon/evening on Tuesday. Major Hazards & Risks: *Easterly Winds, Heavy Equipment, Chippers & Covid - 19*

Heads up for potentially strong Easterly winds this week: More so for the Archie Creek Fire than the Thielsen Fire. It was exceptionally strong easterly winds that drove the Archie Creek and other large fires in the State of Oregon in early September.

Heavy Equipment and Falling Snags:

There is a lot of heavy equipment on both of fires and likely more to come for suppression rehabilitation, road maintenance, and fuels reduction. With that brings large transports needed to move the equipment into and around the fire. This movement causes congestion and driving delays in these areas. You can help reduce the possibility of having an accident by driving slowly, alert and defensively. When you park in these areas make sure your vehicle does not block the travel way on these roads. If you are a passenger while the driver is backing **offer to get out and be a spotter**. These are certainly accidents that can be prevented. In addition to the heavy equipment, there will be fallers along interior roads to fell hazard trees. Fallers make sure you have road guards before felling trees along roadways.

Chippers:

There are at least 5 chipper operations on the Archie Fire and 1 on the Thielsen Fire. It is important that all resources working with the chipper be briefed on safe working practices and sign the JHA for chipper operation before using the chipper. The operator of the chipper is to be trained and qualified. That will likely be the owner or employee of the chipper contractor.

COVID-19 Message:

DUTY – It is our duty to do our jobs safely. Safety includes following these CDC guidelines:

- Wearing a Mask (where feasible)
- Washing your Hands (where you can)
- Maintaining Social Distancing (in briefings and around camp)

RESPECT – Have respect for your crew, your family and yourself by following the CDC guidelines above both on and off duty. When in the office or vehicles with your co-workers, wear a mask to respect the “Module as One”. Remember your off-duty behavior will influence the health and wellbeing of your crew and their families too.

INTEGRITY – Do all these things even when no one is watching. This way you show up for everyone in your life in the best way you can.

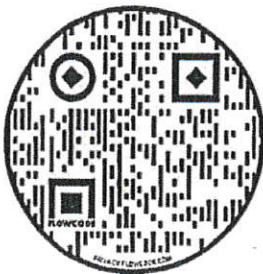

- All resources need to turn in supplies, radios, clean up your camp site, get vehicle/equipment inspected and get weed washed if your vehicle and equipment have been on the line.
- Contact Logistics to confirm that you have completed the above steps.
- Next close out with the Time Unit virtually using your smart device or laptop connected to the internet, Check-in at Chemult ICP will have a laptop available.
- Trainees need to close out with the Training Specialist before demobing.

