

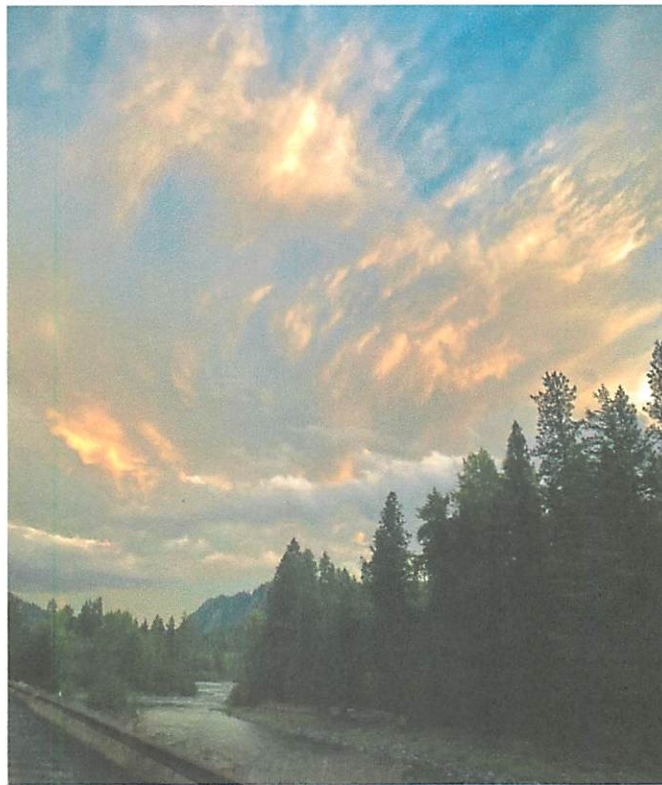



<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hold and improve along Bethel Ridge to the William O. Douglas Wilderness and complete indirect line preparations to secure the southern fire perimeter and reduce the threat to values at risk. • Complete direct and indirect line where necessary, monitor and patrol as needed, to keep fire west of the Naches River and reduce the threat to forest infrastructure and the communities of Cliffdell and Pinecliff • Monitor fire activity and implement suppression actions, as needed, to keep fire east of the Bumping River reducing the threat to structures and forest infrastructure in the Goose Prairie area. Keep fire on American Ridge south of highway 410, protect structures and maintain safe access to Goose Prairie • Mop up and secure containment lines to the degree necessary to make the likelihood of escape low based on experience, terrain, fuel type and condition, and current and forecasted weather. • Track suppression repair needs. Initiate repair actions when appropriate, resources are available and where they will not compromise suppression efforts.

DISCUSSION:

Thursday will be a little warmer and drier with light up slope/valley wind in a lot of locations. A few cumulus will develop in the afternoon with no shower potential. Friday will be a similar day to Thursday with increasing high clouds. Saturday will start out dry but the overnight into Sunday has potential for precipitation and winds at times.

DRINK WATER – Monitor and Maintain your water consumption – even when it not hot and dry. Our bodies still require adequate fluid replenishment, as well as electrolytes when perspiring more than usual. Note: Excessive caffeine causes dehydration.

DRIVING – ROAD HAZARDS are around the very next corner- so BUCKLE UP and USE HEADLIGHTS, tap that horn, GEAR DOWN and GO SLOW. Drive defensively & watch out for the other guy. Fire vehicles must clean windshields regularly (dust & bugs)

COMPLACENCY – it affects our judgment and how we respond to hazards such as snags, rolling rocks, driving, etc. We get used to a particular area and think it will be the same as the day before, but sometimes it is often not the same. e.g., you heard in the morning briefing yesterday about a green tree that burned out at the base and fell across the road – this could have been a near-miss, or worse. Maintain situational awareness and expect things to be changing constantly!

Related Notes:

Serious **accidents are usually preceded by many unsafe behaviors/acts!**

Actions that are most deadly are "High Risk - Low Frequency" - dangerous tasks we don't do very often... sound familiar?

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)
