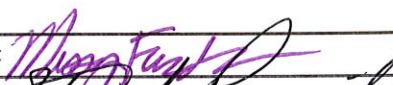

3. Objective(s):			
<p>1) Protection of human life and safety is the first priority for all actions taken on a wildfire and can overrule all other strategic and incident objectives and management and incident requirements.</p> <p>2) Base management decisions on meeting objectives while also minimizing the risk of COVID-19 exposure to responders and the public. COVID-19 considerations may alter how you meet goals but should not lead to higher-risk tactics.</p> <p>3) Focus on strategies and tactics that reduce exposure to COVID19 and smoke impacts to local communities.</p> <p>4) Protect the WUI infrastructure at Diamond Lake (109 recreation residences, Diamond Lake Resort, FS campgrounds, ODFW facility) and Lemolo Lake (Lemolo Lake Resort/KOA, Pacificorps facilities, FS campgrounds) from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of highly valued assets.</p> <p>5) Ensure safe passage for public on Hwy 138 as it is a major east-west transportation route which would impact both the public and fire personnel access.</p> <p>6) Protect Sandshed/ODOT site near Hwy 138/FS Road 2610 from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of partner buildings and heavy equipment, staging area.</p> <p>7) Protect isolated Forest assets in the area (FS campgrounds at both Diamond Lake and Lemolo Lake, Hwy 138, Cinnamon Butte, Powder magazine at Mt. Bailey, and Hemlock Butte Ski Cabin) from the threat of wildfire to prevent loss of valued Forest infrastructure.</p> <p>8) Coordinate suppression and suppression repair actions with the lead READ to ensure that impacts to the Oregon Cascades Resource Area are mitigated.</p>

Weather Discussion: Significant changes are expected over the next 24-36 hours as we quickly transition from a cool and damp pattern to a warmer and drier one. Winds shift to the east throughout the day tomorrow and become gusty by the evening hours. Gusty east winds continue through the overnight hours and into Monday. Temperatures rise through midweek with humidity values falling into the teens. Overnight humidity recoveries will only reach moderate levels by only falling into the 45-60% range.

FIRE BEHAVIOR DISCUSSION

GENERAL:

Remember: The lighter rains we have received over the past two days is more easily absorbed into dead and down fuels than those rains experienced in a flash downpour.

SPECIFIC:

Today: Today will be a transition period between the frontal passages of the past two days and into high pressure setting in Monday. Mostly sunny skies and increasing east wind will be significantly moderated by previous rain and moisture saturated fuels. Minimal fire behavior should be observed with majority of heat be restricted to deep duff layer and jackpot fuels down and dead fuels.

Tonight: Humidity recovery will slow spread through the evening hours to creeping and smoldering.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Clearer air with light winds will provide good opportunity for air operations throughout the burning period.

SAFETY:

Pay attention to the shifting winds which will be out of the east today.

LEARN MORE ABOUT FIRE BEHAVIOR---

Moisture of Extinction, or Extinction Moisture Content (EMC)

Moisture of extinction is a parameter of fire behavior fuel models. The use of the term in the Rothermel (1972) surface fire model is misleading because it is not designed to predict extinction; rather, it is included as a way to predict the effect of moisture content on fire behavior (through the moisture damping coefficient). The greater the difference between actual moisture content and the moisture of extinction, the smaller the moisture damping coefficient and therefore the greater the spread rate.

Fuel moisture content is most commonly expressed as the mass of water as a fraction or percentage of oven-dry mass. The term moisture fraction is sometimes used when moisture content is expressed as a fraction. Multiply moisture fraction by 100 to get moisture content as a percentage.

- "Grass" fuels generally need the lowest 1-hour fuel moistures to produce active spread because they generally produce the least amount of heat when they burn.
- "Shrub" and "Timber Understory" fuels can burn actively at more moderate 1-hour fuel moistures, especially when the live fuels are stressed and/or when a large share of the shrub fuels themselves are dead.
- "Timber Litter" and "Slash/Blowdown" fuels can also burn actively under more moderate fine dead fuel moistures, depending on fuel moisture in the larger fuel categories.