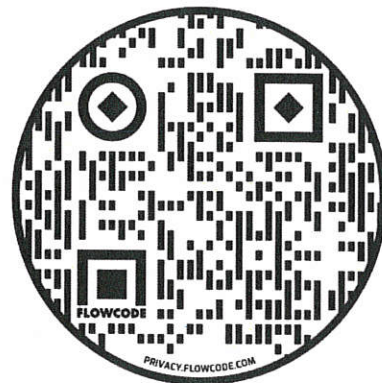

Vehicle Travel Info

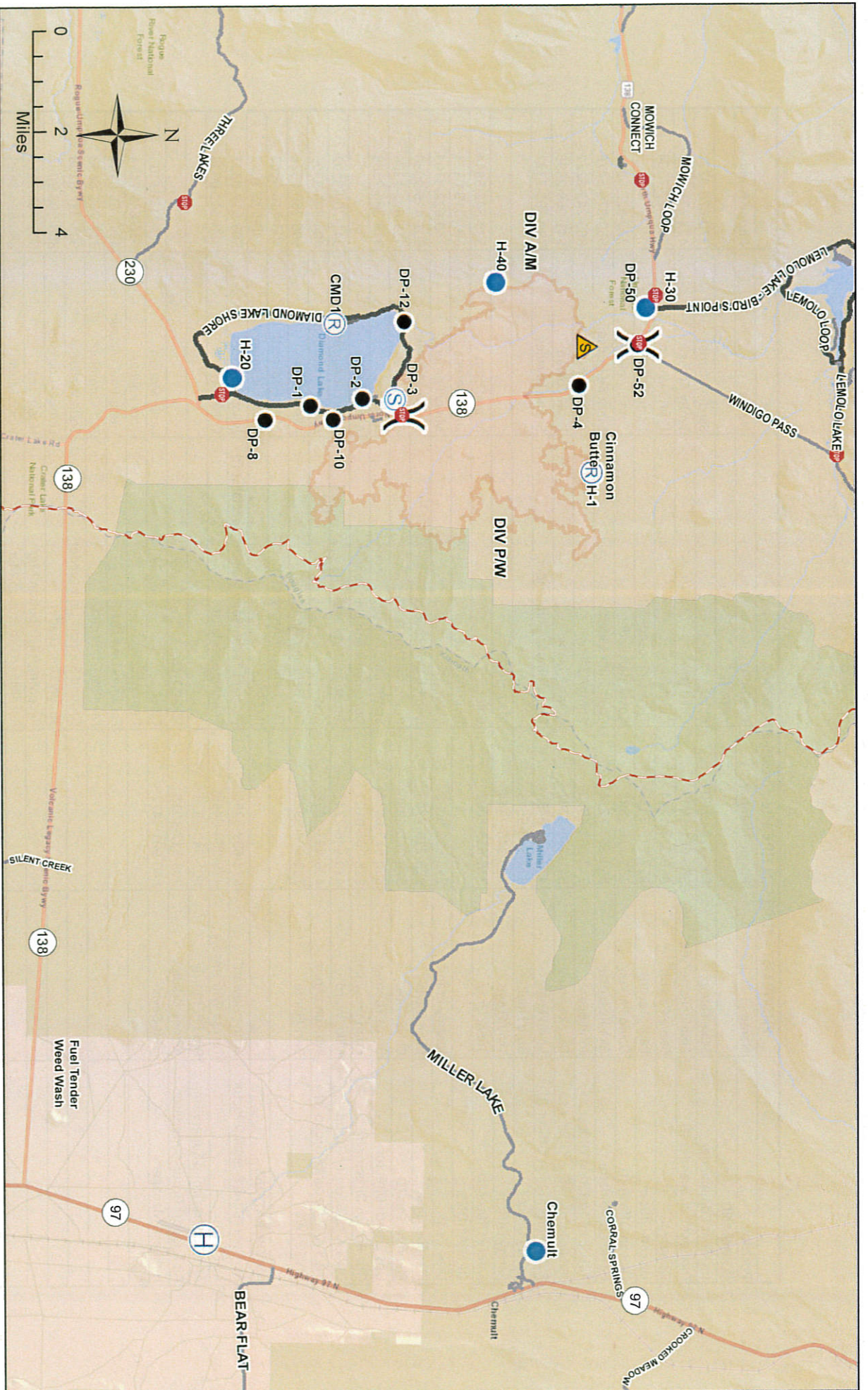

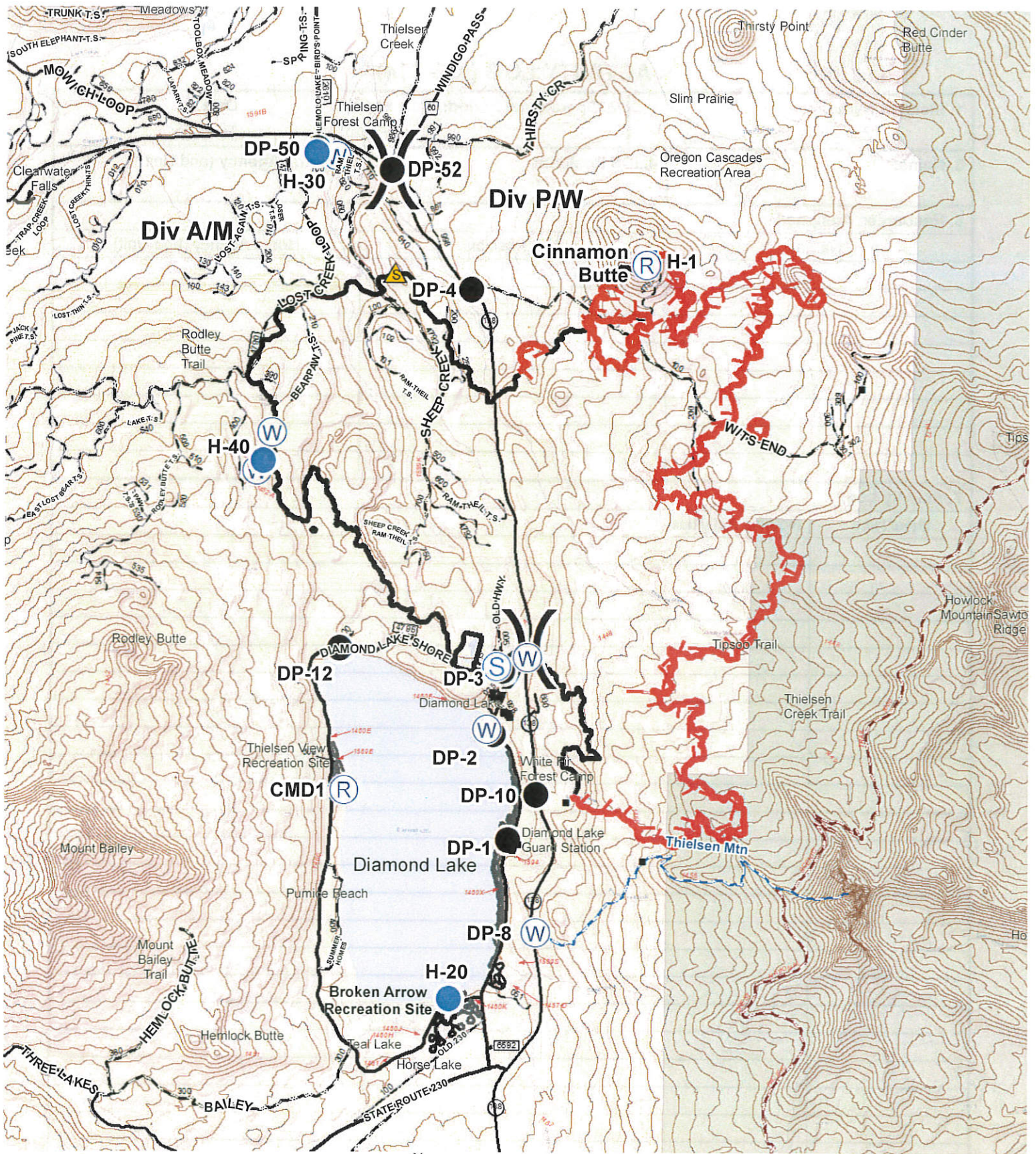
