MAJOR HAZARDS AND RISKS

Driving: Statically driving is one of the most dangerous things we firefighter do, and it is one of the most common things we do. It is also one of the hazards that present the most potential for serious or fatal injuries.

Hazards:

- ✓ Other Vehicles
- ✓ Animals on the road
- ✓ Poor visibility – dust/fog/smoke
- ✓ Pedestrians
- ✓ Poor road surfaces
- ✓ Poor visibility – sun glare
- ✓ Loose Shoulders
- ✓ Fallen or falling trees

Mitigation

The most important and helpful thing you can do is **SLOW DOWN!** Driving slower gives you more time to react to whatever hazard/s you encounter. Use headlights at all times. Do not stop abruptly with a cloud of dust or smoke behind you. Seat belts are mandatory. Expect the unexpected – animals are active along road in the morning sand evenings.

Instructions for Screening

Item	What to Do

At Entries: Consider adequate number of personnel needed for screening. Although medical personnel are ideal, screeners do not have to be medically trained. If resource has cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, or any other listed symptoms including fever (over 100.4) at entry.	DO NOT ANNOUNCE Ask individual to step aside and follow the steps below.

Steps to follow
Escort symptomatic individual to isolation area.
Isolation support personnel should begin documentation.
Have symptomatic individual contact Supervisor for further direction.
Notify public health officials.
Have individual transported as appropriate.
Protect and secure any collected Personal Identifiable Information (PII) or Personal Health Information (PHI).

CORONAVIRUS SAFETY

LIMIT THE SPREAD OF GERMS AND PREVENT INFECTION

Recommends the following steps to help prevent the spread of germs during this situation:

- Practice social distancing by keeping about six feet from others if you must go out in public.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after being in a public place, or after blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."

Severity of Emergency / Transport Priority	<input type="checkbox"/> RED / PRIORITY 1 Life or limb threatening injury or illness. Evacuation need is IMMEDIATE <i>Ex: Unconscious, difficulty breathing, bleeding severely, 2^o – 3^o burns more than 4 palm sizes, heat stroke, disoriented.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> YELLOW / PRIORITY 2 Serious Injury or illness. Evacuation may be DELAYED if necessary. <i>Ex: Significant trauma, unable to walk, 2^o – 3^o burns not more than 1-3 palm sizes.</i> <input type="checkbox"/> GREEN / PRIORITY 3 Minor Injury or illness. Non-Emergency transport <i>Ex: Sprains, strains, minor heat-related illness.</i>