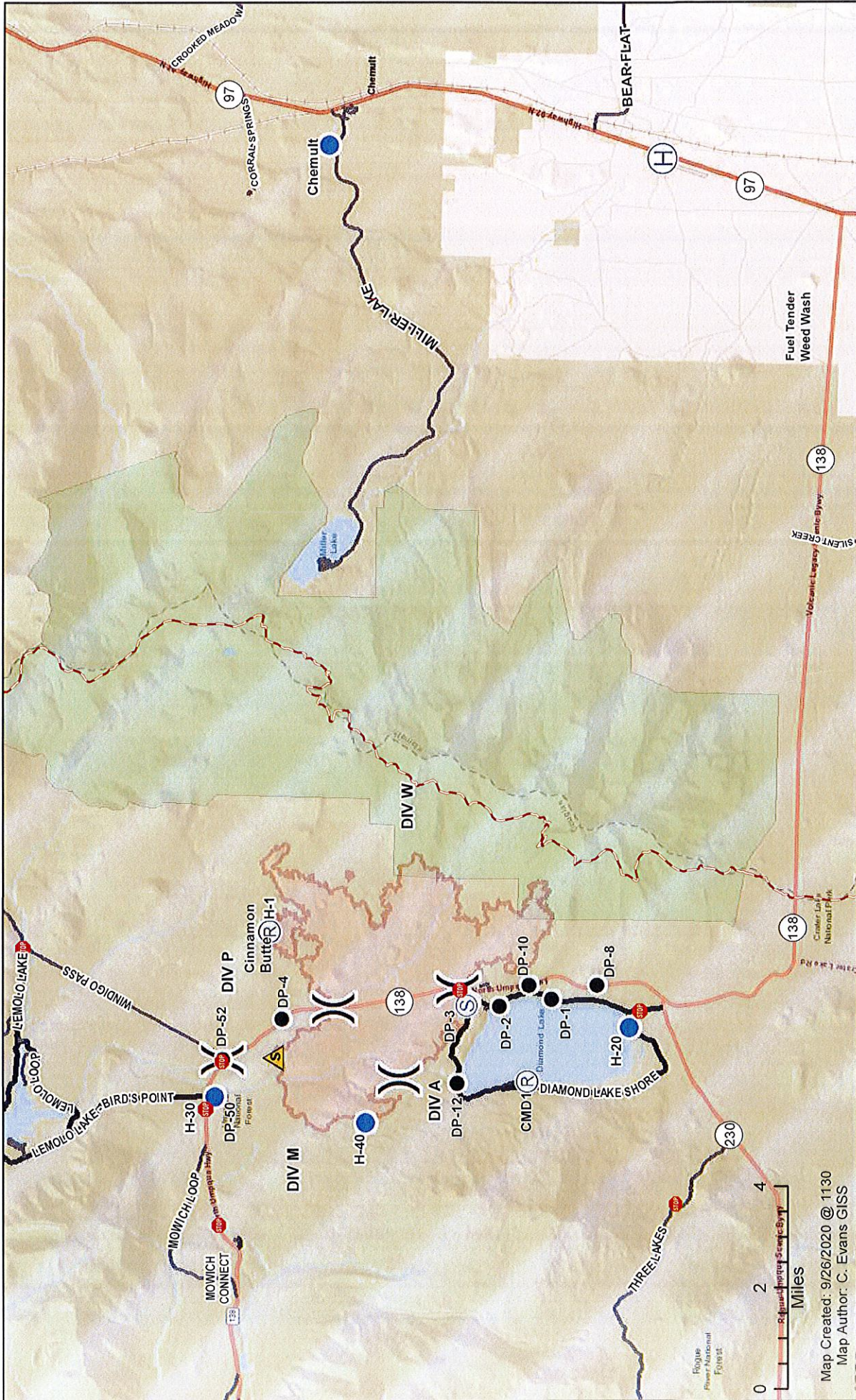

Thielsen Fire IAP Transportation Map

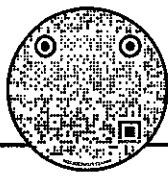
