

Complacency

Definition: A feeling of quiet pleasure or security, **often while unaware of some potential danger**, defect or the like; self-satisfaction or smug satisfaction with an existing situation or condition.

Sometimes it is success that lead us into complacency. It can also be caused by fatigue, frustration or familiarity. With complacency we become numb to the hazards, and open the way for an accident.

Overcome complacency by:

- Actively reviewing the hazards, risks and mitigations.
- Stay a tuned to the changing environment and your assigned mission.
- Stay Focused!


12 Signs of Fatigue

- Attitudes and moods deteriorate.
- Performance becomes inconsistent.
- Mult-tasking becomes difficult.
- Accuracy and timing degrades.
- Lower performance standards become acceptable.
- Situational awareness declines.
- Ability to integrate information effectively is lost.
- Involuntary lapses into micro-sleeps.
- Attention wanes.
- The ability to reason is impaired.
- Social interactions decline.
- Difficulty completing sentences.

Managing Fatigue

- Sleep deprivation and stress can drastically increase fatigue.
- Sleep loss/fatigue adds up and causes poor communication and decreases mental and physical performance.
- Get adequate sleep.
- Take care of your hygiene.
- Eat good, healthy food.
- Limit your caffeine intake the afternoon and evening.
- Take more breaks in the heat of the day.

DO NOT ANNOUNCE Ask individual to step aside and follow the steps below.

Steps to follow

Escort symptomatic individual to isolation area.
Isolation support personnel should begin documentation.
Have symptomatic individual contact Supervisor for further direction.
Notify public health officials.
Have individual transported as appropriate.
Protect and secure any collected Personal Identifiable Information (PII) or Personal Health Information (PHI).

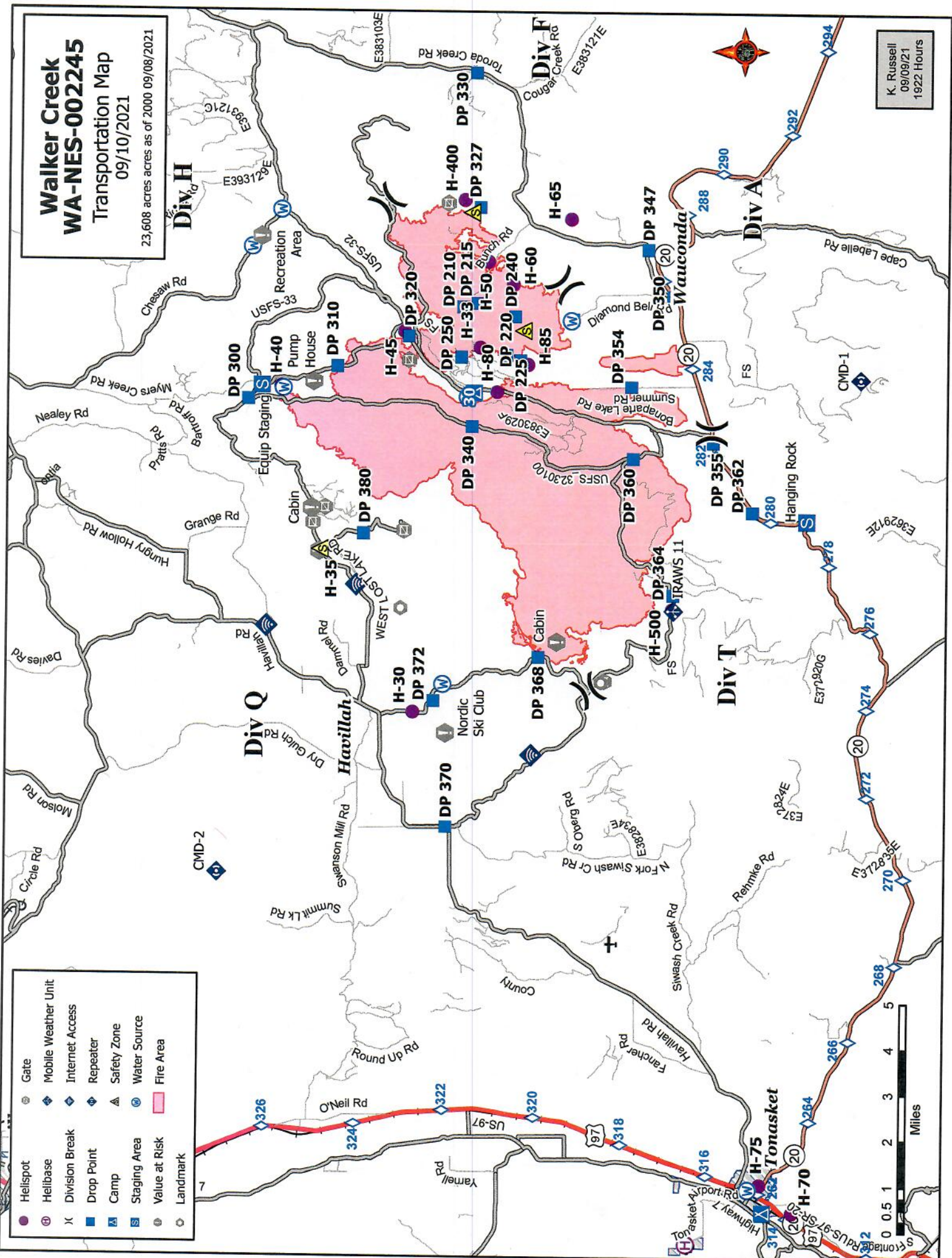

EMERGENCY PLAN INCIDENT WITHIN AN INCIDENT

ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER

In the event of an accident or medical incident of any size, your primary responsibility is to ENSURE that the victim(s) receive prompt and effective Triage, Treatment, Extrication and Transport.

- ENSURE THE MEDICAL INCIDENT REPORT IN THE INCIDENT ACTION PLAN IS BEING USED AND FOLLOWED- ***IF DETERMINED TO BE A GREEN, DO NOT DECLARE EMERGENCY TRAFFIC AND ONLY COMPLETE LINE 1-4 ON MIR***.
- Conduct size-up of the incident nature of accident, number type of resources involved, latitude and longitude location (DD°MMM.MM format): notify incident communications center and supervisor, request assistance as needed.
- Order and coordinate medical and support response to the accident.
- Evaluate special needs (law enforcement, haz mat, etc.).
- Clear the command frequency if medical emergency, coordinate with incident communications and air attack for air medical transportation needs.
- Preserve and photograph the scene for accident investigation.
- Remain aware of surroundings and the status of the main incident (delegate personnel to monitor the main fire) to ensure safety of medical treatment personnel.
- Until relieved, supervise and manage all personnel involved at the incident scene.

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)
Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.
Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
