3. Objective(s):

Provide for the safety of firefighters and the public while fighting fire aggressively and applying the 10 and 18, LCES and risk management process.

Engage and take suppression actions to limit fire acreage growth and protect structures.

Maintain best management practices to limit the spread and exposure of the COVID-19 virus within the crew, on the line, in camp or to the surrounding community.

Act professionally and in a manner to foster good relationships with public, landowners, cooperators, and agencies. Provide timely and accurate information as it becomes available.

Maximize opportunities for cost savings without jeopardizing public or firefighter safety.

Maintain awareness of firefighting impact on the landscape, including areas of eco-systems or habitat, minimize and report damage in areas that may be affected and implement tactics accordingly.

4. Operational Period Command Emphasis:

Continue to improve containment lines and employ the best tactics and risk mitigation to achieve control of the fire. Continue firing operations to secure the fire perimeter to the 1377 trail. Take advantage of opportunities to go direct wherever possible. Maintain situational awareness as the weather patterns begin to migrate towards a drier and hotter model again. Continually use a deliberate analysis of risk as you engage the fire, safety of personnel is a high priority. Maintain a good plan within your crews and work areas that provide access to line medical personnel and egress if necessary. Be aware of values inside and adjacent to the fire perimeter. Seek advice from resource advisors and employ MIST where appropriate or required.

General Situational Awareness:

Provide for firefighter and public safety at all times.
Monitor compliance of 10 and 18 by all incident personnel.
Adhere to 2:1 work/rest ratio for all fire line personnel.
Aviation safety is high priority. Assess the risk against the benefit of the mission.
Ensure all assigned personnel understand emergency medical reporting & transport procedures including locations of nearest emergency responders & facilities.
Follow PNWCG recommendations for COVID-19 Pandemic.

