With wind, fog, rain/snow, black ice and more cold weather coming into the area we need to be "heads up" for some different conditions on the local roads and where we work.

Local Communities: Our local drivers have their driving habits and flow well established and we need to account for that. Slow down and drive defensively. Fire fighters have been "guests" in their town and on their roads for over 2 months and collectively we have contributed to making a positive impression. Continue to be courteous and let's work together to finish strong and professional.

Rain/Snow: Slick, snow covered roads, slick footing, slick tools! Crew leaders must review safety precautions with your crews daily. Scout your work area or camp for weak trees and snags. Relocate crews as needed. Plus, remember to help each crew member stay warm and dry!

While traveling and working on the fire. Drive and hike with care – take your time and allow plenty of spacing. Try to keep as dry as possible on the line and get into dry clothing immediately after returning to camp.

Remember: The longer you wait to make a decision, the fewer options you will have!





WEATHER DISCUSSION: The low that brought the round of rain and snow last night will be moving out during the morning. This will mean more showery precipitation for today, and only light precipitation for tonight. The rain and snow continue Thursday night and Friday with another low.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Mostly cloudy and foggy, by 1100 becoming partly sunny with patchy fog. By 1700, skies becoming mostly cloudy and foggy again. A chance of rain or snow throughout the day. Snow level around 2400ft elevation, rising to 3500ft elevation during the afternoon.

PRECIPITATION: Liquid water amounts expected: zero to 0.09 of an inch. Snowfall above 3500ft elevation should remain below 1 inch, with partial melting.

TEMPERATURE: 2300ft elevation high 40 to 45.

HUMIDITY: 2300ft elevation minimum staying above 65 percent.

20 FT WIND:

RIDGETOP – West 10 to 16 mph gusts to 26 mph, by 1200 becoming west 8 to 14 mph gusts to 22 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY – West northwest 6 to 12 mph, by 1500 becoming west southwest 3 to 9 mph.

HAINES INDEX: 3 Very Low

LIGHTNING ACTIVITY LEVEL: 1.

STABILITY/INVERSION: No inversion. Mixing height 1400ft to 2400ft AGL, rising to 2300 to 3300ft AGL in the afternoon. Afternoon transport wind west 15 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT: Mostly cloudy and foggy. A chance of rain and snow. Snow level actually rising during the overnight, to near 5000ft elevation. 2300ft elevation low temperature: 35 to 40. 2300ft elevation maximum humidity staying above 80 percent. Ridge wind west southwest 8 to 14 mph gusts to 22 mph, by 2100 becoming southwest 10 to 16 mph. Valley wind west southwest 3 to 9 mph, by 2200 becoming southwest 6 to 12 mph. Haines Index 2 Very Low. LAL 1. Inversion: none, mixing height lowering to 100ft to 600ft AGL.

OUTLOOK FOR THURSDAY: Partly cloudy with areas of fog. A chance of rain or snow. Rainfall or melted snow equivalent: Zero to 0.13 of an inch. High temperature: 45 to 52. Minimum humidity staying above 65 percent. Ridge wind southwest 6 to 12 mph, by 1400 becoming southwest 10 to 16 mph gusts to 26 mph. Valley wind southwest 2 to 6 mph, by 1400 increasing to 7 to 13 mph gusts to 20 mph.

EXTENDED FORECAST: Thu night/Fri: Becoming cloudy with rain and snow likely, with light amounts. Low 32 to 44. High 42 to 52. Afternoon ridge wind southwest 2 to 6 mph. Fri night through Sun afternoon: Cloudy with rain and snow likely. Heavier amounts both days compared to Thu night/Fri. Lows 31 to 45. Highs 41 to 51. 



