Medical Emergencies Procedures

Car Strikes Person/Other Vehicle

1) First person on scene is to:

- a. Immediately radio and notify on-scene EMS, Security, and the appropriate Branch Director on command channel. Give location of incident.
- b. Ensure scene safety before approaching, if unsure of safety or unsafe, DO NOT approach the accident.
- c. DO NOT allow the driver to get out of the vehicle unless it is on fire. Any information exchange needed will be facilitated by other on-site staff.
- Take down driver's license plate information.
 Instruct driver of vehicle to turn vehicle off and place keys on dashboard.

2) On site EMS will:

- a. Respond to scene, assess medical needs, and treat as appropriate.
- b. Assess need for off-site EMS response. If needed, activate via phone or radio.
- c. If off-site EMS activated, coordinate with in- coming EMS units on Emergency channel.
- d. Assess need for law enforcement response, and request from their dispatch as necessary.

3) Branch Director will:

- a. Ensure scene safety before approaching or allowing others to approach.
- b. Delegate a team to assist with traffic redirection (i.e. shut down a lane if accident happened within the lane, or divert traffic around accidents happening outside the lane) as needed.
- c. Notify on-site Safety Officer on assigned frequency or phone
- c. Call for more staff assistance as needed and appropriate.
- d. If necessary, notify communications unit on assigned frequency requesting activation of pre-identified tow service. Dicks Towing (541) 772-4040.
- e. Branch Director will document accident on an incident report form and obtain any appropriate testimony/witness accounts as appropriate or needed, or delegate those actions.

4) On-site Safety Officer will:

- a. Notify ICs by radio on command frequency or phone.
- b. Gather any appropriate information necessary from responding off-site EMS (i.e. police case number, where EMS takes injured parties etc.).

5) Team leader (IMT IC, FEMA IC, DOD ranking officer on site, ranking County official on site etc.) of any injured staff members will ensure any injured team members will follow up with Employee Health as needed to file claims as related to injuries/medical visits etc..

Other Non-Specified Medical Emergencies

- 1) First person on scene will:
 - a. Immediately radio and notify on-site EMS, security, and appropriate Branch Director on command channel.
 - b. Ensure scene safety before approaching, if unsure of safety or unsafe, DO NOT approach the accident.
- 2) On site EMS will:
 - a. Respond to scene, assess medical needs, and treat as appropriate.
 - b. Assess need for off-site EMS response. If needed, activate via phone or radio.
 - c. If off-site EMS activated, coordinate with in- coming EMS units on Emergency channel.
 - d. Assess need for Law enforcement response, and request from their dispatch as necessary.
- 3) Branch Director will:
 - a. Ensure scene safety before approaching or allowing others to approach.
 - b. Delegate a team to assist with traffic redirection (i.e. shut down a lane if incident happened within or near a lane, or divert traffic around incident happening outside the lane) as needed.
 - c. Call for more staff assistance as needed.
 - d. Branch Director will document incident on an incident report form and obtain any appropriate testimony/witness accounts as appropriate or needed, or delegate those actions.
 - e. Notify on site-Safety Officer.
- 4) On-site Safety Officer will:
 - a. Gather any appropriate information necessary from responding off-site EMS (i.e. police case number, where EMS takes injured parties etc.).
 - b. Notify ICs; by phone or on command frequency.
 - c. Notify off- site FEMA Safety Officer if situation warrants.

5) Injured staff member's team leader (IMT IC, FEMA IC, DOD ranking officer on site, ranking County official on site etc.) will ensure any injured team members will follow up with Employee Health as needed to file claims as related to injuries/medical visits etc..

Identifying and Treating Heat-Related Illnesses

Heat Stroke

Symptoms - Heat stroke is categorized as either exertional heat stroke (EHS) or nonexertional heat stroke (NEHS). EHS generally occurs in young, healthy indidividuals who engage in strenuous activity in hot weather. NEHS aka classic heat stroke typically occurs in the elderly, very young, or chronically ill. Symptoms include:

- High body temperature (above 104°F).
- Skin that is red, hot, and either moist or dry (sweating may have stopped).
- Rapid heart rate
- Difficulty breathing
- Headache
- Dizziness
- Loss of coordination
- Nausea and vomiting
- Confusion and restlessness
- Seizures
- Loss of consciousness

First Aid – If a person on site is experiencing any of these symptoms, notify the on-site EMS while you begin cooling them down.

- Get the person to a cool indoor or outdoor area and remove restricted clothing.
- Cool the person as rapidly as possible; immerse in cool water, place in cold shower, spray
 with lukewarm water while a fan blows on them, ice packs to armpits, neck and groin
 areas etc.
- Monitor cooling and continue cooling efforts until the body temperature drops to 102°F or cooler.
- If the individual is conscious and able, give them cool fluids to drink.

Heat Exhaustion

Symptoms – Normal to mildly elevated body temperature, heavy sweating, pallor, muscle cramps and/or muscle pain. Fatigue, weakness, dizziness and lightheadedness, headache and nausea.

First Aid – If a person is exhibiting symptoms of heat exhaustion, they should do the following:

- Drink cool beverages like water, or electrolyte replacement drinks
- Eat salty snacks.
- Rest in the shade, or air-conditioned environment.

If the symptoms are severe, worsening, or the affected individual has underlying health problems, call for on-site EMS to the person's location.

Heat Syncope (Fainting)

Symptoms – Dizziness or lightheadedness and fainting.

First Aid – If a person is experiencing heat syncope, they should do the following:

- Sit and rest in a cool place.
- Lie down and elevate legs above the heart as appropriate.
- Drink cool water or and electrolyte replacement beverage.

Seek immediate medical attention For repeated episodes of fainting or if the individual experiences chest pain, seizures or confusion, call for on- site EMS to respond to the person's location.

Heat Cramps

Symptoms – Muscle pain and/or spasms that usually occur in the abdomen, arms, or legs. **First Aid** – If a person is experiencing heat cramps, they should do the following:

- Stop all activity and rest in a cool place.
- Drink water or an electrolyte replacement beverage; and eat a salty snack.
- Passively stretch the affected muscles.
- Do not return to strenuous activity for a few hours after the cramps have subsided because doing so can lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke.
- Seek medical attention if the cramps do not subside within one hour.

This safety plan was developed in coordination with US Army 2nd Lt. C. Garcia in order to ensure that DOD personnel and non- DOD staff received the same information in their training and briefings, and that emergency response was well coordinated across all staff on site.
