3. Objective(s):

1. Incorporate risk management principles when making decisions in order to minimize risk to firefighters and the public. Make informed decisions on tactics and fire engagement, taking into consideration resources actually threatened by the fire, as well as, probability of success.
2. Work with the READ to accommodate resource concerns during implementation of suppression actions.
3. Ensure a positive, harassment free work environment where everyone is treated with dignity and respect.
4. Maintain positive communication with the recreating public and any impacted stakeholders.
5. Provide accurate and timely information to the local community and all involved agencies and cooperators.

Task: Implement strategies and tactics that utilize a continuous, risk informed (values vs. risk) decision process for all phases of operations.

Purpose: To provide incident personnel decision space to evaluate and communicate hazards utilizing the risk management process given the current management of the incident.

End State: Provide a transparent command climate that allows for two-way communication amongst all incident resources, including a common operating picture to achieve incident objectives.

1. Confine the fire utilizing roads, natural barriers, and fireline where needed.
2. Confine the fire north of FSR26 Suiattle River Road.
3. Confine the fire east of FSR2640 Grade Creek Road.
4. Confine the fire west of Buck Creek Drainage.

.DISCUSSION...A weak frontal system will bring a chance of rain to the area Friday as well as maintaining cool, below normal temperatures into Saturday. A drying trend with gradual warming will return Sunday into next week.

Forecast for 20 foot wind speed (valleys and ridge tops) are 10 minute averages reflecting RAWS winds.

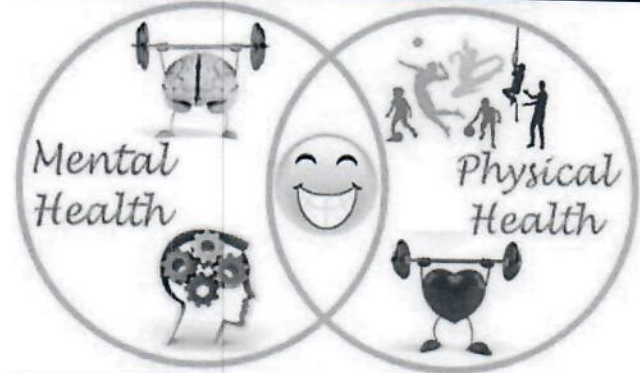
Taking care of yourself during the offseason

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON-SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)
Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.
Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
