

#### **SAFETY THOUGHT**

"Listen for the Alarm".

Watch for changing conditions, be aware of "watch out" situations, be alert to indicators of fire behavior.

#### MAJOR HAZARDS AND RISKS

- Uncharacteristic Fire Behavior
- High Dispersion Index High Temperatures
- Heavy Continuous Fuels.
- Driving Long Distances.
- Fire Access Roads, Slow Down

- Snags! Snags!—Heads Up!
- No Travel Restrictions for Public. (Be Aware)
- Weather Cells may limit aircraft use
- Highway Driving--Lights, Seatbelts, Windshields

## LOOKOUTS COMMUNICATIONS ESCAPE ROUTES SAFETY ZONES

In the wildland fire environment, four basic safety hazards confront the firefighter - lightning, fire-weakened timber, rolling rocks, and entrapment by running fires. Each firefighter must know the interconnection of LCES - lookouts, communications, escape routes, and safety zones. LCES should be established before fighting the fire: Select lookouts, set up a communication, choose escape routes, and select safety zones.

#### **SNAG HAZARDS**

Falling trees and snags are one of the leading causes of death and injury for wildland firefighters.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL/OPERATIONAL CONDITIONS

- Strong winds
- Night operations
- Swampy wet areas
- Fire Weakened and Dead Trees
- Helicopter bucket drops and rotor down drafts
- Retardant drops
- Vibrations from heavy equipment and motor vehicles operating nearby
- Sandy loose soil

#### SNAG/GREEN TREE HAZARD ALERT CHECKLIST

- Snags/green trees are falling or have fallen in work area.
- Leaning or hung-up trees are present in work area.
- Trees with dead or broken tops and limbs overhead are present in work area.
- High risk tree species (rot and shallow root system, i.e., cypress) are present in work areas.
- Crews are working in a hazard tree area at night.
- Crews are working in a hazard tree area and the wind is blowing.
- Crews are working in an area where trees have been burning for some time.
- Crewmembers are taking a break in a hazard tree area (staging area, drop points, camps, etc.).
- Lookouts have not been posted in a hazard tree area.
- Lookouts are not advising the crew of the presence of hazard trees.
- Winds are increasing or are predicted to increase.
- Tree height within fire perimeter equals or exceeds distance to control line.
- Escape routes pass through hazard tree area.
