

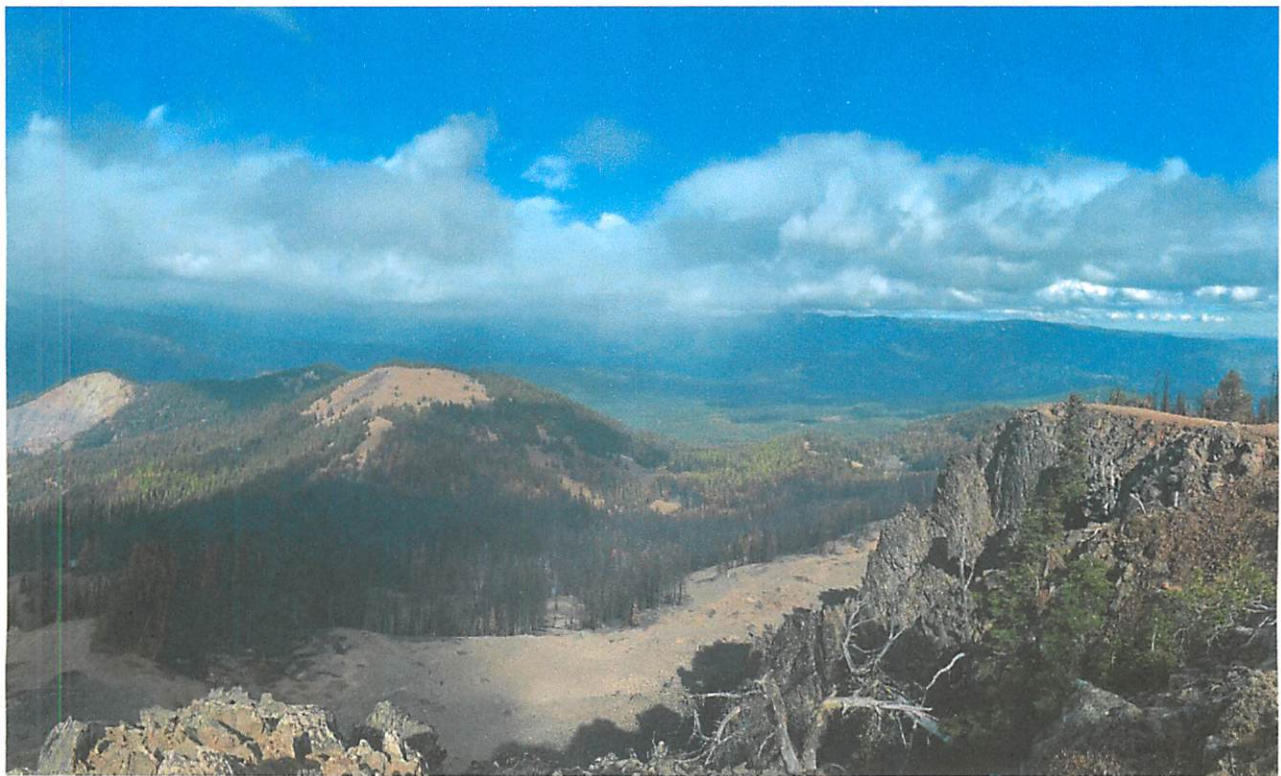

DISCUSSION: ***More Active Weather Coming Over the Weekend. Cold and Storms Next Week***
Friday will be dry with slope and valley diurnal wind. There will be increased ridge level wind on Saturday ahead of the next major storm with a chance for rain late afternoon.. Saturday night and Sunday a wet cold front will bring ridge level snow and valley rain and wind gusts to 40 mph on the ridges. The most rain and snow potential will be on the western edge of the fire. Colder but dry Monday and Tuesday. Potentially wetter middle to late next week.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR FRIDAY:

SKY/WEATHER: Partly cloudy. Mainly high clouds thinning in the afternoon.
MAX TEMPERATURE: Valleys: 52 to 57 west. 54 to 62 east. **Ridges/slopes (Abv. 4500):** 46 to 50. **63 @ Naches.**
MIN RH: Little change. Valleys: 30% to 40%. west. 25% to 35% east.
20 FT WINDS:
Lower Valleys: Up slope and valley to 4 to 7 mph. **Upper-Slopes and Ridges:** Southwest to West to 10 mph.

FRIDAY NIGHT:

SKY/WEATHER: Partly cloudy except for some high clouds..
MIN TEMPERATURE: Little change. Valleys: 32 to 40. Ridges: Lows 28 to 33. **39 @ Naches.**
MAX RH: Good recovery. 65% to 75% Ridges. 75% to 85% valleys.

Transportation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Slow down (road work is improving roads but keep speed down) • Signing of all incident roads that provide access to divisions. • Daily updated travel plan maps. • Practice defensive driving. In local communities obey the posted speed limits. • Unfavorable road conditions (due to rain and mud) • Allow for extra time entering and exiting Fire camp
Allergic Reaction - Bees, Bears, Rattle Snakes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify individuals with known allergic reactions, flag hives and nests. Use the IWI process. • Don't feed or approach wildlife
Heavy Equipment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Post lookouts around equipment work areas. Establish communications with equipment boss and operator. • Do not work down slope from equipment
Fire Behavior	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be aware of RH's for local conditions. • Establish LCES. • Weather updates as needed during rehab/repair operations.
Mop Up	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Working on steep terrain - Gravity Hazard • Rolling Material; Rocks, logs, cut rounds dislodged by personnel • Hazard Trees - Snags, Fire Weekend Trees. • Burns or other injuries from hot stump holes or ash pit. • Fatigue or illness as a result of over exposure to smoke • Burns resulting from falling in stump holes and ash pits • Burns from water hitting hot material and hitting personnel • Anaphylactic Shock from insect stings or bites • Vehicle accidents due to increased support for operations