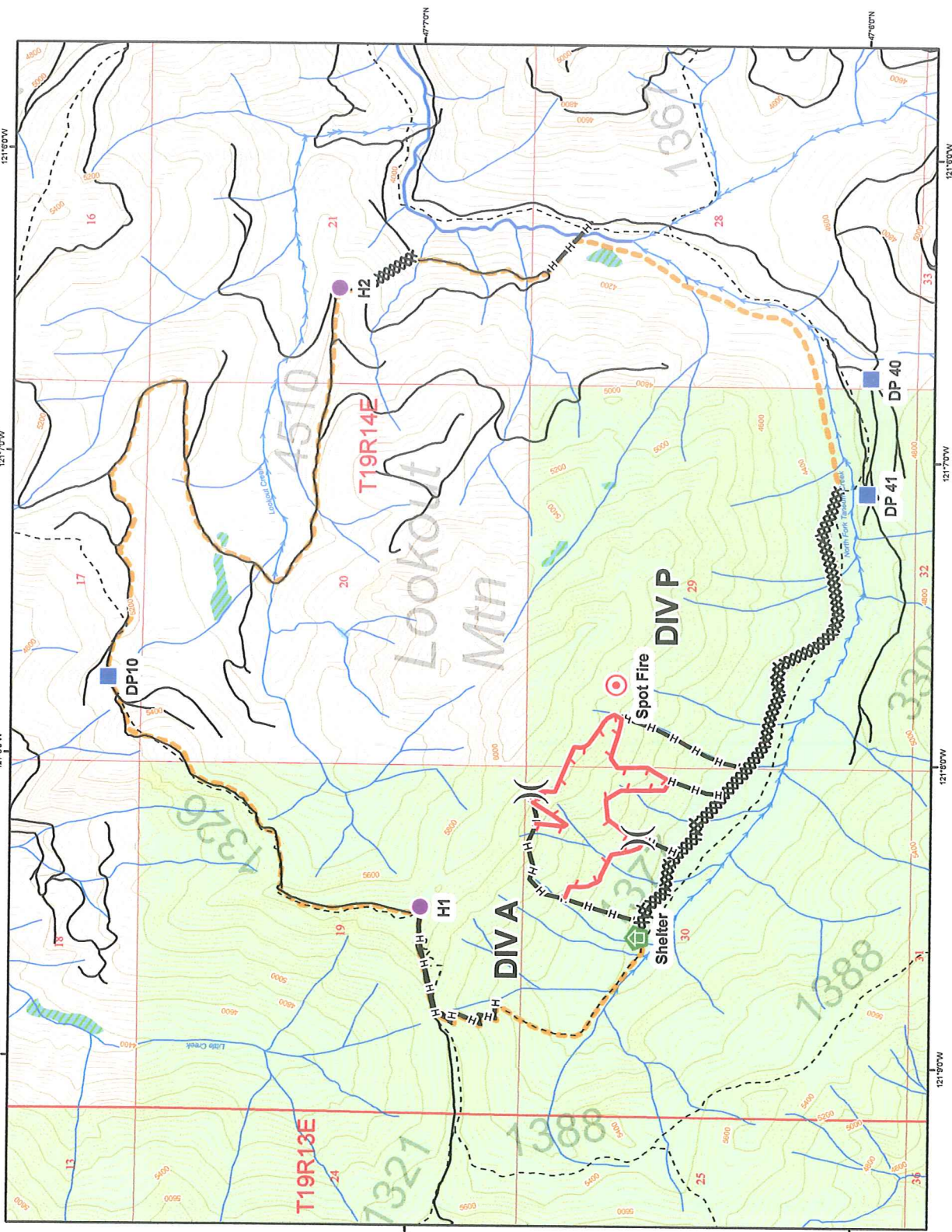

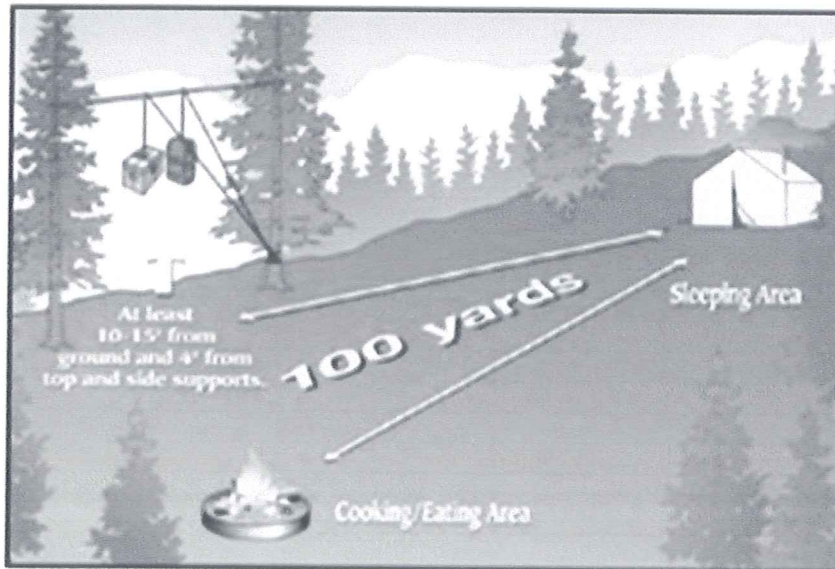

3. Safety Message/Expanded Safety Message, Safety Plan, Site Safety Plan:

- Use extreme caution while traveling to and from fire. The roads are tight and narrow. Go slow and proceed with caution, especially on any blind corners.
- Identify EMT 's and Medics on your division, write down their names and contact info. Follow the Medical Incident Report (8 Line) if there is a Medical Incident. Spend some time today reviewing the Medical Incident Report.
- Temperature is a little warmer today, but extreme hot weather is on its way. Keep hydrated by starting now. Use both water and electrolyte drinks.
- Use extreme caution working around snags. Mark Hazard trees if you can safely.
- Maintain: Lookouts, Communications, Escape Routes and Safety Zones (LCES)
- In your IRPG, take a look at page 109 and review it with your crew.
- Camping with bears in the area:
 - Stash Your Trash – Lock your trash in a vehicle. Do Not leave it around camp.
 - Store Attractants Safely - Don't leave food out, even if it is in a bag.
 - Keep a Clean Tent – Don't bring food scented items into your tent. Change your clothes if possible to limit food scents from meal time.
 - Lock Your Vehicle – Close your windows and lock the vehicle.

Fire and COVID-19 Briefing Checklist

Self-Awareness / Screening

- Immediately separate yourself from others.
- Notify supervisor if you or others experience:
 - Cough, more than expected
 - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
 - New loss of taste or smell
 - Fever Sore throat
 - Chills Muscle pain
- Review and follow crew and division plans to isolate, triage, and transport symptomatic personnel.

Hygiene on the Fireline

- Properly wash or sanitize your hands often, especially before and after eating or entering a public place, and after coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid handshakes and communal use items.
- Maintain a supply of hand sanitizer and hand wipes. Inform supervisor of needed resupply.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often:
 - Radios, phones, doors, pumps, fuel cans, etc.

Social Distancing and Protective Equipment

- Initiate, practice, and remind others of social distancing.
- Conduct briefings and conversations outdoors and at least 6 feet apart.
- Utilize face coverings as a tool when practical.
