

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**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** An upper ridge will bring continued warm and dry weather into the new week. Temperatures will remain above normal, relative humidities will be dry, and humidity recoveries will remain fair to poor. A passing disturbance will lead to a bit of an increase in afternoon wind speeds and gusts today.

### INPUTS

**WEATHER SUMMARY:** See attached Fire Weather Forecast.

### OUTPUTS

#### FIRE BEHAVIOR

##### GENERAL:

- Smoke haze is expected to clear early in the day so expect fire activity to respond to lack of shading.
- Expect single and group torching with upslope runs and spotting in the afternoon. Backing and flanking with roll outs will continue on steeper slopes.
- Probability of Ignition will approach 76% unshaded. Maximum spotting distance will be near 0.3 miles and more if significant column develops.
- Nighttime winds are forecasted to be west to northwest after midnight and align with normal diurnal downslope winds. So eastern flanks of the fire will be the most affected.
- Fuel moistures continue to be low. Nighttime humidity recovery will be moderate to poor. This will affect live and dead fuel availability to burn. ERC's remain near the 97<sup>th</sup> percentile at Gold Mountain RAWS. Fuels are mixed conifer with grass and brush understory, timber litter, regeneration stands with shrub layer, logging slash, blow down and older pre-commercial thinning slash.

##### SPECIFIC:

**DIV F/J:** Fire will continue to be active in the Lynx Creek drainage today. As the fire reaches the southern aspects leading up to Johns Mountain Ridge and Lynx Mountain, expect group torching with potential for upslope runs. On the flanks, the fire edge will continue to back and flank with occasional torching and short-range spotting. Roll outs on the steeper slopes will continue.

**DIV S:** Expect backing and flanking fire with occasional torching and spotting. Higher, more exposed portion of the Oregon City Ridge will continue flanking to the east where lower deep drainages that retain moisture longer will spread a bit slower. Potential for fire movement upslope with forecasted winds. Fire activity in Lynx drainage will make uphill runs towards the south up to Ontario City Ridge. Keep a good look out and know where the fire is in relation to your work.

**DIV X:** Expect areas of interior dirty burns to clean up with the potential to torch and spot across fire lines.

**DIV B:** Watch for flare ups near fire lines that can cause spotting over the line. Expect areas of dirty burns to continue to clean up with isolated torching.

**AIR OPERATIONS:** Watch for turbulence in the complex terrain. Smoke may impact visibility.

### SAFETY

Watch for increased fire activity with wind slope alignment.

Stump holes burning deep.

Areas of dirty burns with heat treated brush have potential for reburn.


Dozer and road berms have potential to hold heat.




